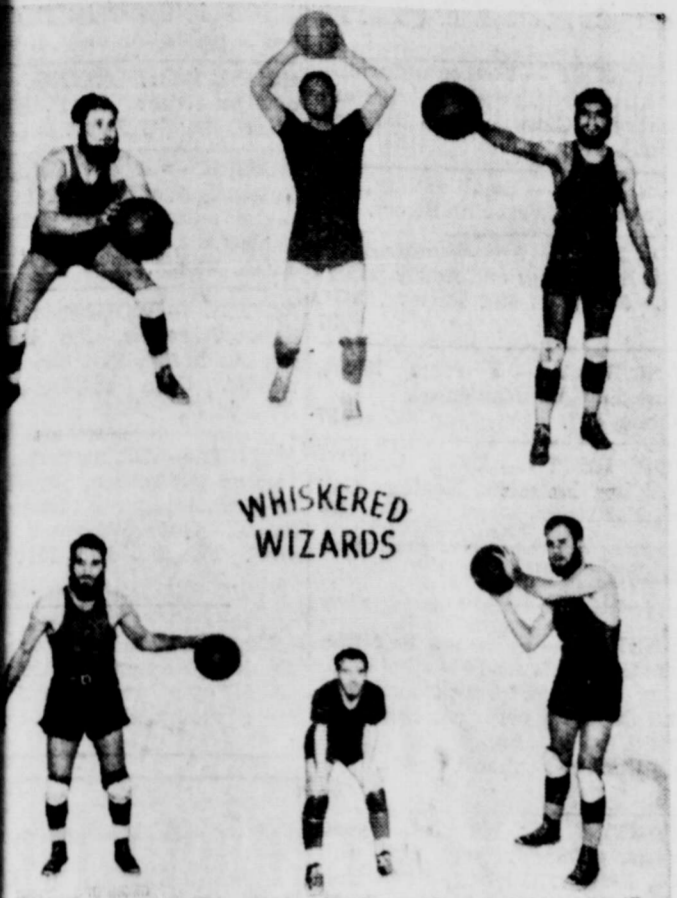

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MARCH OF DIMES DRIVE WILL BEGIN IN COUNTY JANUARY 15

The 1951 March of Dimes begins Monday in Cisco and Eastland County and throughout the United States as a massive attack against the only epidemic disease known to man that is still on the increase—a disease that in the last three years has stricken more than 100,000 people and cost the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis an unprecedented \$58,000,000 for patient-care alone.

Stanley Webb, County Director of the campaign, said every phase of community life was represented among the volunteers who will start the drive with the avowed intention of raising more money than ever for the fight against polio during the two weeks of the drive ending Jan. 31.

"The need confronting us," Mr. Webb said, "is the greatest in the history of our 13-year-old battle against polio.

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history of our 13-year-old battle against polio. The costs of the last three tragic polio years have left the National Foundation's epidemic aid funds exhausted.

"Many thousands of men, women, and children left crippled by past epidemics depend upon the March of Dimes for a fighting chance to achieve some degree of normalcy.

In strategic volunteer posts this year, are public officials, leaders of civic, fraternal and social organizations, women's clubs, school children and teachers, Mr. Webb said.

Reveiling last year's accomplishments of the National Foundation, Mr. Webb estimated that curing for polio patients in 1950—when well over 30,000 people were stricken—had cost the National Foundation approximately \$20,000,000 with millions in unpaid bills still remaining.

He said more than 1,900 Red Cross nurses had served on National Foundation assignments, and that 100 physical therapists had been sent into the field.

Since the National Foundation was established in 1938, it has authorized \$28,567,233.51 for programs of research, education, and non-epidemic medical care, he declared.

He characterized this three-pronged attack against polio and its after-effects as "our only hope of some day eliminating the disease and of providing the best care that science can devise until then."

CARLISLE WELL FLOWS IN TEST FRIDAY; WILL DRILL ANOTHER

Another outstanding oil well appeared in prospect for the Bankline - Owens pool five miles northeast of Cisco after the Cooper and Hemphill No. 3 Carlisle flowed late Friday in a drill stem test from the Lake sand formation.

The pay sand was topped at 3,378 feet and the test was run after drilling two feet into the sand. Gas appeared at the surface in three minutes and the well flowed a full head through the drill stem in 54 minutes.

Bottom hole pressure was 1,400 pounds, and flowing pressure was 765 pounds. Cooper and Hemphill believed this well appeared to be as good or better than their record No. 2 Carlisle, which was completed on Christmas Day as the county's biggest well in 25 years.

Saturday, Cooper and Hemphill began running pipe. They planned to cement pipe to 3,378 feet, leaving four feet of open hole. Completion will follow after the pipe sets 72 hours.

Cooper and Hemphill announced that drilling equipment would be skidded immediate to the location for the No. 4 Carlisle, their last location on the 80-acre lease.

Nearby, the J. P. Lohan et al No. 1 L. N. Hart, northwest outcrop to Owens field production, was drilling at 3,165 feet in the top of the Caddo lime.

Five miles southeast of Cisco, Oil Associates, Inc., No. 1 J. R. Bacon was still seeking completion in the Ellenberger lime. Saturday's plans called for re-acidizing, installing a packer and swabbing.

Much Cross Plains interest is being centered on an oil venture, two miles south of Lakewood Country Club, being drilled by the Armond Corporation of Shreveport, La., and the Ace Oil Company of Dallas.

The well is 880 feet from the east and 330 from the north lines of the 106 acre A. E. Tate tract in the Stanley Lackerman survey of Eastland County.

The operators have approximately 720 acres in the drilling block.

Drill stem tests were taken at three depths, and if commercial production is not found at the permit depth of 2,500 feet efforts may be made to produce from one of the strata. They were from 1,694 to 1,699 feet, from 1,784 to 1,792, and from 1,834 to 1,841 feet.

During Smith's time here the church completed a \$20,000 building and improvement project, which included construction of a modern new church structure in Cross Plains.

A "farewell-hello" supper for Smith and Cowan was held in the American Legion Hall in Cross Plains Friday night.

Ripley Oddities To Be Shown Here Tuesday By DAV

Robert Ripley's personal collection of "Believe It or Not" oddities, being exhibited on national tour under the auspices of the Disabled American Veterans, will be presented in Cisco on Tuesday, Jan. 16, by Cisco Chapter No. 74 D. A. V.

Believe It Or Not cartoons have been appearing in newspapers throughout the world for years. On display in this exhibit will be some of the original drawings picturing facts which many found difficult to believe.

The greater portion of the exhibit features part of Ripley's amazing collection of the authentic original subjects on which the cartoons are based. Every item is selected from the unusual assortment of strange things which Mr. Ripley spared no effort or expense to unearth during his endless explorations of all parts of the world.

The mobile exhibit is mounted in a special custom-built trailer, featuring a medical torture device, the "Iron Maiden of Nuremberg." This inhuman killer of the dark ages is only one of the many interesting articles with curiosity or oddity significance.

There is a working model of an inventor's attempt to perfect perpetual motion, a knife that cuts cold steel, and an Indian necklace made from human bones, the trigger fingers of the men massacred at Custer's Last Stand.

Included in this exhibit are mysterious oddities and wonders of every age and every part of the world. There is a two-headed calf, a mummified hand with a curse that came true, a \$50,000 shoe, the jawbone of a huge man-eating shark, a genuine murder poison ring, and many other items.

Location of the showing will be on Ave. D and 8th St. (front of Mott's and Penney's). Admission is free, and the exhibit will be open to the public from 10 a. m. to 10 p. m. 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Governor Will Be Sworn In Jan. 16 In Simple Ceremonies At Capitol

AUSTIN, Jan. 13.—A simple "swearing-in-ceremony" here Jan. 16 will start Gov. Allan Shivers on his first full term in the state's highest office.

The Governor will take the oath of office at noon that day on the front steps of the state capitol. It will be administered to both Shivers and Ben Ramsey, Lieutenant-governor elect, by J. E. Hickman, chief justice of the state supreme court.

The only state function to be held in connection with the inauguration is a reception at 7 p. m. in the capitol rotunda, where the public will have a chance to meet Shivers, Ramsey and other state officials.

No inauguration invitations are being sent out, as a result of the Governor's request for a simple ceremony.

Because of the international situation, Governor Shivers asked the Citizens' Inaugural Committee to abandon plans for the usual elaborate festivities normally

scheduled for a Governor's inauguration.

"In view of the president's proclamation of a national emergency," Governor Shivers told the committee, "I feel it advisable that the inauguration be limited to a simple oath-taking ceremony. I know that all of you will join with me in the thought that we should devote all of our energy to the situation of the grave problems we now face."

The inaugural committee had made detailed plans for a long parade, a reception, six balls and other pageantry in connection with the inauguration. About 20,000 engraved invitations were to have been sent out.

Thus, for the second time, Shivers will take the governor's oath of office without fanfare. On July 16, 1949, he was sworn in as successor to the late Gov. Beauford Jester. That ceremony took place on the Shivers farm near Woodville.

"The seriousness of our situation," the Governor told the inaugural committee, "is emphasized by the president's action. As we concentrate upon essential elements of an all-out mobilization effort, an elaborate inauguration would be out of place."

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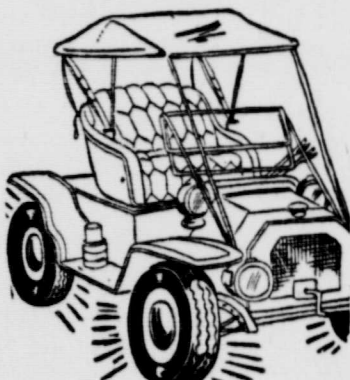

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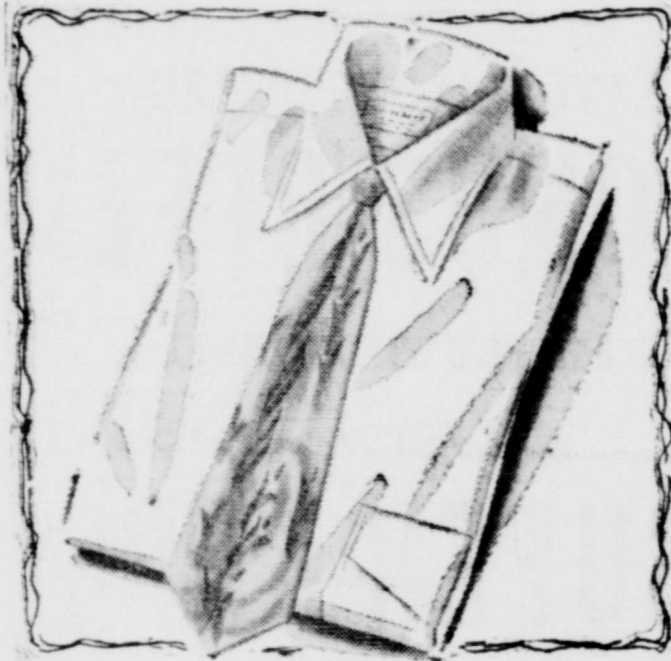

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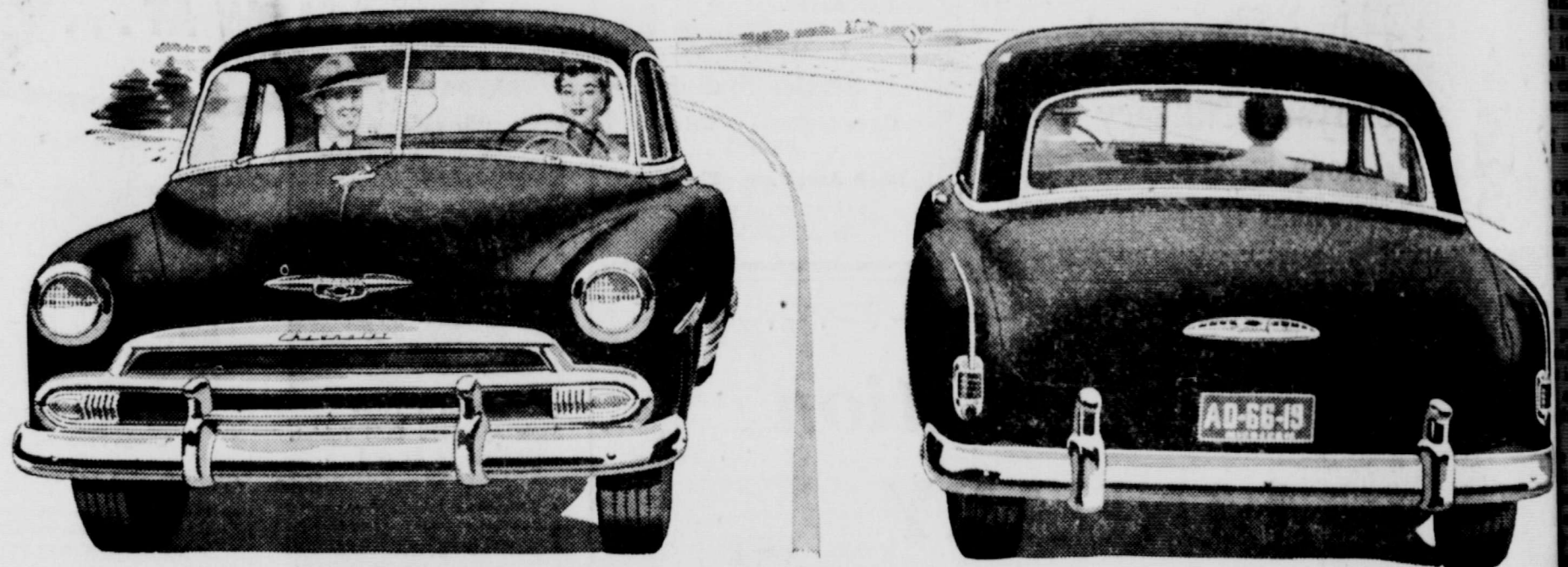
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
