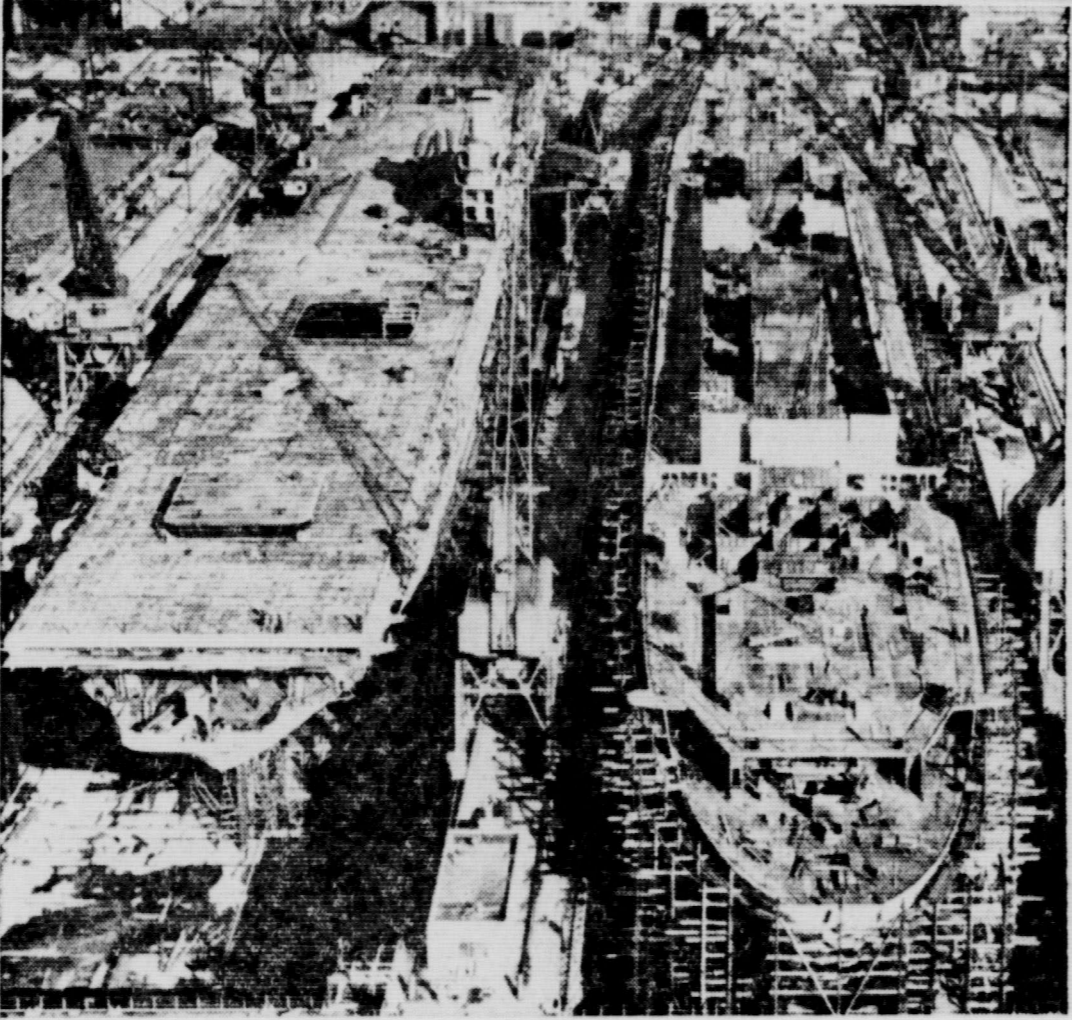

## Oregon Attorney Talks At Rotary Club Luncheon

W. L. Dickson, prominent Portland, Oregon attorney and former member of the Oregon legislature, and Harold Kupp, Portland Ford dealer, were the speakers at the weekly Rotary Club luncheon at the Hotel Victor dining room Thursday. The two men are in Cisco in interest of their oil holdings in the Bankline-Owens Field near here.

Mr. Dickson first expressed his and his associates gratitude for the hospitality of the city and Texas and went on to give a graphic description of his native state. He told of Oregon's industries which include lumber processing, farming, ranching, fishing and the tourist trade. He described the scenic beauty of the state and pointed out things of interest to tourists. He spent some time describing the rugged coast line, beautiful beaches, coves, sea lion caves, limestone caverns, green forests, the Columbia River drive, the pine, the fir and redwood forests, the mountains and the mountain lakes, salmon fishing and the irrigated areas.

Mr. Kupp expressed his appreciation for the friendliness of the community and his gratitude for the assistance of local citizens.

The program was arranged by Edward Lee, who was chairman for the day. A visitor at the luncheon was Rev. S. B. Sears, a Baptist missionary to China who is a Rotarian in one of the Chinese cities. Mr. Sears told of the activities of the club in China.

## Cage Company Is Low Bidder For Nimrod Road Job

Cage Bros. Construction Company of San Antonio was the low bidder Thursday for a contract to pave 3.1 miles on Farm Highway 569 from the end of the current pavement south of Cisco to Nimrod, according to information here.

The Cage company, currently at work on a highway improvement project between Cisco and Eastland, submitted the low bid of \$38,941 for the Nimrod job. The project calls for grading, structures, base and surfacing the stretch of road.

The low bidders are usually awarded state highway contracts, it was understood here.

## Cisco Area Oil Venture Pays Off For Oregon Business Men

Several prominent Oregon business men today own Cisco area oil leases worth a potential \$1,000,000 because their attorney, after a business visit to his native Texas, insisted that they join him in acquiring and developing Eastland County acreage.

And for their attorney, William D. Dickson, the fact that the leases are paying off is a vindication of his faith in Texas oil.

It all began last fall when Dickson, who has served terms in both houses of the Oregon legislature, came to Cisco in the interest of a client. He is a native of Cleburne and Texas oil was nothing new to him. In the course of his legal work, he heard stories of increased oil development in this area.

Returning home, he interested his friends and client, Harold Kupp, Portland Ford dealer, and Gus Blumquist, lumber and business man.

He then returned here and they acquired their Summerall lease north of Eastland and drilled a dry hole. Next they acquired the adjoining John Nix lease, and a second well was sunk and completed as a small producer.

L. A. Warren, Cisco oil man, who has worked with Dickson and

his Oregon friends, suggested they obtain acreage in the Bankline-Owens pool. And he helped them secure a lease on the Otto Chance farm, five miles northeast of Cisco.

Just before Christmas, they drilled the Kupp and Dickson No. 1 Otto Chance as a dry hole. And Dickson says he was known as "Dry Hole" Dickson back in Oregon during the holidays.

After the holidays, they decided that they would try again on the Kupp and Dickson lease. And the effort paid off, for today potential tests showed their No. 2 Otto Chance as capable of flowing some 600 barrels of oil a day through a 10-64 inch choke.

The hole is bottomed in the Lake sand and production is coming from 3,389-8 feet.

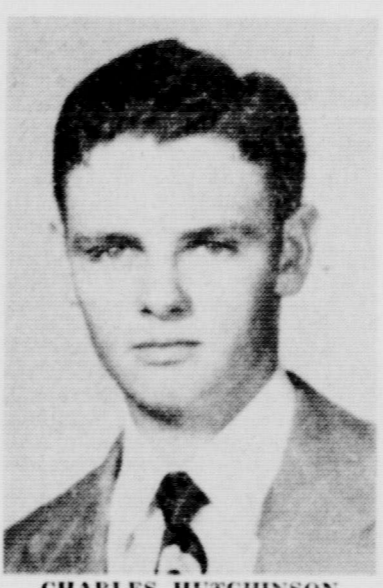
What is more and not hurting Dickson's social or financial standing, the Kupp and Dickson No. 3 Otto Chance hit the pay horizon late Thursday. It flowed in a drill stem test and tubing was run today.

The other Oregon friends of Dickson's are due to bring in a well today on the Sam Hart lease. It is the Gus Blumquist et al No. 1 Mrs. Sam Hart. The "et al" of the well are Dickson, Earl T. Moore, Emil G. Peterson and Frank F. Urban, Jr., all of Portland, Oregon.

The Blumquist No. 1 set pipe last week-end after a drill stem test in the Lake sand was good enough to assure them of a flowing well. Completion work was due to begin today to bring in another producer.

These Oregon men and others, including Ashby Dickson, Alfred Bimrose and Albert J. Bernard, have spent considerable money in Cisco in developing their leases. They make the Victor Hotel here the headquarters for their operations in the area.

## Be On Guard For 'Flu' When Cold Weather Strikes

AUSTIN, Feb. 22.—Cold weather and influenza go hand in hand, so the proverbial "ounce of prevention" is especially timely. Influenza has many of the signs and symptoms of a common cold, and may develop from a cold. The popular nickname for the disease is "flu," according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

The common symptoms of "flu" are well known. Fever at the onset, cough, and pains in the head, back and limbs have been experienced by many. This disease, which spreads rapidly, has a crippling effect on the community. Much time lost from school and work; therefore, its control is of economic and social as well as medical importance.

Since permanent immunity is not developed as the result of an attack of the disease, these epidemics continue to appear. Everyone is susceptible. The fact that this disease is highly contagious makes isolation and personal cleanliness of utmost importance in its prevention and control.

These suggestions should help: Keep up bodily resistance by eating well balanced meals and getting regular and adequate sleep; practice cleanliness; avoid using cups, glasses, dishes, or towels that have been used by anyone else, including family members.

A physician should be called when "flu" symptoms appear. The sick person should be isolated from others with the exception of the person acting as nurse. The "flu" victim should go to bed and stay there until his physician says he can return to usual activity.

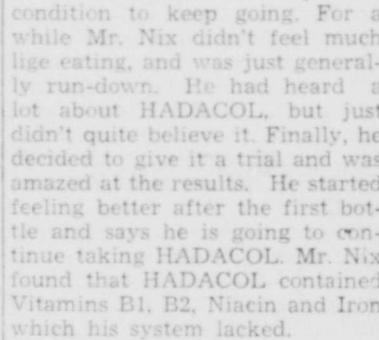

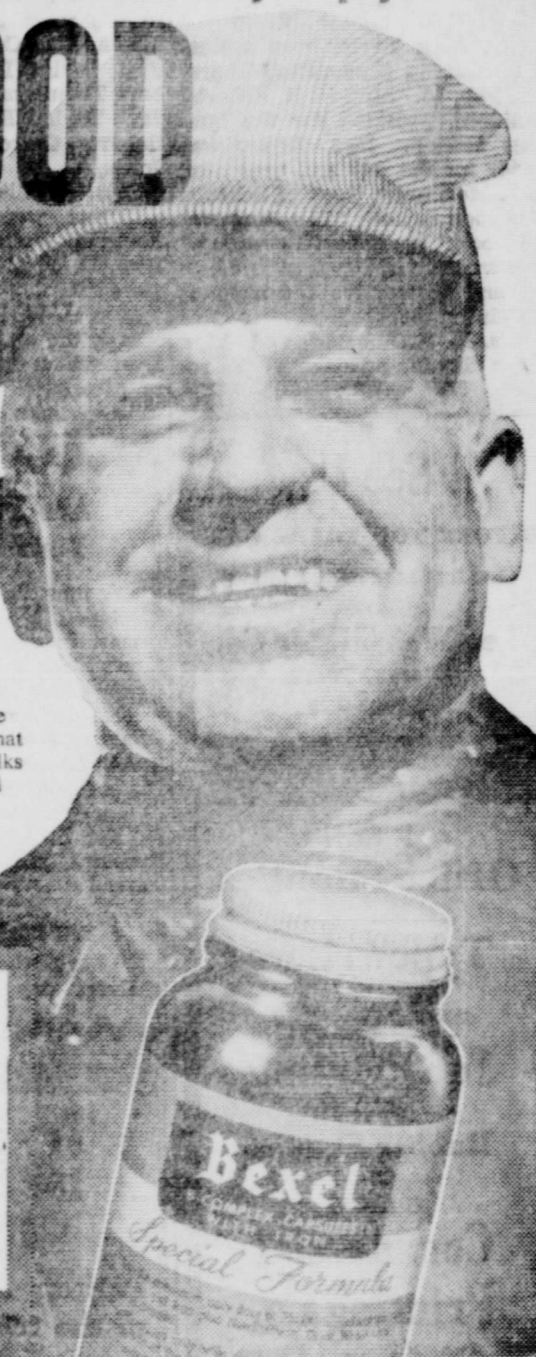
