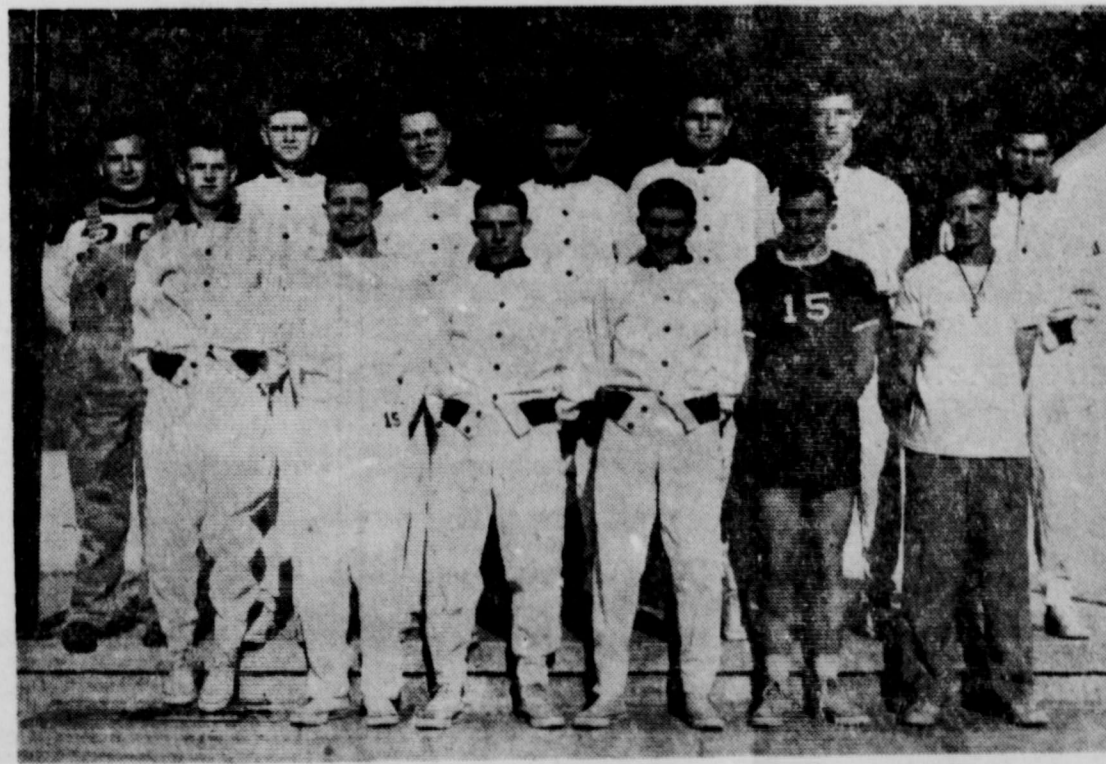

Lions Reported By Rail Workers In Putnam Area

Residents of the Putnam area have declared "open season" on lions and hunting parties flocked to a point about two miles west of Putnam where two large Mexican lions were reportedly seen last week.

The Texas & Pacific section crew saw a big lion resting between the rails, when they rode near him in their motor car early Monday morning. They stopped the car and watched the lion get up and leisurely trot away to the south side of the railroad tracks.

Another lion was seen to descend from its resting place in the brush and both of them disappeared in the rough country.

Ranchmen of the area formed hunting parties with dogs and searched for the lions all the past week. More than a hundred men have been in the groups of hunters, but no favorable reports have been received of their capture.

Those who saw the lions described them as being big and like those seen in zoos and circuses. No animal shows have been appearing in the territory in some time, and where the lions came from is a mystery.

Residents of the county were somewhat disturbed at the reports of lions roaming the hills at large, and every effort was being made by hunters to find the beasts and put a stop to the suspense, it was reported.

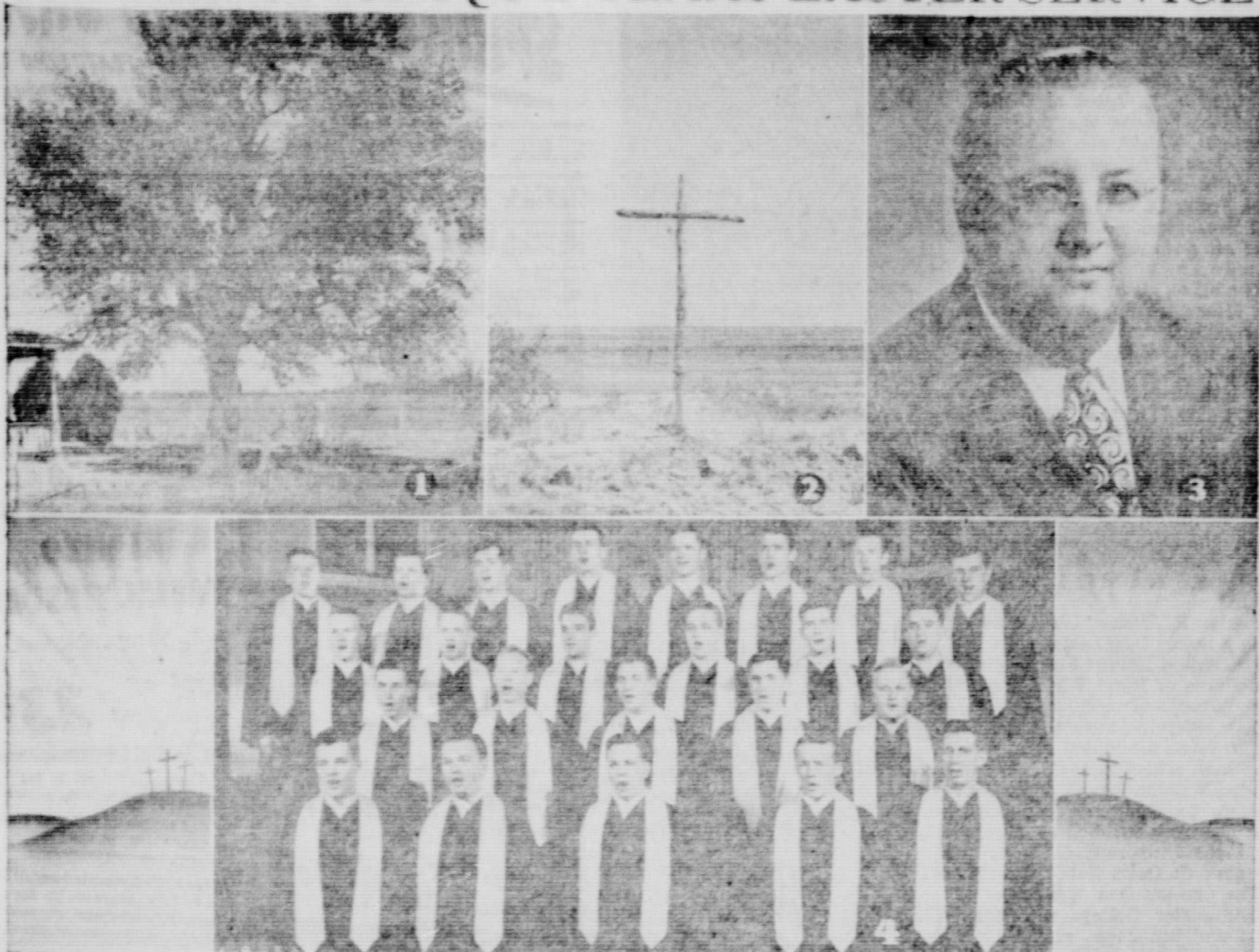

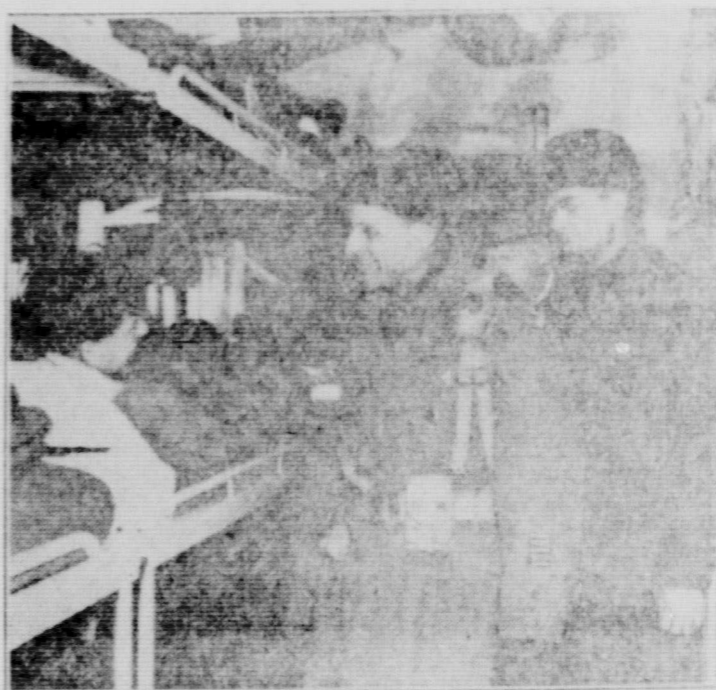

2,000 ARMY DENTISTS WITH BEST EQUIPMENT MEET WAR'S DEMANDS

The U. S. Army Dental Corps will celebrate its 40th anniversary on March 3, 1951, observing the authorization by Congress in 1911 of the Corps as a part of the Medical Department of the Army. Ten years earlier, however, Congress authorized the Army to appoint 30 contract dental surgeons, but as early as 1864 dentists were conscripted for service in the Confederate forces.

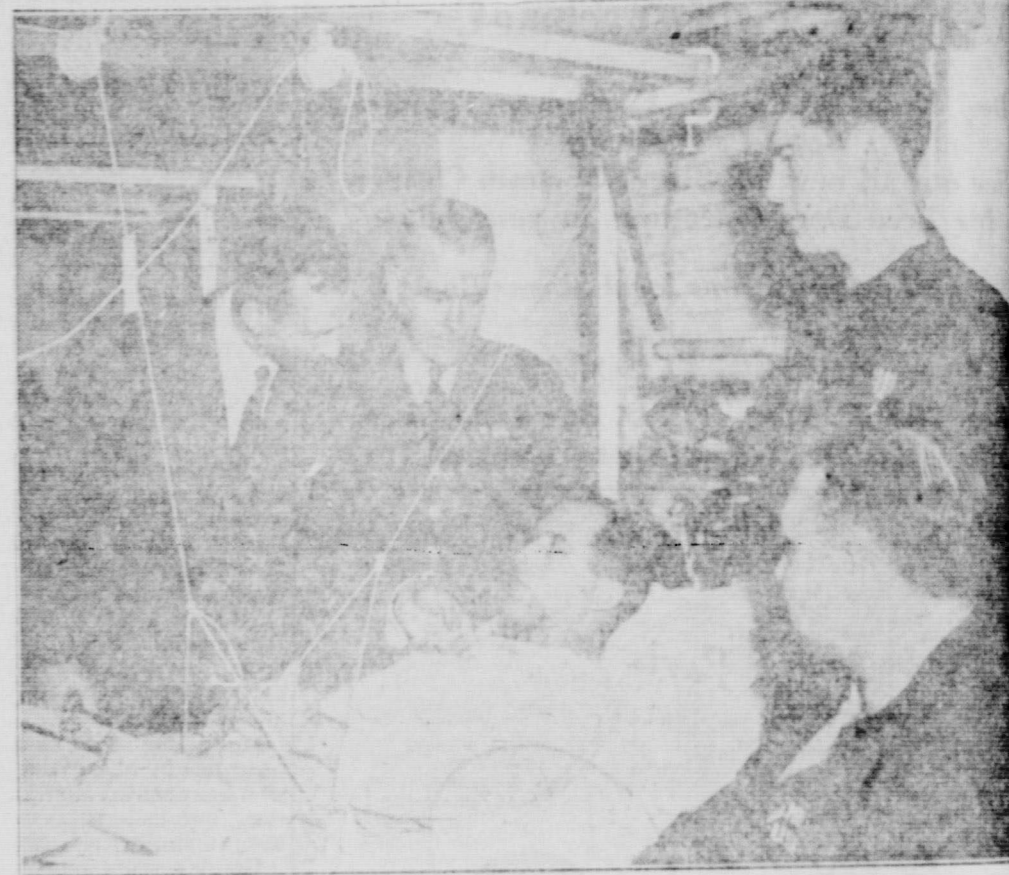
Of the 30 original contract dental surgeons appointed by the Army in 1911, seven are living. These men were accorded the privileges of officers and wore the Army uniform but held no rank until 1911, when the establishment of the Dental Corps created for them the rank of first lieutenant. Shortly after the start of the first World War, officers of the Corps were granted all rights and privileges as well as commensurate rank with that of the Medical Corps.

Chief of the Corps is Major General Walter D. Love, who was appointed to the post April 20, 1950. Approximately 2,000 dentists are administering dental care in over 200 dental clinics in the United States and overseas theaters.

The largest number of dental officers on duty at any time during World War I was 4,620, November 30, 1918. The peak strength reached during World War II was in November, 1944, when 15,292 officers were on duty.

The development of dental equipment for use in the field has always been a responsibility of the military services, since this type of equipment is not required in civilian practice. Facilities for performing dental work with mobile tactical units in a combat area have recently been developed to where, with three field dental chests, an officer can put in fillings, make dentures, perform oral surgery—in fact, anything he would be called upon to do in private practice. This equipment permits dental casualties to be treated within a division area or combat zone.

FIRST PRESENTATION OF KOREAN SERVICE RIBBONS

The soldiers honored, representing the Army's armor, artillery and infantry branches, are 1st Lieut. Howard W. Cardozo (right, seated), of Greenville, Pa., holder of the Distinguished Service Cross, who served with the 70th Tank Battalion, 1st Cavalry Division; M/Sgt. Andy Partin (reclining), of Clearfield, Tenn., awarded the Silver Star for heroism in Korea, a member of the Infantry Division, and Pfc. Francis Phillips, of Ashley, Pa., Silver Star winner, serving as a forward artillery observer when wounded.

Secretary Pace said the awards represented service credit "for the military effort in Korea which helped protect men's freedom everywhere from enslavement and tyranny." General Collins said the records made by the recipients typified the coordinated teamwork being evidenced on Korean battlefields.

The Korean Service Ribbon is of blue with narrow vertical white stripes at either end and a broad vertical white stripe in the center. To meet requirements for the award, service must have been performed between June 27, 1950, and a terminal date to be announced later.

MARINE CORPS HISTORY IN PARAGRAPHS

Upon the establishment of the Marine Corps by Congressional action November 10, 1775, General Samuel Nicholas was ordered to recruit two battalions of Marines.

The first U. S. Marine unit was the detachment on the "Cato," December, 1775, part of the naval squadron of Commodore Esek Hopkins.

First American Marines in European waters during the Revolution were those aboard the "Hornet" which took Benjamin Franklin to France in 1776 and later captured several British prizes.

U. S. Marines were with Paul Jones on September 23, 1779, when he uttered the famous declaration, "I have not yet begun to fight."

Lawrence Washington, a brother of General George Washington, was a Marine officer.

As early as 1740, three Continental Marine regiments were recruited in America, assembled in New York under the command of General Alexander Spotswood, Virginia, and performed service in the West Indies for the Royal British Navy.

The resolution of the Continental Congress in 1775, which authorized the original two battalions of Marines, further specified that personnel selected be "good men or so acquainted with maritime affairs as to be able to serve to advantage at sea."

The first Marine Corps recruiting station was Tun Tavern, Philadelphia.

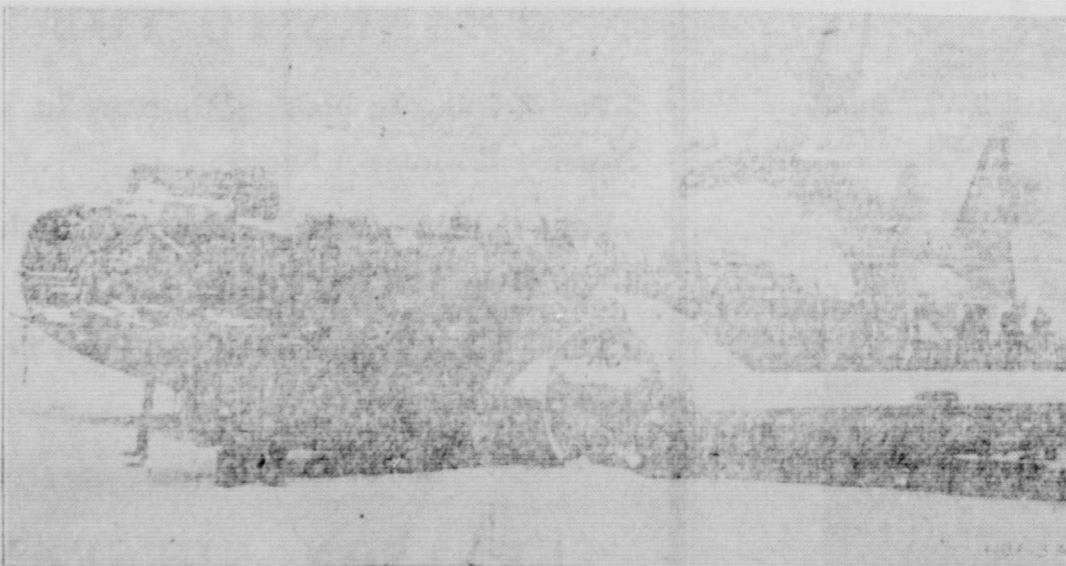

The first amphibious landing made by Continental Marines was the capture of Fort Mifflin on the island of New Providence in the Bahamas, in March 1776.

Enlisted men in the Continental Marines of 1775 and 1783 wore green coats, green shirts, breeches of light-colored cloth.
