Funeral services for Mrs. W. L. Harrell, 91, a resident of Cisco since 1894, will be held at the First Christian Church at 10 a. m. Wednesday. Mrs. Harrell died at her home on West Second Street Monday night following a serious illness of only a short time.

She was the widow of the late W. L. Harrell who operated ranching interests in the Cisco area until his death in 1907. They were married in Ledbetter, Lee County in November, 1877. Mrs. Harrell was born in Waco on April 12, 1860. She came to Cisco from Roby.

She had been an active member of the First Christian Church since she was 21 years of age and had led an active life until recently when her eyesight began to fail.

She survived three of her five children. The two surviving daughters are Mrs. G. E. Berry of San Angelo and Cisco and Mrs. Opal Hawkins of Cisco. She was the mother of the late Frank Harrell, Cisco business and civic leader.

Funeral services will be conducted by Rev. D. E. Aden, local minister and Rev. Miley, former minister. Burial will be in Oakwood with Thomas Funeral Home in charge of the arrangements.

Mrs. Harrell is also survived by eight grandchildren, 12 great grandchildren and one great great grandchild.

Pallbearers will be O. L. Duckett, J. W. Slaughter, L. A. Warren, H. R. Garrett, W. R. Winston and Fred Erwin.

Meetings Scheduled This Week To Study Pea Growing Project

Six tenths of an inch of rain fell in the Cisco area Monday night during a brief electrical storm which accompanied a mild cold front that passed through West Central Texas. This brought 1951's moisture total to 1.05 inches.

Although the rain was welcome, it was too late to be of much benefit to grain crops. Most of this area's crop had already been the victim of a prolonged drought. Last week's snow and sleet brought the area's first moisture in some four months.

Monday night's rain was of great benefit to pastures and farm land, however.

County Agent J. M. Cooper said Eastland County farmers are beginning to make plans for spring planting and considerably more rainfall will be needed to help compete these plans. Monday, 133 county farmers gathered at Carbon to hear a group of Texas A. & M. College specialists discuss all phases of cotton planting.

Mr. Cooper believed that considerable county acreage this year will be planted in cotton in the face of further cuts in peanut acreage. There is no limit this year on cotton acreage, and the price outlook is excellent, he pointed out.

The county, which has produced little cotton in several years, now has only two gins, one at Ranger and another at Gorman. Plans are being worked out for a third gin at Rising Star.

Mr. Cooper said that meetings have been scheduled this week to discuss the planting of "peas" in the county. A meeting will be held at Rising Star at 7:30 p. m. Friday, at Gorman at 10 a. m. Saturday and at Carbon at 2 p. m. Saturday.

A large East Texas pea cannery has agreed to buy peas in this area in the fall. He bought more than 30 tons last fall. The planting of Blackeye, Purple Hull, and Cream peas will be discussed at the meetings.

Midgets Win Top Honors In Olden Cage Tournament

The Cisco Junior High School Midgets won first place in the Olden grade school tournament played Friday, Saturday and Monday by winning over Desdemona in the finals Monday night, 30-14. The junior high girls lost a heartbreaker to Moran in the finals for consolation honors, 20-21.

The Midgets were never in trouble and when the three minute warning period began were leading 30-6. Coach Bill Sledge used every man on the squad. Bill Miller and Harold Hammett divided scoring honors by sinking 10 points each. In the game with Moran Sue Harrelson took scoring honors with 12 points.

Sterling silver basketballs were awarded to the starting five on the winning team. No team trophy was awarded.

The Midgets were to leave today for Comanche where they will play the junior high team for the district championship. The teams won their halves of the district and are playing a three game series for the championship. The second game will be played in the local gym next week.

FIRE CAUSES DAMAGES OF ABOUT \$2,500 AT TOMPKINS FACTORY

Fire of undetermined origin which was discovered about 9:30 p. m. Sunday caused an estimated \$2,500 in damages to the Tompkins Broom Company plant located in the 1300 block of West 15th Street.

The blaze was confined to the processing room where broom corn is threshed and cut to size. Metal fire doors kept the fire from spreading to other parts of the plant.

It was estimated that raw materials in the amount of \$1,000 were destroyed and that the building was damaged in the amount of \$1,500. Building damage was confined to the electrical wiring, windows and roof.

Workmen spent Monday in re-wiring the plant and getting machinery in operation so that the processing could begin sometime Tuesday.

Firemen said they were hampered by heavy traffic of "fire watchers" and issued a warning to those who drive too near a blaze while firemen were at work.

PENNEY STORES AND THEIR MANAGERS

The local J. C. Penney store is a small and modest establishment, yet it is a unit of one of the world's greatest retail chains. Among U. S. retailers (outside the food field) ranks third, says a February Reader's Digest article condensed from Fortune. Exceeded only by Sears and Montgomery Ward, Penney had gross sales of \$880,000,000 in 1949.

The founding James Cash Penney was born in Hamilton, Mo., 75 years ago, and is still active in the company's affairs. His first retailing venture was a one-third interest in the Golden Rule Store, opened in Kemmerer, Wyo., in 1902. "Golden Rule principles," he once said, "are as necessary to business profits as are trucks, typewriters or twine."

Though strict with his employees, Penney has "trusted them to the ends of the earth." Not one of the chain's 50,000 full-time employees has ever been bonded. Maximum salary, including the president's, is \$10,000 a year; but profit-sharing boosts this figure much higher. Store managers who make \$30,000 to \$50,000 are not uncommon; about a third of all the managers exceeded \$15,000 in 1949.

A store manager has heavy responsibilities, however. He hires and trains personnel, sets his advertising budget, chooses his store's merchandise and makes his own decisions about mark-downs in price. Most managers have been long in their communities, know their fellow townsmen well, and like to tell stories showing confidence in their stores. Like the one about the small boy arriving at the store with a signed blank check and a note from his parents asking that he be outfitted for school.

Senate District Changes Proposed In New Measure

AUSTIN, Feb. 19.—A 10-county Senatorial district, including all the counties presently in the district represented by Senator Wayne Wagonseller of Stone County plus four additional counties, has been recommended to the Senate by that body's redistricting committee.

Senator Wagonseller expressed gratification that the committee had seen fit to leave in the district all the counties presently in it and welcomed the addition of the extra counties.

The district would be composed of Clay, Montague, Jack, Wise, Denton, Stephens, Palo Pinto, Parker, Callahan and Eastland counties.

The Senator pointed out, however, that this certain committee lacked a lot of final Senate approval. Some senators contend that their districts have not been treated fairly and are certain to oppose the measure on the floor.

As drawn up by the committee, District 22 had a total of 40,665 poll taxes in 1950, the basis on which redistricting is done in the Senate. The basic figure used in creating districts was 42,600 poll taxes. Of necessity, Wagonseller pointed out, some districts had fewer and some had more poll taxes than the average.

Four senatorial districts created under the proposed bill at present do not have a Senator residing in them, Wagonseller declared, while four other districts now have two Senators living in them. That means, if the bill passes, that there will be considerable turnover in the Senate next session.

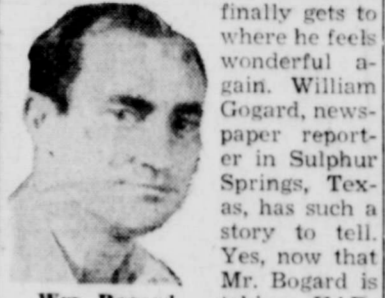

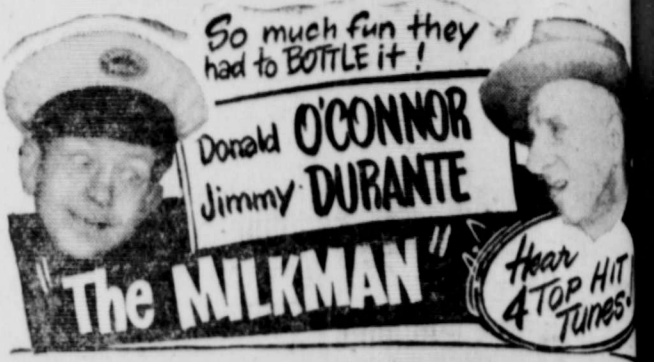

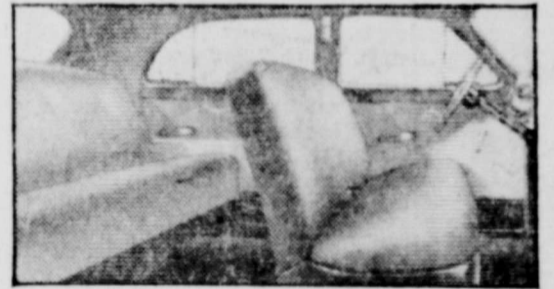
