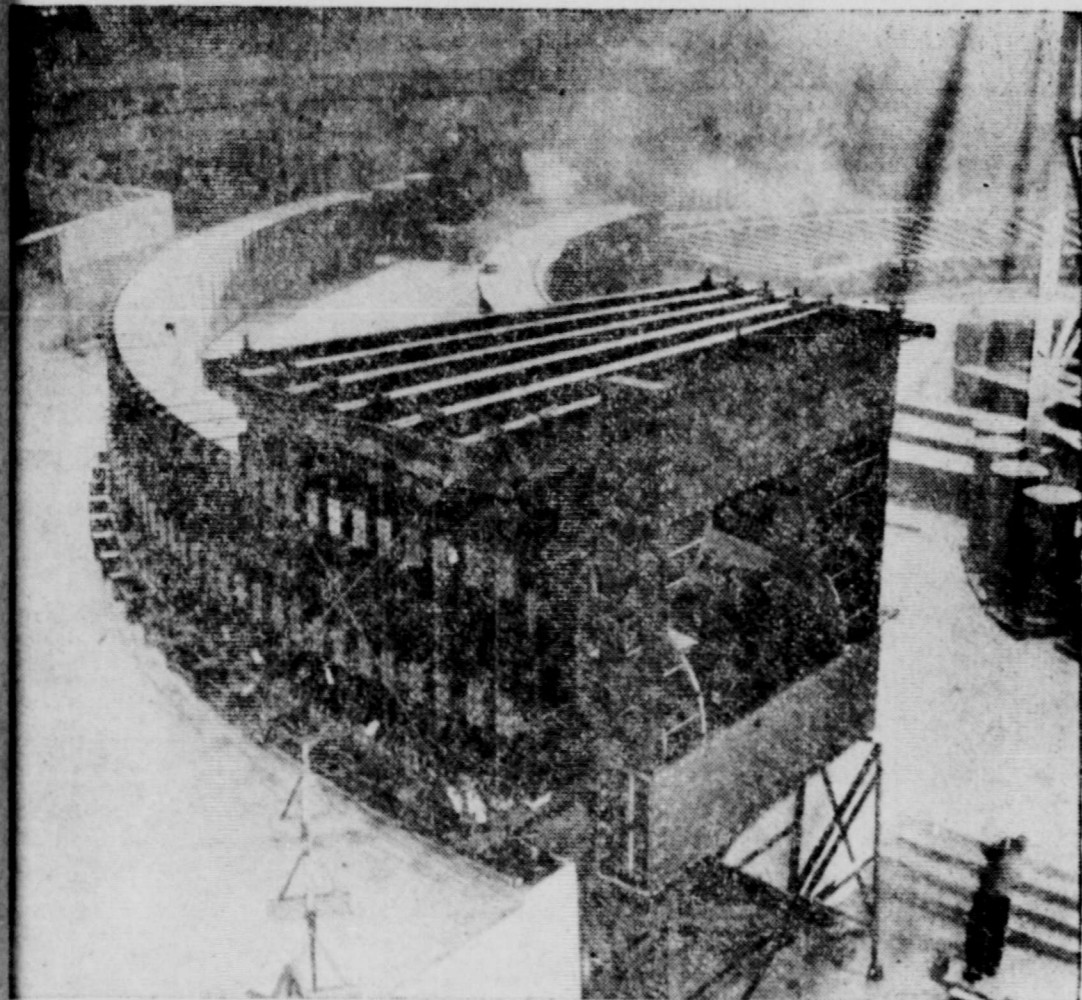

The young people of the Church of the Nazarene are working on a Christmas program for presentation on Sunday, December 24, during the evening services. It was reported today.

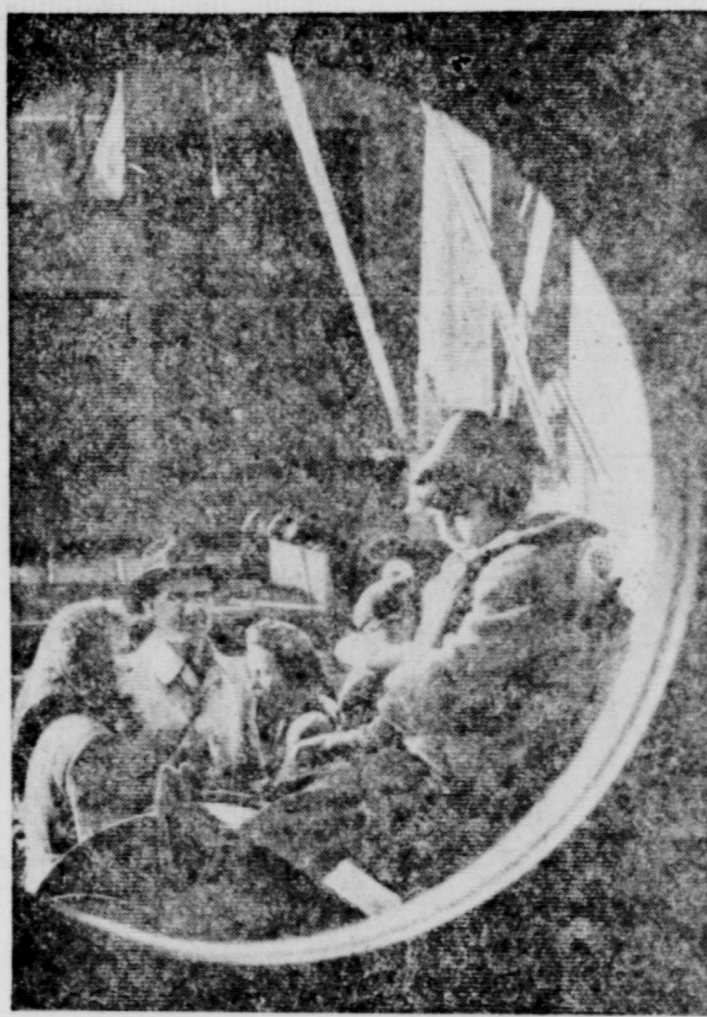

WALKER ASKS COURT TO MOVE HIS CASE TO DALLAS COUNTY

Rorace Walker, tax attorney of Dallas, who faces a suit filed by the State of Texas and Eastland County for recovery of more than \$100,000 allegedly due the two bodies in money collected by Wal-

ker, Thursday filed a plea of privilege asking for a transfer of the suit from the 91st District Court to Dallas County. The plea was filed by Ivan Irwin of Dallas, who has been retained by Walker in the case.

In the plea, Walker said that he was a resident of Dallas County and that he had never maintained a permanent office in Eastland County and that his attorney was in Dallas.

Also filed with District Clerk Roy Lane was Walker answer to the charges in which he denied that any of the funds collected were fraudulently used and cited costs of collection which included stationary citation costs, newspaper publications, expenses incurred by the District Clerk and the Sheriff in drawing up and serving the citations and conducting the tax sales.

Action on the plea of privilege will be taken soon, it was reported by the district clerk.

Safety Is Urged For Xmas Season

CHICAGO, Dec. 8 —Americans were asked today to celebrate the year-end holidays by keeping themselves and the Christmas spirit alive this year.

That plea launched the National Safety Council's Christmas safety campaign, in which 161 organizations are cooperating.

The campaign is aimed at reducing the increasing number of accidents throughout the nation. Special emphasis will be placed on traffic accidents, which have taken an upward swing this year.

Traffic deaths for the first nine months of 1950 were up 11 per cent, and the Council predicts that the traffic death toll for the year is virtually certain to reach 35,000. This would be the highest since 1941 and the only year since 1946 to show an increase.

"The Christmas - New Year's holiday season is the peak accident period of the year," said Ned H. D. Brown, president of the Council, "and traffic accidents present the most acute problem. Heavier travel and the festive spirit of the season always add to the normal winter hazards of bad weather, slippery roads and added hours of darkness.

"And more people will be traveling this year," he said. "Service men and women will be coming home on holiday leaves - and some families will be traveling to military camps to spend the holidays with those who cannot come home.

"This increased travel calls for extra caution on everybody's part. If everyone will take a little more time during the holiday rush - just enough to be careful when driving on the highway or crossing streets and in recreational and home activities - everyone will be assured of a much happier Christmas and New Year's.

"Don't let death take your holiday - or anyone else's," Mr. Dearborn urged.

Civil Service To Hold Job Exams

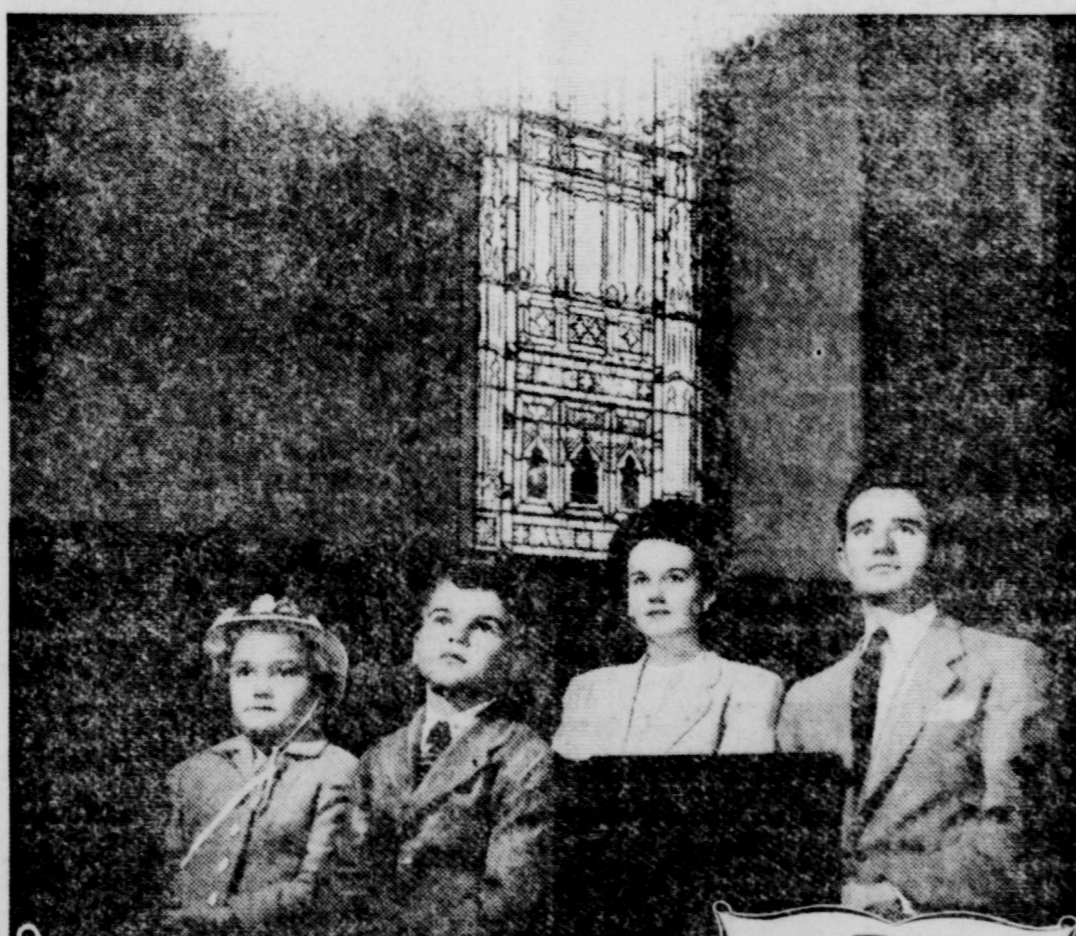

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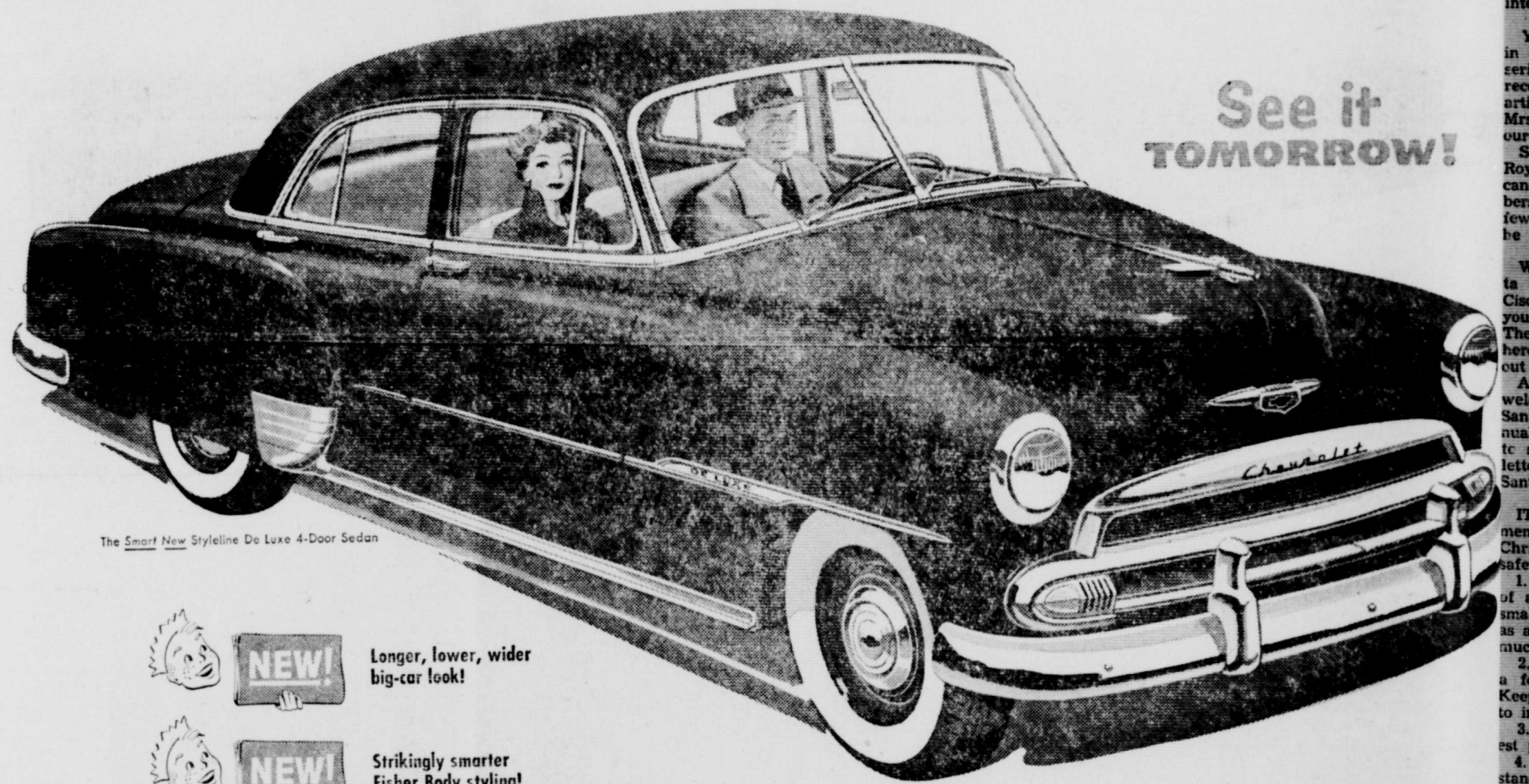
