Don Rupe Offers For Re-Election To City Council

City Commissioner Don Rupe announced Saturday that he has decided to permit his name to be offered for re-election as a member of the Cisco City Commission in the April 3 city election.

Addressed to the Citizens of Cisco, Mr. Rupe issued the following statement: "Because of solicitations of friends, I am placing my name on the ballot for reelection for city commissioner, and I want it understood that I am running as an independent candidate, strictly on my own merits and with no political axe to grind."

"I have no promises to make other than to offer my services to do my duty as a public servant as I see best."

"It has been a pleasure to try to serve you the past two years. I have always welcomed your suggestions and problems and if re-elected, I will continue to do so."

"Because of very limited finances, it has been impossible to make many of the improvements you wanted and needed. But with your ideas and help, I am sure we can and will improve our city, year by year."

"I am sure I have made mistakes as if you, as citizens, will stop and think, the City of Cisco's business is a big business and it is your responsibility to work with the men you elect for the city commission."

"And, I must add, it has been a pleasure to work with the mayor and all the commissioners the past two years. If re-elected, I will continue to work to the best of my ability and, in closing, I invite you to come set in on the commission meetings and bring your problems. The city's business is no secret and you are welcome."

Wilson of Ranger was in second place with 20. Bobby Travis sank 17 points for third place in the scoring race while Bobby John Huffmyer and Cooke of Ranger tied for fourth place with 11 points.

The Friday game ended the hot playoff series after Ranger and Cisco wound up the season in a tie. The play-off was thrown into a tie when the Wranglers won the second game in Ranger Thursday night after dropping the opener in Cisco Tuesday night.

The winners of the north, the south, east and west zones of the Texas Junior College Athletic Conference will play in the Denton tournament for the championship. The Wranglers will meet Henderson County Junior College in their opening game at 9:30 p. m. Monday night. They will leave Cisco Monday morning. Lon Morris and Howard County Junior College will open the tournament at 8 p. m. Monday.

The winners of the two tilts will meet Tuesday night for the conference championship while the losers will play for third and fourth places.

Two New Wells Planned In Area

A new oil test for the Cisco area is the Bert Fields No. 1 J. H. Kendrick, located five miles east of Cisco on Highway 80, according to reports here. Location is in the northwest corner of the Kendrick tract. A semi-wildcat, the test will seek production from deep formations. B. H. Gray Drilling Co., Cisco, has the contract.

Another new location for the Bankline-Owens pool five miles northeast of Cisco is the Savage Bros., et al, No. 2 D. B. Perdue, an offset to production. Location is 990 feet from the north and 330 feet from the east lines of the northwest quarter of Section 58, Block 4, H&TC Survey.

In the Owens pool, the Kupp and Dickson No. 3 Otto Chance flowed oil in six minutes late Friday in a Lake sand drill stem test. The hole was bottomed at 3,356 feet — six feet in the sand. Casing was set Friday night.

In the same area, the Bankline Oil Company's No. 4 C. E. Reynolds was completed with potential tests showing 131 barrels per day. Gas-oil ratio was 1,313 to one. The Bankline No. 2 C. E. Reynolds was drilling at 2,560 ft. Two miles north of Cisco, the Benson-Montin No. 1 E. B. Hayes was plugged and abandoned Friday after salt water appeared in tests.

Social Security Man Is Due Here

E. Glen McNatt, field representative of the Abilene office of the Social Security Administration, will be at the Chamber of Commerce in Cisco at 2 p. m. on Thursday, March 1.

Mr. McNatt calls attention to the provision in the new law for benefits to wives of retired workers who are now receiving old-age insurance payments. The wife of a present beneficiary who has in her care a child under 18 qualified for payments may now have monthly payments herself, regardless of her age.

In families where the retired worker and one or more children are now receiving payments, the wife should get in touch with the Social Security Administration and file her claim.

Re-Districting Measures Awaiting Final Action In State Legislature

AUSTIN, Feb. 24. — Speculation has been indulged in among Texas legislators as to when final action will be taken on bills for representative and senatorial redistricting.

bodies Eastland, Callahan, Stephens, Palo Pinto, Parker, Jack, Wise, Denton, Montague, and Clay counties.

Presently, the bill for rearrangement of senatorial districts awaits floor action in the House, after having been given a favorable committee vote. The measure for House redistricting is pending before a Senate committee.

It is well known that some House members, particularly those from East Texas, are not pleased with the representatives' bill. Some quarters believe that these representatives will try to obtain unfavorable senate action after their objections were overridden in the House.

It is also true that some Senators aren't exactly pleased, but have taken the bitter with the sweet and have gone along with the majority.

A situation is created that could be a stalemate in that the House doesn't want to act on the Senate bill before the Senate acts upon the House — a "you scratch my back and I'll scratch yours" state of affairs, with the 854 question being who will scratch who first. In any event, legislative problems eventually work out, and this is likely the way Eastland and surrounding counties will be affected.

The new Senatorial district em-

The district of which Eastland County now is a part is revised to include Dickens, Garza, Keny, Stonewall, Borden, Scurry, Fisher, Jones, Shackelford, Howard, Mitchell, Nolan and Taylor Counties.

The 16th District includes Coleman, Brown, Concho, McCulloch, Mills, San Saba, Lampasas, Menard, Mason, Llano, Burnet, Kimble, Gillespie, Kerr, Real and Bandera. The 12th District would be Erath, Hood, Somervell, Johnson, Ellis, Hill, Bosque, Comanche, Hamilton and Coryell.

As for Representatives' districts, Eastland, Callahan and Shackelford would compose the 75th District; Young, Stephens and Palo Pinto the 74th; San Saba, Lampasas, Llano, Burnet, Gillespie and McCulloch the 73rd; Comanche, Mills and Brown the 72nd; Jack, Wise and Parker the 71st; Coke, Runnels, Concho and Coleman the 70th; Baylor, Throckmorton, Knox and Haskell the 69th; Taylor the 68th, and Jones, King and Dickens the 64th. Each of these districts would receive one representative.

Navy Encourages Line Volunteers

NEW ORLEANS, Feb. 22—Navy volunteers for active duty in aviation and general line categories are now being encouraged by Eighth Naval District headquarters here.

Aviation ground officers, mostly lieutenants and below, qualified in CIC, air intelligence, law and personal administration are needed, the Navy said.

Naval reserve aviators released from active duty in the past 18 months and not currently attached to carrier or patrol organized squadrons, were also asked to volunteer for active duty involving flying. For both ground and flying officers, active duty application should be made to the Bureau of Naval Personnel through Eighth Naval District headquarters here.

At the same time the Navy lowered its educational qualifications on applicants for general line officer commissions in the naval reserve.

Physics requirements have been eliminated and mathematics reduced to trigonometry, which may have been taken in college or secondary school. The college degree requirement still stands, the Navy said, and still applies to earlier entrance rules to be met by applicants for naval reserve commissions. College students may apply for commissions 120 days before graduation.

BILL MURRAY HAS PLAYED BIG ROLE IN STATE CONSERVATION

(Special to The Press)
 AUSTIN, Feb. 24. — Texas Railroad Commissioner William (Bill) Murray, Jr., is a young fellow who has sacrificed personal gain to do something about conservation of the state's natural resources.
 It was the challenge to render physical and mental service rather than lip service that led him to accept the appointment to the Railroad Commission in January, 1947. And this was just when he was on the brink of stepping into private business that would have provided a handsome financial return — a return, in fact, that some of his friends recently shared in to the extent of about seven million dollars.
 "I don't have any regrets, though," Bill said, "because that is just part of life. And I feel sincerely that the gigantic task of conserving Texas great oil

and gas resources is a work in itself that helps all the people of the state." This adopted son of Cisco's will not recount willingly the important role he has played in keeping Texas and the nation's oil and gas industry in good shape. But official records reveal that he has done outstanding work since he first went with the Railroad Commission, beginning as an engineer, then chief enforcement officer and later as chief examiner in the oil and gas division.

Though not in uniformed military service, Bill Murray had a big part in this nation's defenses during World War II. Even prior to our entry into combat, Murray was Conservation and Reserves Engineer for the Petroleum Coordinator for National Defense for six states — the backbone of the nation's oil producing areas. After Pearl Harbor he worked to find greater yields of aviation gasoline, toluene, butadiene and other critical war materials. He served as chairman of the Gas Conservation Engineering Committee to study gas flaring and presented recommendations to stop this waste.

It was not without practical experience that Murray entered the state and national regulatory

fields. He did consulting and producing work for two years after receiving two degrees in petroleum engineering from the University of Texas. His was the highest number of grade points for an Engineering School student at Texas up to 1936.

But good grades weren't anything new to Bill. He was salutatorian of his Cisco High School graduating class, and when he attended Hardin-Simmon University at Abilene for two years he received the Minter Medal for the highest scholastic average.

It was at Cisco that Bill became interested in Boy Scouting. He was one of two Scouts in a four-state area that received the coveted Harmon Foundation scholarship his graduating year. Today he still has a devoted interest in Scouting and he is president of Capitol Area Boy Scout Council. Ironic is the fact that though Murray is an Eagle Scout and works in Scouting now his three children are all girls — Jo Ann, Marsha and Janice. Mrs. Murray is the former Miss Jo Newton of Burkett. Her parents now reside in Crane, Texas. Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Murray, Sr., live in Abilene.

Bill's Algerian life has taken on greater scope since his appointment to the Railroad Commission. He was considered as Director of the Oil and Gas Division, Department of Interior, in Washington, but turned down acceptance, this a conclusive indication in the minds of his many friends of his sincerity and zeal of purpose in doing his best for Texas.

In addition Bill has been a

member of the Stripper Well Committee of the Interstate Oil Compact Commission, chairman of the Emergency Fuel Commission in 1947, a member of the Committee of Laws and Ordinances of the Governor's Conference on Highway Safety Program, chairman of the Texas Petroleum Research Committee, nominated as one of the nation's 10 outstanding young men and, at present, is chairman of the Texas Railroad Commission and serving his first full six-year elective term.

But success has not come without hard work and tears for Bill Murray. His father once went broke in the ranching business, and he has followed oil booms which, in itself, was a taxing

life in Eastland, Corsicana, Mexico and Cisco. Then last September Bill and his family were involved in a near-fatal automobile accident. For three months he was a hospital patient and grave doubt for his recovery was expressed. His fine physical condition and grim determination helped win the battle and today his injuries have healed and he maintains a vigorous work schedule that is the envy of his associates.

There is a possibility in the distant future that Bill Murray will leave the state, service for which he has done so much. Right now, however, that is in his mind, despite the fact that it takes some wise household ec-




