FIGHT SEEN IF CONGRESS LETS BUREAUS TAKE WATER CONTROL

AUSTIN, Jan. 1.—A threat second in importance only to that of a global war faces Texas in 1951 if Congress permits Federal bureaus to take over control of inland waters, Guy C. Jackson, president of the Texas Water Conservation Association, warned Texans today.

He was commenting on a report of The President's Water Resources Policy Commission, which has recommended basin wide planning of all water resources within the nation.

"The program outlined would be disastrous to the freedom of this country," Judge Jackson said. "It would bring about complete socialization of our water resources as the first step to nationalization of many other industries in a free America," Judge Jackson said.

He quotes a part of the Commission recommendation that says "planning of water resources cannot be dissociated from the planning of all resources within a basin. Thus water development should be planned as integral parts of basin programs, and co-ordinated with regional and national economies as well as the development, use and conservation of the other resources of the nation."

"Thus, it is seen that the Commission proposes in river basin planning that all resources, mineral, forests, fish, wild life, agriculture, livestock industry and the regional and national economies be included as integral parts of water resources developments," Judge Jackson said.

"When one looks at this report with the recent tidelands decision of the U. S. Supreme Court in mind, then the implications are tremendous.

"The blueprint of the commission is not merely for a water policy for the American people, but an economic policy which would take over a great deal of industry by the Federal government," Judge Jackson warned.

Oil Test Spotted Southwest Moran

Location had been made today for a new wildcat oil test three miles southwest of Moran in Callahan County by Hooker and de Mohrenschildt of Abilene. The well will be their No. 1 Wylie, and location is 1,260 feet from the south and 1,170 feet from the east lines of Section 122, University lands.

Permit calls for 4,200 feet with rotary equipment. Some five miles southwest of Cisco, the Senate Oil Company No. 1 Speegee is drilling at 2,375 feet. This is a deep test on a large block of leases taken over by Senate recently from the Lone Star Producing Company.

Southeast of Cisco, Oil Associates, Inc., No. 1 J. R. Bacon was ready to resume drilling operations after being shut down several days to correct troubles. The hole was bottomed at 3,313 feet. A gas show had been logged in the Lake sand in a drill stem test.

In the Owens field five miles northeast of Cisco, the Bankline Oil Company No. 1 J. H. Reynolds was drilling at 2,705 feet early today.

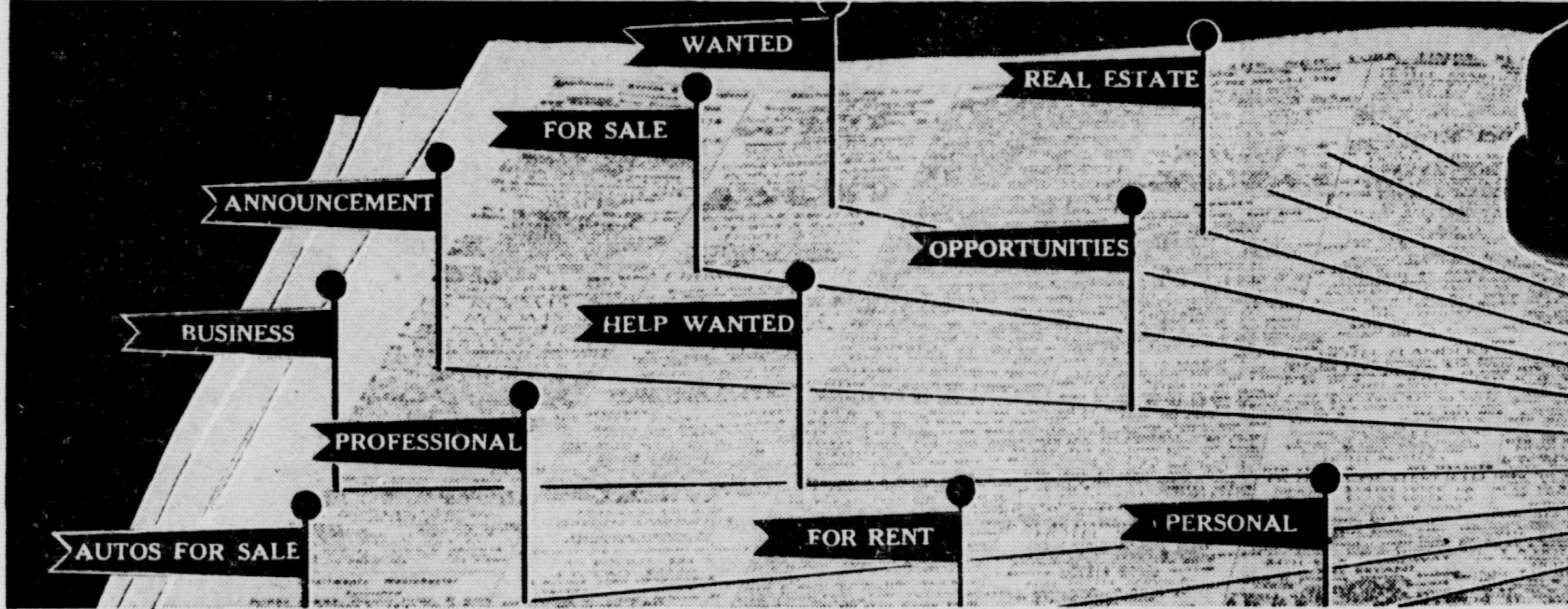
