# **Civil Defense Is**

AUSTIN, Jan. 25-It is hoped that we may achieve orderly thinking and make soncrete suggestions for use by local and state committees in planning the medical phase of civil defense and disaster relief in the very near future, said Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer and State Medical Defense Director.

No community can prepare itself to provide these additional health services that will be essential for civilians subjected to disaster, without a great deal of forethought, prolonged training and development of systematic performances, drills, tests, etc. When the average community prepares itself for disaster, the effort of each citizen and every profession must be fitted into a coordinated system.

There is no easy way to prepare for disaster, it is all hard work. There are two opinions as to local disaster planning. One maintains that no local planning should be done until the central agency prescribes a uniform pattern for each locality. Such a regimented approach would result in a speedy realization of the desired total readiness. Certain elements of local plans would depend upon such a system if mutual support between communities are to be achieved with a maximum of economy and efficiency. Such a system is the only one likely to survive national disaster.

Water Rate Set For Schools And Churches At Tuesday Meeting





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HANDY REFERENCE BUSINESS AND PROFESSIONAL DIRECTORY

Bill Of Responsibilities

#### Prepared by The American Citizenship Committee, State Bar of Texas

WE WHO ADVOCATE DEMOCRACY as the best form of goverrment for an enlightened and progressive people, enjoying as we do the blessings of liberty under the Constitution of the United States, set forth this Bill of Responsibility as a guide to all citizens for the preservation of individual freedom and democratic government. I. It shall be the duty of every citizen to render undivided alleg-sace to the Constitution of the United States, to work for its better-

ment and perpetuation, to respect the soverignty of the people's govment, and to defend the nation against all its enemies whomso-

II. It shall be the duty of every citizen to be familiar with the titution of the United States and to be informed as to what rights liberties are his, and to use these rights in such manner as is ent with his own welfare and the welfare of his fellow citi-

III. It shall be the duty of every citizen to defend with his life rights and liberties granted to him and to his fellow citizens by the Constitution, to obey the laws of the land and aid in their enment, and to oppose vigorously any persons whose intention is to transgress the law or to oppress the rights of others

IV. It shall be the duty of every citizen to make honest, wise and ageous use of the free and secret ballot at every election; to exercise freedom of thought, speech, and worship; to protect the freeof the press; to safeguard the right of trial by jury and to render willing jury service when called upon; and to perform all other acts ucive to the perpetuation of the rights set forth in the Constitu-

V. It shall be the duty of every citizen to protect and sustain the itten liberties and rights vested in him by custom and usage and to perpetuate the ideals of the equality and dignity of the indual, upon which the Constitution is founded.

VI. It shall be the duty of every citizen to be active in the political party of his choice, and to be vigilant of the public officers, to render all possible aid to them, and to serve in public office by ap-pointment or election when qualified and when called upon to do so. It shall be his duty to strive for the selection of public officers of ability and upright character; and when holding public office, to arve in such manner as will subordinate private or minority interests to those of the people at large.


VII. It shall be the duty of every citizen to achieve the highest practicable level of education, and to work for the advancement of education by supporting and improving the public schools and by ostering the desire for education among his fellow citizens.


VIII. It shall be the duty of every citizen to instruct his children in principles of freedom and to spread the ideals of democracy government at home and abroad.

IX. It shall be the duty of every citizen to defend the right to buy and sell, to own land and other property, to engage in commerce, and to work and earn a living wage, as a fundamental guarantee of the freedom and welfare of the nation.

X. It shall be the duty of every citizen to preserve an attitude


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
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# What is the TRUTH?
