

Engineers Expect **To Begin Project** In Early Future

Creation of a Water Development Committee to help direct a comprehensive survey of Cisco area water resources with the view of adding to community industrial possibilities was announced Saturday by the Chamber of Commece

W. P. Guinn, immediate past president of the organization, was named chairman of the committee. Former Mayor Edward Lee and John Speir, manager of a local lumber yard, were named to the committee.

President E. L. Jackson, in announcing the new committee, pointed out that it will cooperate with the City of Cisco in the program. The city recently accepted a proposal from Homer A Hunter, Dallas, widely known civil engineer, to make a survey of the area's water resources. Mr Hunter has notified the city that he will be here in the near future to begin the survey, which is expected to require some 60 days.

Cost of the project is expected to run about \$1,000, Mr. Jackson said. The Chamber of Com-



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
