WHO WOULD YOU guess is the owner of the most cars and trucks in Eastland County? The answer is the Lone Star Gas Company. Representatives of that firm dropped into Tax Collector Stanley Webb's office Thursday and bought 123 license plates for their vehicles based in this county. The Lone Star, you know, has a big gasoline plant at Ranger, its production department for Central Texas is located in the county, and it operates two plants northeast of Cisco.

Next biggest buyer of auto license plates in this county is the Premier Oil and Refining Company. The Premier has a big pipe line department in the county. In fact, Premier buys just about all of the oil produced in Eastland County. They register 52 cars.

ON THE SUBJECT of auto registration, we're told that some people register their cars in counties other than their home county. This, in theory helps when using parking meters without paying and it sometimes keeps the owners from paying property taxes on their cars. This doesn't worry county officials of the various counties, however, for the score is usually equalized. By this, we mean that there will be as many out-of-county cars registered in Eastland County as there are Eastland County cars registered elsewhere.

## MEANING OF EDUCATION GIVEN BY SPEAKER AT ROTARY MEET

## Cattle Raisers Meeting Set For March 12 to 14

DALLAS, March 9. — When Texas author and newspaperman, in an article in the March 1 issue of The Cattleman, official organ of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association, recalls the era when early-day cowmen frequented the Crutchfield House in Dallas to shoot the breeze and dine on buffalo tongue, venison and wild duck.

The old Shawnee Trail, which preceded the Chisholm Trail, led northward through Dallas all through the 1850's, Gard relates. It crossed the Red River at Preston and went along the eastern edge of the Indian Territory, through Fort Gibson. At Baxter Springs, Kansas, it divided into several branches that led to Sedalia, Kansas City and Nebraska points.

Trail herds were a common sight in Dallas in that decade. "Several large droves of cattle have passed through this place during the present season," noted a Dallas newspaper in June, 1850. "They are brought mostly from the upper Brazos and carried to Missouri, to be sold for beef or to furnish teams for California emigrants." soon the driving of Longhorns up this trail became a lucrative trade.

In 1854, reported the Texas State Gazette, about fifty thousand cattle crossed the Red River at Preston on their way to northern markets. The growing tension over slavery seemed to have little effect on this movement.

Soon after the War between the States, the Shawnee Trail had to be abandoned. The farmer's frontier was pushing westward, and stockmen in eastern Kansas and western Missouri were concerned over the infection of their cattle with tick fever, which they called Texas fever.

## Large Crowd Attends Open Forum Meeting At Masonic Temple

The Public School Week program in Cisco will end at 7 p. m. Friday with an address at the Junior college auditorium by Dr. D. D. Tidwell of Howard Payne College, Brownwood, and the general public has been invited to attend the event.

A large crowd attended the open forum event Thursday night at the Masonic Temple. Secretary Clyde Karkalits of the school board served as master of ceremonies and officials of the schools, including Superintendent Arlin Birt of the city schools, President O. L. ### EAST CISCO BAPTISTS PLAN TO FINISH BUILDING WITH STUCCO

Plans were under way this week for the completion of the exterior of the East Cisco Baptist Church.

In services last Sunday, the congregation voted unanimously to finish the exterior of the building with white stucco instead of brick as previously planned. It was also urged that every member and friend of the church make a special offering for this purpose by Easter Sunday, March 25.

Total cost of finishing the exterior of the building was expected to be approximately \$2,500. Church officers anticipate raising the entire amount before the project is completed.

The new building, which replaces the building that was destroyed by fire over a year ago, will accommodate some 500 attendants when completed.

Marshall Ivie, Sunday School superintendent at the East Cisco church, said today that every class would be asked to set a definite goal in building fund giving to be reached by the last Sunday in March.

Don Rupe, chairman of the Building Committee; H. H. Harreison, chairman of the Building Finance Committee; J. D. Hall, chairman of the Board of Deacons; J. E. Whisenant, president of the Brotherhood; and Paul Stephens, pastor, have requested that all members of the congregation give as much as possible as soon as possible so that the exterior of the building can be completed at once.

The pastor said, "This may mean that there will not be very many new Easter bonnets and Spring clothes seen at the East Cisco Baptist Church on Easter morning, but if we can finish the outside of our building in the next couple of months it will be worth every sacrifice."

## NEW PRICE REGULATIONS WILL HAVE EFFECT ON MOST STORES

Most retailers are effected by the Ceiling Price Regulation 7, which is the first of a series of retail orders designed to replace the freeze order of January 26th, according to Mrs. Lucille Huffmeyer, manager of Merchants Credit Association.

It is absolutely essential, she says that any retailer who is covered by this order should obtain a copy of the order and regulations and study them carefully. A supply is on hand at the Chamber of Commerce. Any other information needed can be had by writing the Price Stabilization Office, 2914 Lancaster, Fort Worth. Ellis H. Boyd is the manager in charge of Region 10, District 6, which will be the district under which Cisco merchants will be regulated at the above Fort Worth address.

Mrs. Huffmeyer briefly listed some of the more important provisions of the order:

1. Retailers are required to immediately begin preparation of their pricing charts which must be completed, filed at, and acknowledged by the District OPS office and in use by March 29. The only exception for these requirements concerns mail order establishments, etc. (Sec. 5b).
2. The mechanics of chart preparation are to be found in Sections 13-22 inclusive. The mechanics of pricing are to be found in Sections 30-35 inclusive. Provisions for stores unable to use the pricing rules in Sections 30-38 are to be found in Section 39.
3. Ceiling prices determined under this regulation are exclusive of tax. Sales or use taxes may be charged or collected on delivery, but must be stated separately.
4. After July 1, 1951, all articles priced under this regulation must be marked or tagged with the selling price. Prices may be marked on a bin or rack, or may be shown by individual price tags.
5. In addition after July 1, 1951, each seller must post a notice which is clearly visible in the store, stating that the prices of merchandise in the store are no higher than OPS ceiling price.
6. Record keeping requirements in Sections 52 and 53 should be carefully studied. They include the preservation of all records, invoices, work sheets and other material used in establishing the pricing chart. They also contain a provision for maintaining quarterly records of initial markup beginning with the four quarters immediately preceding the Korean attack.

House Sets Hearing For Monday On Bill To Regulate Highway Building

AUSTIN, March 9.—No plans for systematized rural road program can be set up with any assurance they will be carried out unless responsibility and authority is centered in one state agency, Rep. Callan Graham of Junction said today in announcing that

hearings on H. B. 226 (farm-to-market roads) have been set for next Monday, March 11.

Calling for a revision of the methods of both construction and financing in order to establish a 'sustained, self-financed rural roads program,' Rep. Graham said that authority and responsibility for building such roads should be given to the State Highway Department and that they should be paid for out of the gasoline tax.

Under the present system, the highway department and the county commissioners courts each have jurisdiction over parts of the program. The roads are paid for out of both gasoline tax and general revenue funds.

'Passage of H. B. 226 result in a guaranteed extension of farm-to-market roads in place of the hit-or-miss system,' Rep. Graham said. 'As matters now stand, we can only be sure that the highway department is actually building rural roads with the appropriations. Last year, the county judges and commissioners courts received cash grants totaling \$3,500,000 for rural road purposes. No reports on what they constructed with this money have

been made available to the legislature.

Rep. Graham, who introduced the bill and is chairman of the House State Affairs Committee which will hold the hearings, said that H. B. 226 would:

- 1. Guarantee substantial yearly increases to the farm-to-market road program without materially reducing the amount of money available under the current program;
2. Continue state payments on bonds for county roads which have been incorporated into the state highway system;
3. Deposit all of the gasoline tax surplus after payment of these old bonds to the credit of the counties in a state highway department fund (the 1951 surplus will be \$16,500,000 and will rise yearly);
4. Let each county decide whether the highway department shall use its credits to pay off its own old county road debts, build new roads for it, or both;
5. Let counties now paying off the road bonds from their present share of the gasoline tax surplus continue to do so, but at the same time give them a further credit

for construction equal to or greater than their entire present surplus share;

6. Eliminate cash grants to the counties, and replace them with rural road construction credits in the highway department of at least double present cash grants.

7. Repeal the annual \$15,000,000 drain from the general revenue fund for rural roads and finance them from the gasoline tax.

Rep. Graham said that H. B. 226 provides that money can be spent in each county only for roads recommended by its commissioners court.

 1/4 teaspoon dry mustard  
 few grains pepper
