Power Goes Off For Short Period

Failure of electric power circuits in the Cisco area for some 30 minutes early today resulted from control circuit troubles rather than from weather conditions, District Manager E. L. Jackson of West Texas Utilities Company reported.

The circuit troubles developed after the high voltage power line between Cisco and Eastland was cut off to enable workmen to move several poles from the right-of-way for the Cisco-Eastland highway. The circuit was at the Putnam substation, and it was cleared up and service returned to normal in about 30 minutes.

'FIRES OF FREEDOM' TO BURN IN TEXAS CITIES ON DEC. 7th

AUSTIN, Dec. 5.—"Fires of Freedom" will burn brightly in more than 600 Texas communities on the night of Thursday, December 7, as the climax of the one-day series of programs of "Operation Democracy," the campaign sponsored by the state's 777 American Legion posts to keep the fires of freedom burning forever in the hearts and minds of Texans.

In Austin at 7 p. m., Governor Allan Shivers will light the first fire that will be the signal for the simultaneous state-wide ceremonies, Bill Elkins of Killeen, state Legion Commander, has announced.

Civil Service To Hold Job Exams

The United States Civil Service Commission today announced the following examinations: Business Analyst, Commodity-Industry Analyst, and Industrial Specialist, \$3,450 to \$6,400 a year; Highway Engineer (Trainee), \$2,875 and \$3,100 a year; and Correctional Officer, \$3,125 a year.

The positions of Business Analyst, Commodity-Industry Analyst, and Industrial Specialist are located in various Federal agencies in Washington, D. C., and vicinity. No written test is required for these positions. To qualify, applicants must have had experience in the type of work for which they apply. Pertinent college study may be substituted for experience.

The Highway Engineer (Trainee) positions are located in Washington, D. C., and throughout the United States. A few positions located in the Territories and Possessions of the United States and in foreign countries may also be filled. Most of the vacancies are in the Bureau of Public Roads of the Department of Commerce.

Correctional Officer positions are located in various prisons, reformatories, and camps throughout the country. (Female Correctional Officers are needed only at the Federal Reformatory, Alderson, W. Va.) To qualify for the positions, applicants must pass a written test. They must also be in good physical condition and must have excellent personal attributes and character.

The maximum age limit for the Business Analyst, Commodity Industry Analyst and Industrial Specialist examination is 62 years. Age limits for Highway Engineer Trainees are from 18 to 35 and for Correctional Officers, from 21 to 45.

Complete information can be obtained at the Cisco Post Office.

On the night of December 6, the program will be launched by thousands of church-goers as Texas pastors, priests and rabbis share the conviction that faith in God and faith in Democracy are irrevocably linked if fires of freedom are to be rekindled throughout the world.

They will be followed by a meeting of the women of each community to discuss "Democracy Concern; Operation Heritage" for student participation; a noon luncheon of business men to honor local, county and state officials; and a public meeting on education.

Then at 7 o'clock the "Fires of Freedom" will be ignited across the length and breadth of the state to blaze way into the consciousness of the people the importance of actively participating in government affairs. Speakers to be selected in each community will touch off the fires.

Sheppard, State Chairman of the Legion's Americanism Committee, previously had announced that Governor Allan Shivers will make a state-wide radio address on December 7.

Plans call for those participating in the pilgrimage to visit certain homes in Cisco decorated in the holiday theme for the occasion. A small charge will be made by the club sponsoring the tour and tickets are now available from any club member.

A list of the homes entered in the program will be announced in the December 17 issue of the Press. Refreshments will be served in one of the homes with the place to be announced later.

Men who formerly applied for enlistment and who failed to pass the mental examination, and who are still interested in enlisting in the Navy may now qualify as these enlistments have been lowered. Also men who formerly applied for enlistment in the lower two pay grades, and were rejected for dependency reasons are advised that they may now enlist in these pay grades providing that have only one dependent.

Cold Norther Roars In Ahead Schedule

High winds, snow flurries and a hard freeze were the weather predictions for Tuesday night in the Cisco area today after a fast-moving cold front roared in some eight hours ahead of schedule. The weather bureau sounded a warning to protect livestock, auto radiators and outside plumbing for temperatures of from 10 to 20 degrees tonight.

The norther arrived in this area about 4 a. m. today and flurries of snow began swirling at 10 a. m. The noon-time temperature was 22 degrees.

The official forecast called for continued northerly winds with

occasional snow or freezing rain with temperatures of from 10 to 20 degrees. Clearing weather has been predicted for Wednesday.

Snow was beginning to stick to paved streets and highways early this afternoon. Traffic, however, continued to move in a normal condition, except that visibility was somewhat restricted. Caution was urged for highway traffic as it appeared that conditions might get worse.

City schools expected to continue normal operations.

The prospects of snow or rain were welcomed by area residents, particular farmers and ranchers. They needed moisture badly to facilitate the planting of grain and cover crops and to eliminate grass fire hazards.

CISCO MIDGETS WIN SCRANTON CAGE TOURNEY SATURDAY NIGHT

At special assembly services Monday morning at Cisco Junior High School, Coach Bill Sledge and his Midgets presented the school with the first trophy won Saturday night in the finals of the Scranton Invitation Grade School Tournament when they eliminated the North Park School entry from Abilene, by a 12-11 score.

The large cup was accepted for the school by Principal Roy Killingsworth who complimented the local teams on their ability, sportsmanship and behavior.

In the opening game the Midgets eliminated Putnam by a 22-

5 score. They advanced to the finals by beating Scranton, 21-12. Harold Hammett, lanky Midget player, accounted for 22 of the team's total tournament points and was presented a medal as one of the all-tournament players. Bill Miller made a total of 16 points during the three game play-offs.

The local girls were eliminated from the tournament in their initial game, losing to Eastland. They lost to Moran by a score of 18-8 in their consolation match. It was the first time any of the girls had ever played on a gym floor. Every member of the girls squad played in the games. Coach Killingsworth entered the girls in the play to give them experience for future games. Plans call for working out in the old high school gym as soon as the high school team starts work in the new gym.

Mr. Killingsworth thanked the people of Scranton for their kindness during the tournament. On one of the trips the local school bus broke down and Scranton people took their cars to transport the players to Scranton so that they could play their game. While the game was in progress the people of the community pulled the bus in with a tractor and had it running when play was over. AUSTIN, December 5.—Advocating continuation of the Board of State Hospitals and Special Schools as the agency to administer the program of the eleemosynary institutions of Texas, representatives of five statewide organizations meeting here praised "the progress made by the Board to date toward improvement of facilities and medical care for patients in the institutions under its jurisdiction."

The board decided to admit all children up to sixth grade age free if accompanied by their parents. That includes West Ward students and those not old enough to go to school. The standard price will prevail at the opening ceremonies tonight.

School officials and team members urged and invited all local fans to attend the official opening of the gym and promised two good ball games.

Special Payment To Go To Penney Company Workers

The board of directors of the J. C.
