Final Rites For H. D. Lanham To Be Held Friday

Grace Lutheran Church, the place where less than three weeks ago, funeral services were conducted for his six year old daughter, will be the scene of the final rites for Herman Dwight Lanham, 46, who died at his home on West 11th at 3 p. m. Wednesday following an illness of a week. The daughter, Linda, died on February 9 from burns.

The services will be conducted at 3 p. m. Friday by Rev. H. G. Lohmann, pastor of Grace Lutheran, who conducted rites for Mr. Lanham's daughter. Burial will be in Oakwood Cemetery with Thomas Funeral Home directing the arrangements.

Mr. Lanham, a painting and paperhanging contractor, had been a resident of Cisco all his life. He was born here on April 4, 1904. He was the son of the late James R. Lanham and Mrs. James R. Lanham who is now living in San Angelo. He was married to Miss Winona Scarlett in Cisco.

He is survived by his wife and mother, four daughters, Mrs. Jack Snyder of Corpus Christi, Ruth Lanham of Houston, Frances and Martha Lanham of Cisco and six sons, Dwight, James, Stephen, Dennis, Michael and Ralph, all living at home.

Also surviving are three grandchildren, a sister, Mrs. G. B. Murry of Corpus Christi and a brother, Charles Lanham of San Angelo.

Linda Lanham received fatal burns on February 7 when her clothing became ignited while standing in front of a room heater at the home of her parents. She died two days later in a local hospital.

Several oil wells were in the completion stage in the Cisco area today, a survey showed. Just east of Cisco, the E. C. Johnston No. 1 Johnston was setting pipe in the Ranger line after considerable gas showed during a drill stem test. Gas in lesser quantities was logged in Lake sand tests. Total depth of the hole was 3,640 feet.

In the Bankline - Owens field northeast of Cisco, the Bankline Oil Company's No. 2 C. E. Reynolds was drilling early today at 3,305 feet. Having topped the Lake sand, testing was underway. Although operators were assured of a well in the Lake, there was a possibility that it might be carried deeper.

Kupp and Dickson No. 3 Otto Chance was running tubing today. It flowed when drilled in and the operators were expected to run potential tests Saturday.

Nearby, the G. C. Blumquist et al No. 1 Mrs. Sam Hart has been completed in the Lake sand. It has a very high gas-oil ratio. Reports indicated that it will be an outstanding gas well and will make some oil. Potential tests had not been run.

The E. C. Johnston No. 1 John Hart, located in the same area, was running tubing today to be drilled in Friday.

Five miles east of Cisco near Highway 80, the Bert Fields No. 1 J. H. Kendrick was drilling below 1,500 feet in a semi-wildcat deep operation.

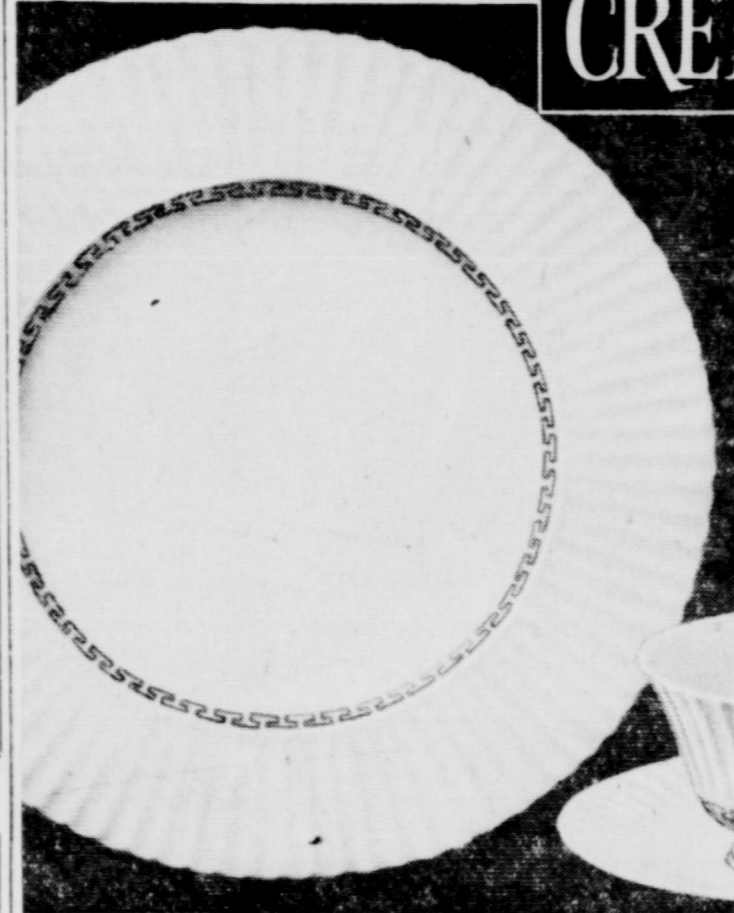
