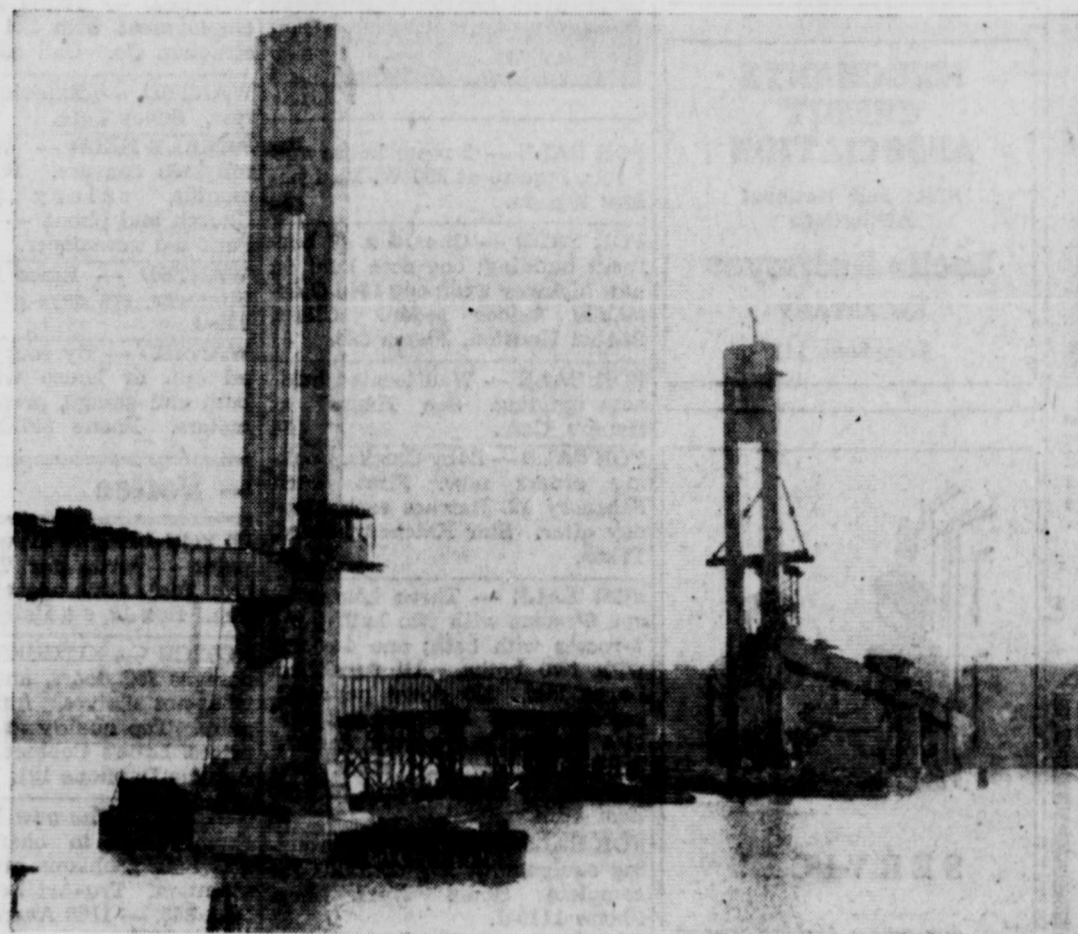
LET'S ALL GET behind the March of Dimes program at the Cisco Country Club on Monday night, Feb. 12.

PROPOSED LAW WOULD CONTROL ROYALTY AND MINERAL SALES

(Special to the Press)

AUSTIN, Feb. 3.—New laws controlling future royalty or mineral sales are proposed in bills filed in the Texas House of Representatives and assigned for public hearing before the Oil, Gas and Mining Committee.

One proposal provides an automatic statute of limitation of 10 years on royalty or mineral sales unless production is secured. When production is not found, the ownership automatically reverts to the original fee owner.

Here's how such a law would work: A fee owner sells his royalty. At the end of 10 years from the date of sale if no production has been brought in, title to the royalty automatically reverts to the fee owner. However, the law would not apply if production was found.

A similar proposal fixes a three year limitation period but only after court action. This bill stipulates that royalty and mineral interests will be returned to the fee owner after three years and after a court suit if the buyer has not rendered or paid taxes on the interests.

Engineers Expect To Begin Project In Early Future

Creation of a Water Development Committee to help direct a comprehensive survey of Cisco area water resources with a view of adding to community industrial possibilities was announced Saturday by the Chamber of Commerce.

W. P. Guinn, immediate past president of the organization, was named chairman of the committee. Former Mayor Edward Lee and John Speir, manager of a local lumber yard, were named to the committee.

President E. L. Jackson, in announcing the new committee, pointed out that it will cooperate with the City of Cisco in the program. The city recently accepted a proposal from Homer A. Hunter, Dallas, widely known civil engineer, to make a survey of the area's water resources. Mr. Hunter has notified the city that he will be here in the near future to begin the survey, which is expected to require some 60 days.

Cost of the project is expected to run about \$1,000, Mr. Jackson said. The Chamber of Commerce plans to assist in underwriting costs.

Mr. Guinn's committee planned to mail out a letter to civic leaders early this week, inviting cooperation in the project.

"For more than 20 years Cisco has been talking about improving its water supply by diverting the flow of another watershed into Lake Cisco," the letter says. "Whether or not it could be done or, if so, whether such a project would yield enough water to make it worth the cost was never known."

"Water is the economic key to the future of Cisco. Other conditions being equal, or nearly so, water will determine whether Cisco will grow or stand still."

The letter points out that the survey is important "because these facts are of immediate interest in view of the anticipated industrial expansion inspired by the national defense program. They mean that it is time to stop talking and get the facts. And we want to be ready."

The letter points out that Cisco has plenty of water as a city, "but we are not utilizing our potential — we are actually using less than one-third the capacity of Lake Cisco because of the comparatively small size of the watershed and the presence of the Katy tracks across the upper channels."

It points out that the survey will determine whether Battle Creek can be diverted into Lake Cisco or whether other area watersheds can be used, along with the probable development costs.

Train Service Is Slower Here

Train and mail service into Cisco moved slower last week due to the inability of the railroads to move trains out of large cities because of the switchman's strike which has gained momentum.

Additional workmen reported "sick" and because of the sick calls by switchmen some 66,000 other workers were laid off.

The West bound T & P Eagle due in Cisco at noon was several hours late Friday and the east bound train due shortly after 1 p. m. arrived two hours late.

A partial mail embargo was instigated by the government on Thursday because of the inability of the roads to carry the heavy loads with what trains they were operating.

Many well-meaning, patriotic men will lend their names and influence to a new, untried organization that advocates their pet project without even inquiring whether or not some established organization is already doing the same thing and doing it better, or could do it, if suggested, with machinery already set up, tried, proven, and financed.

The business group is over-organized and is guilty of some of the duplication and overlapping for which we criticize government. The time has come for a meeting of the "top brass" of many business, industrial, and trade organizations to discuss division of work and to define fields of effort, and to try to eliminate some of the unnecessary

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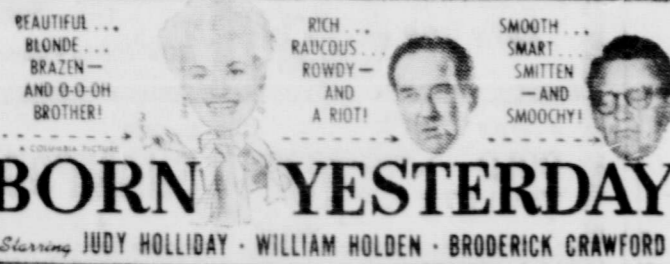

Action Expected On Court Bills

The Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System has obtained a judgment in the United States District Court at Madison, Wisconsin, enjoining Roy's Appliance Company, a co-partnership with stores located at Beloit and Janesville, Wisconsin, from further violations of Consumer Credit Regulation W. The defendants, through their attorneys consented to the entry of the judgment.

Regulation W provides that credit for the instalment financing of certain listed articles, including electrical appliances, shall not be extended without obtaining a down payment in the amount prescribed by the Regulation. In the case of electrical appliances, the present terms of the Regulation require a down payment of not less than 25 per cent of the cash price of the appliances and the balance must be paid within 15 months. In this case the defendants had violated the Regulation by not obtaining the required down payment in a number of its sales.

Action Is Taken In Federal Case

(Special to the Press)

AUSTIN, Feb. 3—Senate and House conference committees are expected to iron out differences early this week on bills that will create a new district court for Borden and Scurry counties. The new court will be for the 132nd District, which will be organized from the present 32nd District, now composed of Borden, Scurry, Mitchell and Nolan Counties.

A bill authorized by Senator Pat Bullock, Snyder, has been passed by the Senate. A bill by Representative Sterling Williams, Snyder, has been passed by the House. Senator Bullock's bill stipulates a six-year life for the new district court, while Williams' proposal has no limit.

It is this difference that will be ironed out by the conferees, and it is expected that the bill will receive sufficient votes on final passage to become effective immediately after Governor Allan Shivers signs it.

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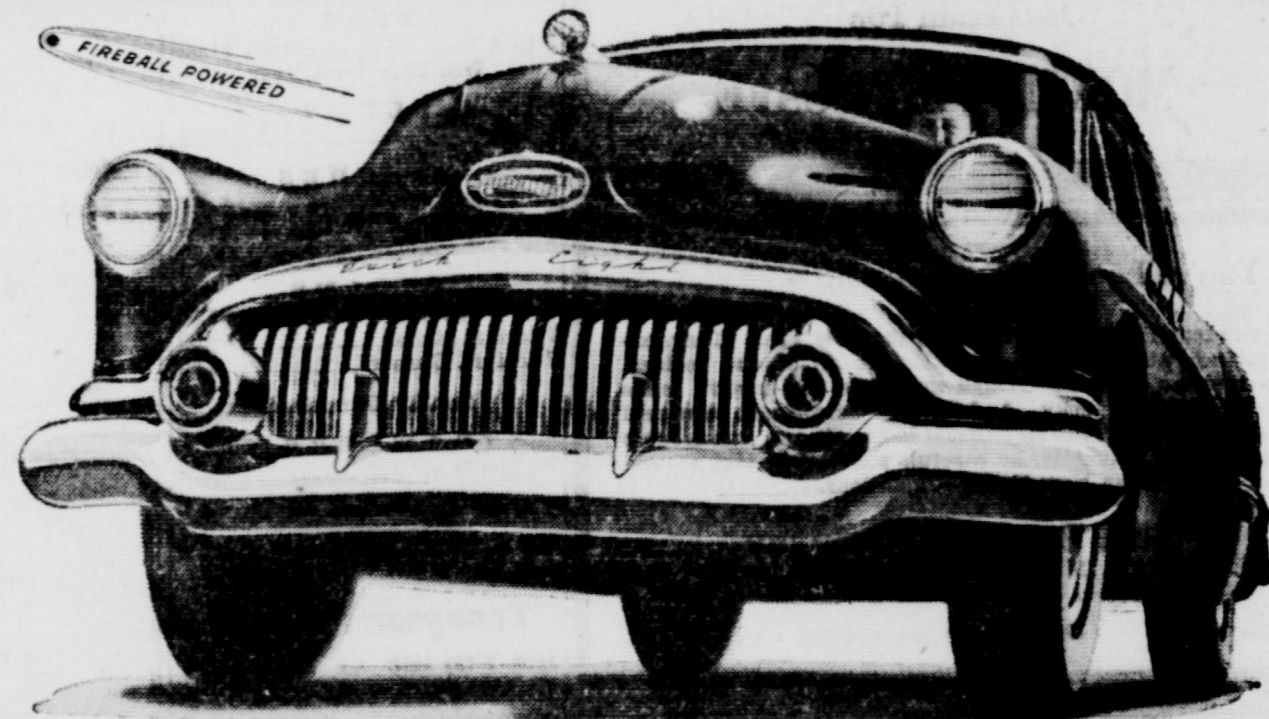
