WITH THE 27th FIGHTER-ESORT WING IN JAPAN, March 11—Private First Class Jerred J. Smith, son of Mrs. C. P. Farmer, Box 943, Desdemona, is now serving in Japan with the 27th Station Medical Group.

Pfc. Smith's unit is a part of the 27th Fighter-Escort Wing—these pilots have become known as the "MIG-MASTERS" as a result of recent successful aerial encounters against the well-known enemy jet fighters. The 27th pilots are still presently engaged in aerial combat against Communist aggressors in Korea.

They have been responsible for destroying countless numbers of enemy troops, defense and resources.

PAVING FIRM SETS UP OFFICE HERE TO BEGIN PROJECT WORK

The Montgomery Paving Co. of Lubbock has set up offices in the city hall in Cisco and has begun work preparatory to a street paving campaign scheduled to get under way here soon.

C. E. Montgomery is in charge of the local office and will bring two additional office employees and salesmen to Cisco for the work. The company was awarded the paving privileges at a recent meeting of the city commission.

Mr. Montgomery invited inquiries at his office, in the city hall or by telephone. The office can be reached by telephone number 1104.

The company representative stated that financing arrangements had been worked out where by home owners can finance the work on a one, two or three year basis. Present credit requirements call for a 33 1-3 per cent down payment on the work. The work will be done according to highway department specifications.

Paving costs will run \$1.45 per linear foot on 20 foot streets per each side of the street. Cost per foot on 22 ft. streets will run \$1.50 per linear foot. Curb and gutter costs will run an estimated \$1.45 per foot.

Purebred Herds To Be Inspected

The route of the annual spring livestock tour by the Eastland County Livestock Raisers Association next Saturday, March 17, has been designated, according to Judge M. S. Long, Eastland, president of the organization.

Civil Service To Hold Job Exams

The United States Civil Service Commission today announced the following examinations: Office Machine Operator and Office Machine Trainee; Lithographic Offset Pressman and Foreman; and Radio Engineer.

The salaries for the various Office Machine Operator positions range from \$2,200 to \$3,825 a year; the Trainee jobs pay \$2,200 and \$2,400 a year. The jobs are located in Washington, D. C., and vicinity. To qualify, Machine Operator jobs, some appropriate experience is required.

The positions to be filled from the Lithographic Offset Pressman Foreman examination pay \$1,275 to \$2,350 an hour and are in the Government Printing Office and various other Federal agencies in Washington, D. C., and vicinity. To qualify, applicants must have had from 1 to 5 years of appropriate experience, which may have included apprenticeship training. The amount of experience required depends on the salary level of the position. No written test is required.

The Radio Engineer examination will be used to fill positions in the Federal Communications Commission in Washington, D. C., and throughout the United States, its Territories and Possessions. The salaries are \$3,100 and \$3,825 a year. To qualify, applicants must pass a written test and, in addition, must have had appropriate college training or technical experience or both. Applicants for the \$3,825 positions must have had an additional year of graduate study or of professional experience in radio engineering.

The age limits for Radio Engineer positions in grade GS-5 (\$3,100 a year) are from 18 to 35 years; for other positions mentioned, from 18 to 62. Age limits are waived for persons entitled to veteran preference. Applications for Office Machine positions will be accepted in the United States Civil Service Commission, Washington 25, D. C., until April 24; for Radio Engineer, until April 3; and for Lithographic Offset Pressman, until further notice.

Further information and application forms may be obtained from the Commission's Local Secretary, Sam B. King, at the Cisco Post Office.

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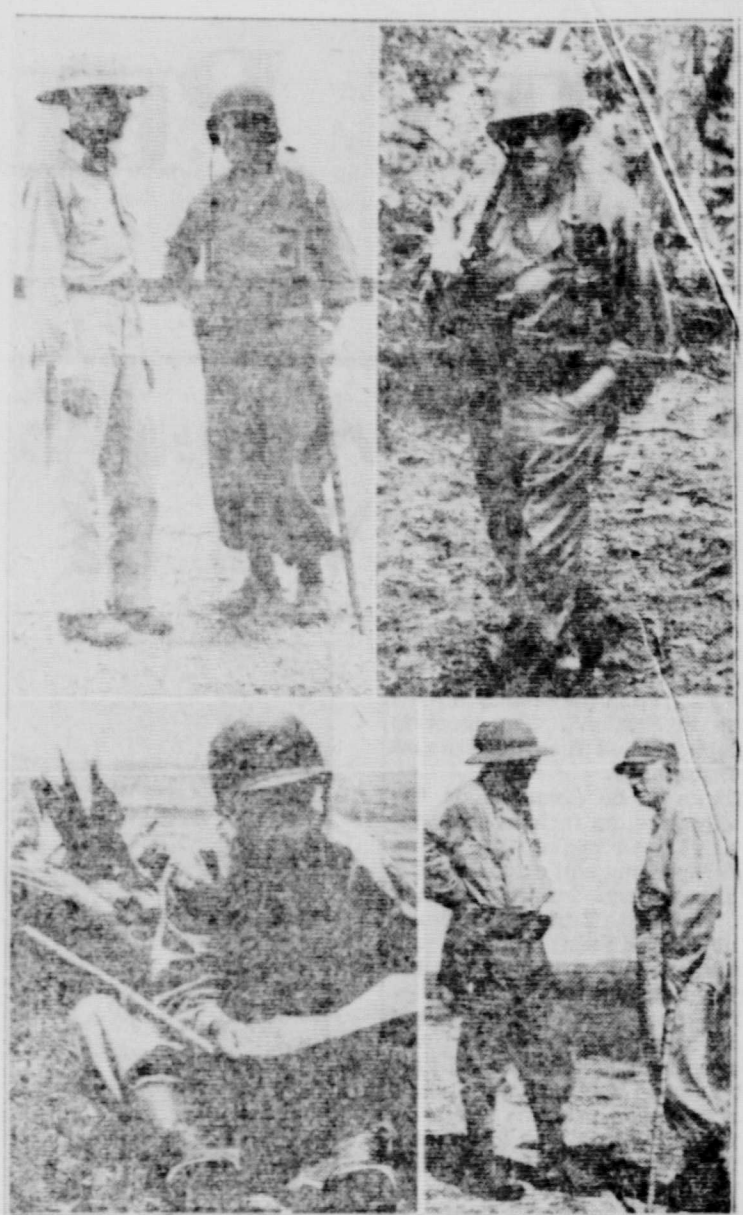

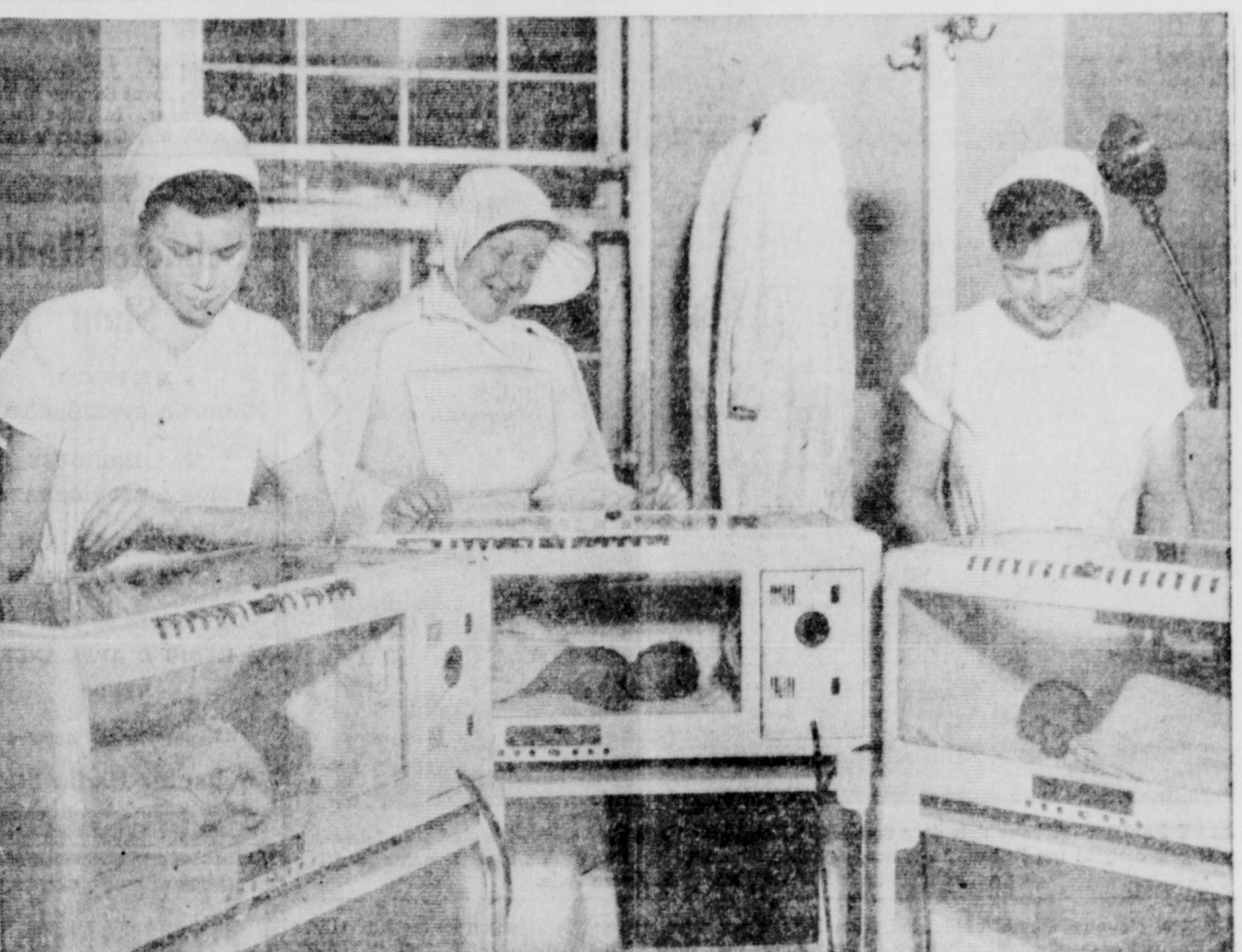
Both the bride and groom attended Cisco High School. The bride was a graduate of the 1950 class and has attended Bethany Peniel College.

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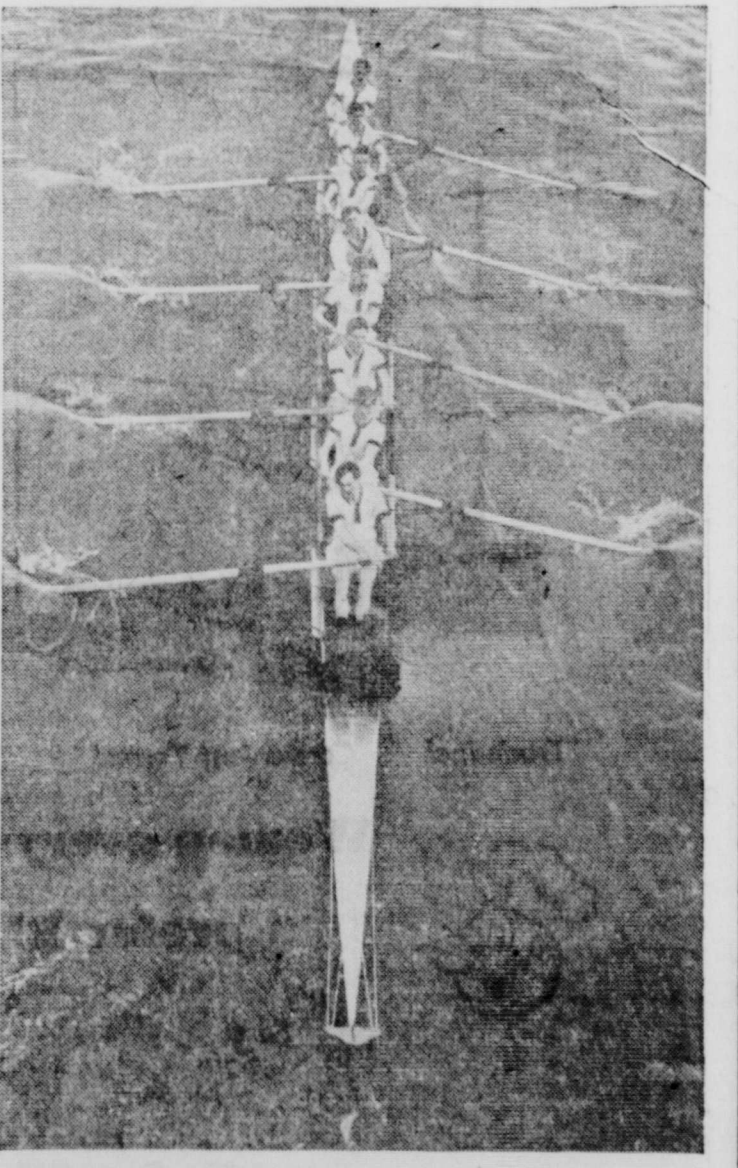

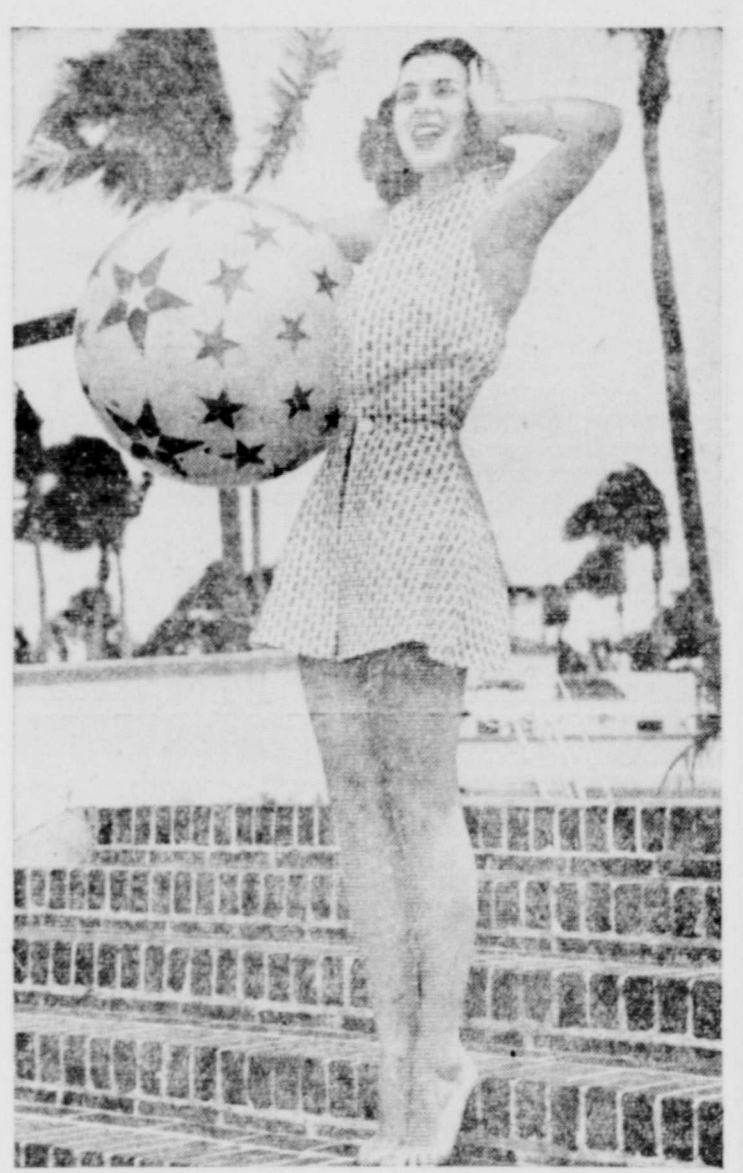
