Mrs. Olin Elliott is a patient in a Gorman Hospital, suffering with a case of flu. She is doing nicely.

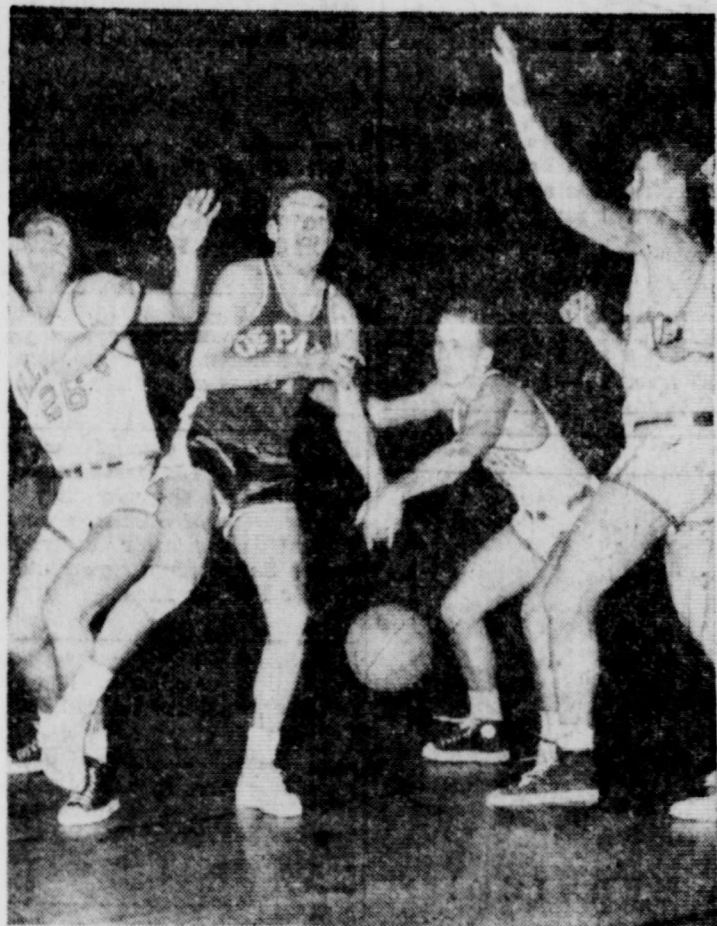

Northwest Grain Belt Holding Own After Light Snow

Wheat in the northwest was just about holding its own this week as additional light snow fell over most of that important wheat area. Light rains covering most of the eastern third of the State over the week-end were generally ineffective in breaking the droughty conditions except in parts of the northeast. Southern, Plateau and western areas received no relief. In upper Coastal counties where rain fell a week ago farmers were preparing land for spring planting. Soaking rain was still needed in all areas.

The First National Bank in Cisco today posted a \$500 reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of any person or persons guilty of intentionally setting grass fires in pastures on ranches in Eastland, Callahan, Shackelford and Stephen Counties.

The company's recently completed No. 1 Reynolds recently completed potential tests with a flow of 203 barrels per day. Flow was through a 20-64 choke with 325 pounds casing pressure and 200 pounds tubing pressure. Completion was through 36 perforations at 3,382-3,391 feet.

Nearby, considerable excitement was reported Wednesday night during drilling in operations of the Cooper and Hemphill No. 4 Carlisle. The well blew in unexpectedly and flowed until the tools were freed from the hole and the well shut in. Tubing was to be run under pressure today.

The Cooper and Hemphill No. 4 Carlisle was drilling at 1,265 feet early today.
