Christians Will Observe Woman's Day This Sunday

Woman's Day, or Missionary Day, will be observed at the First Christian Church, Sunday, December 3, at 10:45 a. m., according to Mrs. W. J. Armstrong, missionary chairman of the C. W. F.

The day has been set aside since July 6, 1890, as a day when the women of the church seek to lay upon the hearts of every member of the church — men, women and children — the missionary program of the brotherhood and its needs, Mrs. Armstrong said.

In 1890 the organization was called "The Christian Women's Board of Missions and in 1920 the work was united in "The United Christian Missionary Society." "It is not to exalt the women or their work," Mrs. Armstrong said, "but to challenge the congregation to elevate Christ and his saving power by offerings to help carry out the Great Commission."

Rev. D. E. Aden will deliver the message at the morning service on the subject: "Greater Things Than These — Which are the Disciples of Christ" — the theme for 1950-51.

An offering for missions will be placed on the altar following the message by Rev. Aden.

Every member of the congregation was asked to attend the service and to help — "So that greater things may be accomplished for Christ into the uttermost parts of the earth."

Fire Inspector Visits Schools

Fire safety precautions of Cisco High School have been inspected and approved by Miss Vallie Bock of the State Fire Drill Regulation Association.

Miss Bock inspected the fire prevention themes written by the junior and senior English students, and also the fire drill record of the school.

Miss Bock informed Principal Conger that a new practice is recommended; students or teachers should not wait to close all windows before vacating the school building. Miss Bock pointed out that the time consumed in doing this could result in the loss of many lives.

It was also suggested that the school have fire extinguishers installed so that no point in the building would be more than fifty feet from an extinguisher.

HIGHLIGHTS

Of Next Sunday's Lesson

Stewardship of Life

"I beseech you therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, that ye present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service." (Rom. 12:1) This first verse of our lesson and the Golden text challenges every Christian to real sacrificial stewardship of life.

The text for next Sunday is as follows: Rom. 12: 1-8, II Cor. 8: 3-5, and Phil. 2:25-30.

The passage from Romans suggests daily, whole-hearted service to the Lord and urges that we use the gifts which he has given us for His honor and glory.

It also commands a life that is "different" from the crowd — "Be not conformed to this world."

As the Apostle Paul wrote his second letter to the church at Corinth, he gave an example of the stewardship of the churches at Macedonia saying that they "first gave their own selves to the Lord, and unto us by the will of God."

God wants the giver more than he wants the gifts. Dr. James H. McConky has written: "Our gifts are acceptable as an accompaniment to our lives, but not as a substitute for them. The Macedonians are a splendid example of the surrender of the life linked with the faithful stewardship of their money."

In the last Scripture selection for Sunday's lesson, the inspired writer gives the life of Epaphroditus as an example of surrender and sacrifice in service for the Savior. This one had literally worked himself almost to death. Why? "Because for the work of Christ he was nigh unto death, not regarding his life." How different our churches of today would be if we had workers like Epaphroditus!

The Rangers of Ranger Junior College took advantage of every opportunity that came their way in the second half and coasted in to a 52-to-7 victory over the Cisco Junior College Wranglers in the season's final football game for both teams here Thursday night.

The game was played before a large crowd in autumn-like weather. A half-time highlight was the crowning of Miss Jeanette Hansen as 1950 football queen. A pre-game feature was the appearance of the 75-piece Breckenridge High School band.

The first half was pretty much of a battle, but Ranger pushed across two touchdowns in the third period and three in the final quarter to run up the big score. Each team scored once in the opening quarter.

Ranger scored early the first period. They took the opening kickoff on their 6-yard line and Fullback Neal led a drive that scored when he passed 14 yards to End Standridge for a touchdown. The extra point was good.

The Wranglers took the kickoff on their 20, and Lonnie Crosby's first pass was intercepted on the Ranger 45. The Rangers

Firemen Answer 89 Calls, Urge Strict Caution

The Cisco Fire Department was kept busy during the month of November answering calls to extinguish grass fires, set in many instances by blowing trash fires and carelessly thrown cigarettes, Fire Chief Andy Anderson reported Friday.

A total of 89 calls were made during the month to put out grass fires alone, Anderson said. That was in addition to the fires the department set at request of home owners.

For the past ten days the department has kept two trucks busy eight hours a day burning off vacant lots and danger spots within the city. That step was taken in order to lessen the danger of a major fire, Anderson said.

He urged everyone to exert extreme care in setting fires during the present dry season and asked careful supervision of trash burning. He stressed the point that a tiny spark blown into tall, dry grass could easily set a major fire.

Mayor Rosenthal joined Fire Chief Anderson in urging caution in the setting of fires and voiced his appreciation for the help given in the matter.

DAV To Sponsor Essay Contest

The Department of Texas, Disabled American Veterans, is again sponsoring a statewide essay contest on the subject "Equal Opportunity in Employment for the Physically Handicapped." This contest is open to all high school juniors and seniors of either public or private schools in Texas.

Contest prizes include \$60. for first place, \$40. for second, and a \$25. third place prize. Also, the first place winner from this state will be entered in the National contest. The winner of the National contest will receive a \$1,000 check from President Truman.

In the National contest for 1950, a Texas high school girl, Miss Peggy Lord of Cuero, was the national contest winner. She received an expense-paid trip to Washington, where she was awarded the \$1,000 first place prize award.

Local chapters of the Disabled American Veterans will work with high schools in promoting the contest. A local committee will be organized in each school to act as judges. Only the first place essay from each high school will be submitted to the contest chairman, Thomas R. Greening.

The essays, in order to be judged, should reach Mr. Greening not later than January 10. Essays should not exceed a maximum of 1200 words.

New League Will Not Change Grid Setup Materially

Cisco will notice little change in the new Texas high school athletic setup announced by the Texas Interscholastic League Wednesday. The most drastic reclassification in years by the TIL was planned in order to afford more equality in teams, officials announced.

The only noticeable difference to Cisco will be in play after the district championship has been decided. Several old Class AA teams, including Mineral Wells, Hillsboro and Waxahachie dropped back to what is now known as Class A.

The reclassification sets up two new conferences and drops the unpopular City Conference. The new AAAA Conference will take in schools with an enrollment of more than 850 students. Conference AAA will consist of schools with an enrollment of 450 to 849 students. The AA conference will be composed of school playing in A competition last season with a few exceptions. The old Class B teams have been changed to Class A.

District 8A will remain as it was during the 1950 season with the exception of DeLeon, who was dropped to a lower classification. The district will be known as 10AA for the 1951 season.

Coaches Jack Everett and Buck Overall said that they saw little change in the local plans for the 1951 season. They hoped to keep DeLeon on the schedule if possible. The complete schedule will be announced soon after January 1.

Jan Latson Honored On 11th Birthday

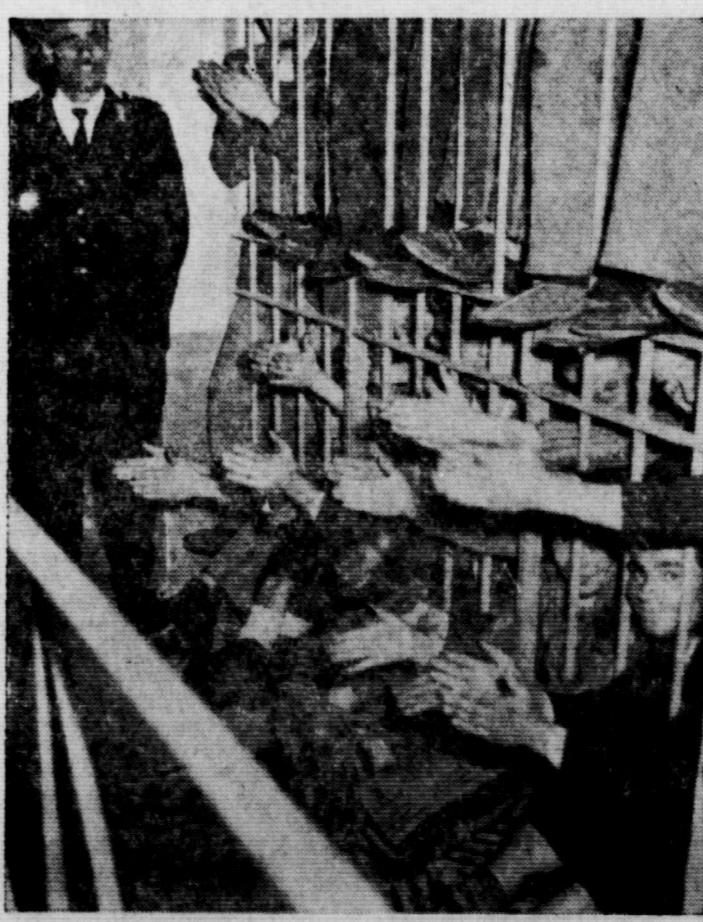
Jan Latson was honored on her eleventh birthday with a birthday luncheon on Saturday, Nov. 25.

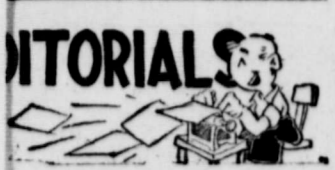
