

Farmers all around are saying this, but G. G. Goss is one of the most frank about it. "I guess there is no use trying to hide it," he said. "I made a mistake and got caught. I thought I could get by just one more year, but I didn't I guess most other farmers did

the same thing." Mr. Goss explained that he had strip-cropped his peanuts every year until the last few years. He had even been criticized after stating that cover crops, alone, could not be depended on every year. But after five, or six successful cover crop years, he became over-confident and left off

the strip crops. "It will require years," he estimated, "to build back the organic matter already lost, and it's still blowing." "I feel that it is my duty," he said, "to recommend strip cropping, on the contour, spaced according to the recommendations of the Soil Conservation Service technicians in all cases where peanuts are planted on sandy land."
