Understand that four-fifths of the cases of polio in the last year were given financially by the March of Dimes.

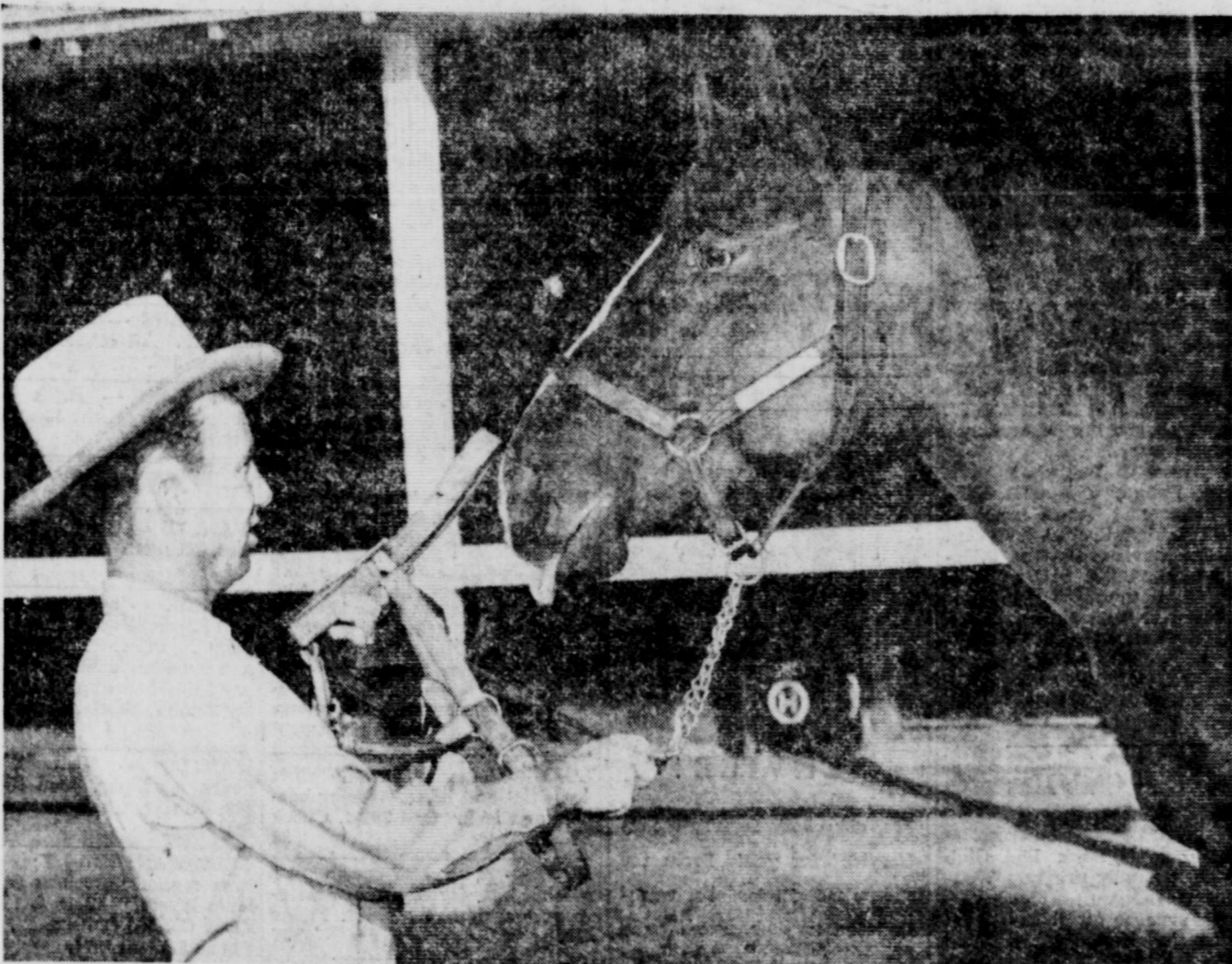
Also understand that polio sufferers last year received more money to pay their state paid into the national fund.

## Exams Planned To Fill State Jobs

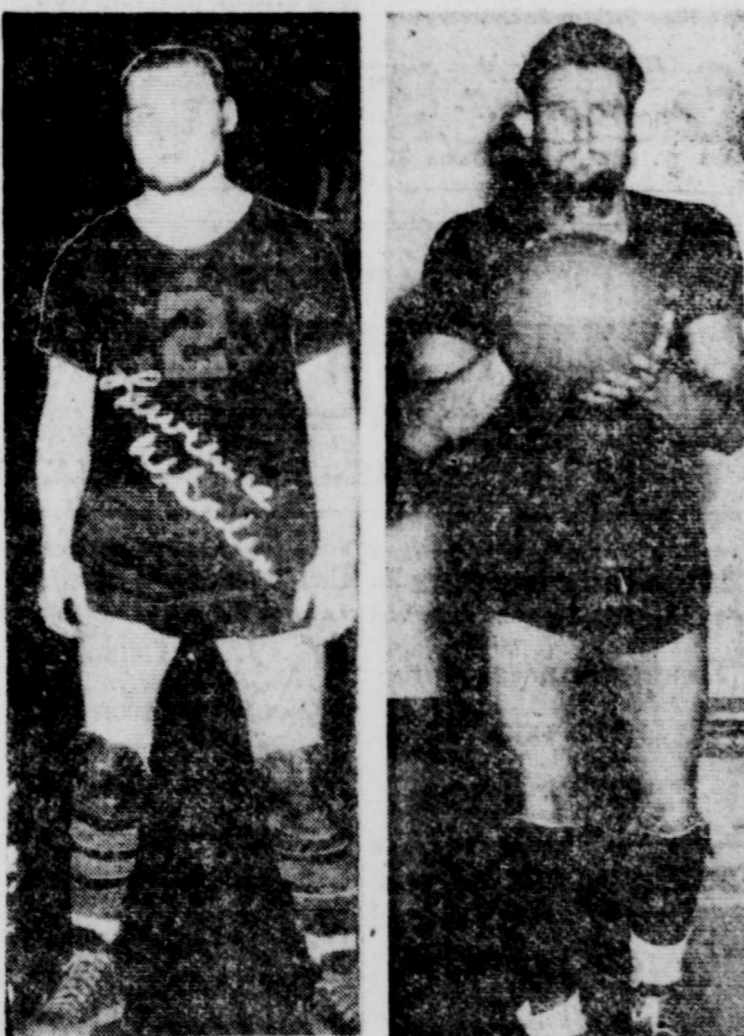

## New Well On Hart Farm Is Seen As Oil Pool Extension

### \$50 REWARD!

A \$50 reward has been offered for the return of a part Bulldog lost here Sunday night while the owners were guests at the Elwood Courts. The dog answers to the name of Butch. He is 11 years old and his right eye is glassy. He is mostly white.

The owners, W. A. Dunn and L. O. Payne, will be at the Elwood Courts by 7:30 p. m. tonight (Tuesday), and they're seeking to recover the dog for sentimental reasons.

The Bankline-Owens oil pool, five miles northeast of Cisco, apparently had a half-mile western extension today after the J. P. Lohan et al No. 1 John Hart flowed considerable oil Sunday in a drill stem test from the Lake Sand.

The Lohan well is west of Cooper and Hemphill's Carlisle lease. The well bottomed at 3,396 feet—five feet in the Lake sand. A drill stem test was run at this depth and gas appeared at the surface in four and a half minutes and oil flowed 70 feet high in 49 minutes.

Pipe has been cemented and completion is due later in the week. Lohan took the block of leases in a farm-out agreement with the Hickok Producing and Developing Company.

Nearby, Cooper and Hemphill Oil Company of Cisco has set 220 feet of surface pipe for their No. 4 Carlisle. Completion work is due to begin soon on the No. 3 Carlisle, which flowed on a drill stem test last Friday.

In the same area, Bankline Oil Company's No. 4 J. H. Reynolds was drilling at 2,000 feet early today. Five miles southwest of Cisco, the Senate Oil Company's No. 1 Speegle Estate, wildcat deep test, was drilling at 3,470 feet early today. The hole was just below the Caddo lime.

Southeast of Cisco, the Oil Associates, Inc., No. 1 J. R. Bacon was still testing today. It is seeking completion in the Ellenberger lime or the Mississippi lime.

Two miles southeast of Cisco, the Hickok Producing and Developing Company's No. 1 Silas Hill was drilling at about 2,200 feet with cable tools. It is a deep wildcat test.

Two miles northeast of Cisco, Wempler Bros. Drilling Co. No. 1 George P. Fee was given a second hydraulic treatment Monday. This is an old well that is being reworked after being abandoned after it had produced from the Mississippi lime for several months.

The well was making some 35 barrels per day and the operators decided that another hydraulic treatment would increase the production.

Three miles northeast of Cisco, the Woodley Petroleum Co. No. 1-M George P. Fee was setting surface pipe and preparing to drill ahead in a 4,000 foot test. A well here would represent another western extension for the Owens pool.

A new wildcat for the area is the Trumter Petroleum Co. location five miles west of Rising Star. It will seek production at 1,600 feet in Section 17, Block 2, ET Survey.

In the Nimrod area south of Cisco, the Fred M. Manning No. 1 M. E. Louderdale was reported to be testing today after perforating the casing over the week-end in the Caddo lime. Observers believed at least a gas well will result from the test.

Funeral services were held in the Woodson Baptist Church at 2 p. m. Monday with Rev. Beene, Methodist Minister, in charge of the services. Burial was in Woodson.

He was born in Hope County, Arkansas on June 16, 1861. Mr. and Mrs. Miller celebrated their 66th wedding anniversary on December 30.

## Texas Flag Goes To Marine Group

DALLAS, Jan. 16.—The North Texas Platoon now being formed by the Marine Recruiting Office here, will carry the Texas flag to camp.

Lt. Col. James Tinsley, of the Marine Barracks, Quantico, Virginia, was asked to loan the Texas flag, carried by the statewide Marine Recruit Platoon enlisted in 1946, by the Dallas recruiters. Colonel Tinsley's reply was brief and to the point, "Sure, mailing it today."

The flag was given to the Colonel, who was Executive Officer of the Recruit Battalion in which the Texans trained, by the Texas Platoon. He has kept it as a memento ever since.

Keeping up with the flag almost became a full time job for the platoon, it was stolen twice from platoon's quarters and once from the Colonel. In each case it was recovered, and will again lead a group of Texans through their first phase of training in the Marine Corps.

Major E. L. Baile, Jr., Officer in Charge of the Dallas Marine Recruiting Office stated, "The results for the first ten days of the campaign have been more than gratifying, and the platoon is shaping in to a representative group of Texans: students, farmers, oil men, and cowboys. Over sixty men have applied during this ten day period."

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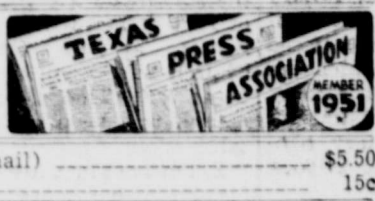
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Star-Telegram Runs Feature Story On A. Z. Myrick, Local Dairyman

A. Z. Myrick started peddling milk 28 years ago, when he milked three cows on two lots on the southern out-skirts of Cisco. Then there were years when his working days stretched from 3:15 a. m. to after dark as he built his herd to a peak of 50 milk cows and his holdings to 480 acres.

Four years ago, when Myrick decided to ease off, both he and his wife entered a hospital to rest up. Still, he keeps a finger in the dairy business because, he claims, "It's the easiest way I know to make a living."

In the last four years he has milked only from 10 to 16 cows. He's letting all his land except about 130 acres go back to native pastures.

He's cut his work day to about four hours, but he's on the run all the time.

"I usually have one or two nights a week at home," he grinned.

Now—in semi-retirement—Myrick is president of the Eastland County Dairy Association, president of the county Farm Bureau, group leader in soil conservation work, director of the Eastland County Livestock Raisers Association and a member of the county PMA and FHA committees, among other things.

"How he gets the time or is able to take the time to participate in all those activities and still farm and run a dairy, I have never been able to figure out," confessed County Agent J. M. Cooper. "But when he goes into something, he goes full force. And he puts it over."

Myrick is naturally intensely interested in the dairy association, which he has headed since its birth three years ago. The group has started both an artificial breeding program and a dairy herd improvement testing program. Myrick has been told Eastland County is one of only six in Texas with both programs in progress. Already there are 150 good heifers in the county from the breeding venture, he said. And the quality of dairy cows in Eastland County has improved vastly.

"We're looking forward to the time when we won't have to go to Wisconsin for a good cow," said the tall, bespectacled farm leader. "We want them to have to come here."

The association also has started a youth dairy program and 19 of the boys have good registered Jersey heifers now, Myrick said.

The soft-spoken dairyman was awarded a certificate in 1949 by the Eastland Chamber of Commerce for his work in the county as a farm and dairy leader.

Myrick, who was a retail dairyman, thinks it's much more profitable than wholesale dairying. The wholesale producer gets only 47 per cent of the consumer's milk dollar, he explained.

"But if I'm taking it to you, I get the whole dollar." And he can deliver the milk, he said, for half what he pays the retailer to take it.

During the war, he and a hired hand milked 50 cows and did all the farm work. A son, who was attending school, delivered the milk.

Myrick is conscientious about keeping a rigid milking schedule and has built a hot water heater on his water trough that keeps the temperature even through cold weather.

"They won't drink water if it's too hot or too cold," he explained. "For every gallon of milk they give they've got to drink five gallons of water."

Myrick got the soil conservation "bug" in the early 1940s. So in 1942 he bought his last piece of property—a 160-acre farm "to tinker with." It was a worn-out place that a farmer had been mysteriously able to raise 11 children on, Myrick said.

The dairyman-farmer terraced it, built a stock pond and began contour farming it, planting grain and legumes. The first year he made only \$250. The next year the profit was \$500. And the third year was the pay-off—net income spiraled to \$2,500.

"It really produces now," he said with a smile. "People say it couldn't be the same farm if it wasn't in the same place." — By George Dolan in The Fort Worth Star-Telegram.
