Story of Texas City Blast Told In Readers Digest

The greatest explosion in world history, except atom bomb blasts and the blow-off of volcanoes, was that which wrecked Texas City, Tex., April 16, 1947. Morris Markey recalls the catastrophe in the January Reader's Digest in duct. en article condensed from the Esquire magizine.

Markey relates how a small damaged homes 11 miles away in Galveston.

A vivid description of the ensuing 24 hour terror, "totally unpredictable explosions lashing the city with incessant punishment," is followed by a tribute to Father William A. Roach, who braved death to give the last rites to the hundreds of dying men at

In describing this as one of the worst disasters America has ever known, the estimate is made that 551 died, 3000 were seriously injured and property damage totaled about \$50,000,000.






