HIGHLIGHTS Of Next Sunday's Lesson

STEWARDSHIP OF MONEY

The title of this lesson will keep some folks from Sunday School next Sunday. Yet, the same Bible that tells us how to be saved and the attitude that we should have toward our neighbors after we are saved, also tells us the attitude we should have toward our money. Before reading farther, we suggest that you read the Lesson Text as follows: 2 Cor. 9: 6-8 and Phil. 4: 10-18.

In the above mentioned verses and in other New Testament passages, we are plainly taught the stewardship of our money. This means that we are responsible to God for how we use and spend and give back to Him what God has given to us. The Old Testament taught tithing (that a tenth belonged to God) but the New Testament teaches stewardship (everything a Christian has belongs to God and should be used for His glory).

The first portion of our lesson text teaches that God blesses us in proportion to what we cheerfully give to Him. The last portion is a word of praise from a missionary to a New Testament church that had given liberally for his support. Most Bible students agree that these First Century Christians were giving far above a tenth of their income.

It is not true that we in this Age of Grace should give as much and more than God required of His people under the Mosaic Law? As someone has suggested, "You'd better make your gifts to God according to your income, lest God should make your income according to your gifts."

Harvest Nears Finish In Most Areas Of Texas

Harvest of cotton and grain sorghum was active in the northwest part of Texas this past week as open but windy weather continued. Strong winds were causing considerable lodging of unharvested sorghum in that area. In most other areas farm activities was slackening as the crops were practically all out of the fields and soils were too dry for fall plowing.

Light to heavy showers in scattered southern, coastal and eastern counties temporarily relieved the critically dry conditions but general rains were urgently needed in all areas. Dry soil and cool weather has checked growth of wheat in the Plains area. The freeze of a week ago killed some small grains, particularly oats where growth had been retarded by drought.

Dry range feed was generally adequate over the northern half of the state but dry feed was getting short in most other areas. Dry, cool weather in the northwest has checked growth of the wheat pastures and cattle were already being taken off some wheat fields. Supplemental feeding of cottonseed cake and roughage continued on many southern ranches and was starting on many central and west Texas ranches.

French Bride Of Local Man Enjoys First Thanksgiving

Thanksgiving Day has a lot of traditional meaning for just about every American. And every last one of them wants a good dinner and a little time off to think and give thanks about it all.

But for one Cisco resident, it was a little puzzling. That new citizen is Mrs. John G. Honea, who hails from Melun, France. And Thursday was her first Thanksgiving Day in the United States and Texas.

It was a quiet day for the Honcas — a dinner with his family. Theresa Honea and her infant daughter, Mary Jane, arrived in the United States in July 25, 1950. They were met at the boat dock in New York by her husband and his sister-in-law. They came home to Cisco by auto.

Parts of this country remind Mrs. Honea of her native Melun,

which is largely agricultural and noted for its fine perfumes and wines. Melun is also a renowned fashion center.

The Honcas met while John was in the service in Europe — at a French Club in Fontainebleau. At the time she was employed as a gasoline ration board secretary. They were married later in Ispinal, France. Mrs. Honea is an only child, and her father is employed at a distillery in Melun.

Mrs. Honea's parents have indicated that they plan a trip to the United States as soon as it can be arranged. Her native Melun was damaged during the war by German bombs. Her parents write that they feel another war is imminent.

Theresa and her husband converse in French or English. She

wants their daughter to have a speaking knowledge of both French and English. Her own English is good.

Mrs. Honea notices differences in customs and foods. U. S. breads and cooking are quite different, she reports. She is an avid knitter and has several fine dresses which she has completed for 14-months old Mary Jane. Theresa is an attractive brunette.

"The United States is very nice, and the people are very friendly and kind," she says. "I am happy to be here with my husband and baby. Everyone has been good to me." Husband John is an employee of Norvell and Miller and he attends Cisco Junior College's night school. He is a native of Cisco and is the son of Mrs. Lora Honea.
