## Bankline Company Is Given 7 Permits

Drilling permits for eight new wells in the Bankline-Owens oil pool, five miles northwest of Cisco, had been granted today by the Texas Railroad Commission. Seven of the permits went to the Bankline Oil Company, and the other went to O. D. (Pinky) Alsbrook.

The Bankline company, with 22 wells in the pool, received seven permits to drill 4,000-foot holes in Section 49, Block 4, H&TC Survey. The new wells will be as follows:

Bankline No. 9 A. V. Clark, 330 feet from the north and 1,980 feet from the west lines of the section.  
Bankline No. 12 Clark, 520 feet from the north and 1,460 feet from the east lines of the south half of Section 49.  
Bankline No. 13 Clark, 2,210 feet from the south and 527 feet from the east line.  
Bankline No. 3 J. H. Reynolds, 1,360 feet from the east and 660 feet from the south lines of the northwest quarter of Section 49.  
Bankline No. 6 J. H. Reynolds, 1,565 feet from the south and 433 feet from the east lines of the northwest quarter of the section.  
Bankline No. 7 C. E. Reynolds, 2,302 feet from the east line and on the north line of Section 49.  
Bankline No. 8 C. E. Reynolds, 1,369 feet from the east and on the north line of the section.  
The Alsbrook well is the No. 2 D. B. Perdue, a 3,500-foot rotary test located 1,010 feet from the east and 2,355 feet from the south lines of Section 58, Block 4, H&TC Survey.

Another new test for the county is the W. H. Keasler Oil Co. of Sikeston, Mo., No. 1 Robert L. Cantrell, 330 feet from the south and west lines of a 120 acre lease in the northwest part of the F. Harms Survey. Location is some four miles northwest of Ranger along the Eastland-Stephens Co. line.

Bankline Oil Company's No. 5 C. E. Reynolds was drilling at 3,352 feet in shale early today, expecting to top the Lake Sand at any time. It was understood that this hole would be carried to the Duffer line.

A mile north of Cisco, the Big Six Oil Company's No. 1 B. W. Martin was drilling at 2,700 feet today.

Hickok Producing and Development Company's No. 2 Silas Hill, located two miles southeast of Cisco, was awaiting the granting of a permit to spud in.

The noted preacher, who is president of the North Western Schools, Minneapolis, Minn., will speak in Hardin-Simmons university's Rose Field House, Friday morning at 11 a. m.

In the Fort Worth meetings, held in the Will Rogers Coliseum, attendance has averaged more than 11,000, and last Sunday, the services were attended by more than 15,000 people.

Last week, the poem was read at a local club meeting and numerous requests were made for copies. The poem is reprinted as follows: The Spirit of Texas The "Empire of Texas" tradition relates.

The spirit of Texas: Let's honor it then, Because it ennobles our women and man, No greater love ever has any man known Than that which our heroes of Texas have shown For freedom of Texas and Liberty's cause, Our great institution, traditions and laws With character stalwart and purposes true, They builded far better than ever they knew

The cowboy, the statesman — the greatest and least— Must stand on one level, and act on the square; Must fight, if there needs be, must do and must dare, The "Spirit of Texas" means justice to all; Imbued with this Spirit, no nation can fall. So glorify Texas and honor its name— The "Spirit of Texas," let Texans proclaim!

This Spirit led Crockett of Alamo fame, Who died for our freedom. We honor his name. This spirit has hallowed our blue Southern skies; Has welded our people with true, sacred ties; And out in the spaces where bluebonnets grow, On mountains, in valleys—wherever you go— You find this great Spirit in Texas from birth, Which makes them our heroes—the salt of the earth.

The glory of Athens, the pride of all Greece, Its culture and triumphs in war and in peace, Though founded on justice and Liberty's creed, Were ruined by selfish and tyrannous greed. Her glory in ruins, by selfishness wrought, Is food for all Texans' most serious thought. This "Spirit of Texas" all systems indicts, Which value the dollar above human rights.

No armies could conquer the legions of Rome When Romans were fighting for honor and home; But Rome became greedy for power and wealth, And avarice weakened her national health; Then crime and corruption, the fruit of all greed, Soon followed in sequence, as corn from the seed. 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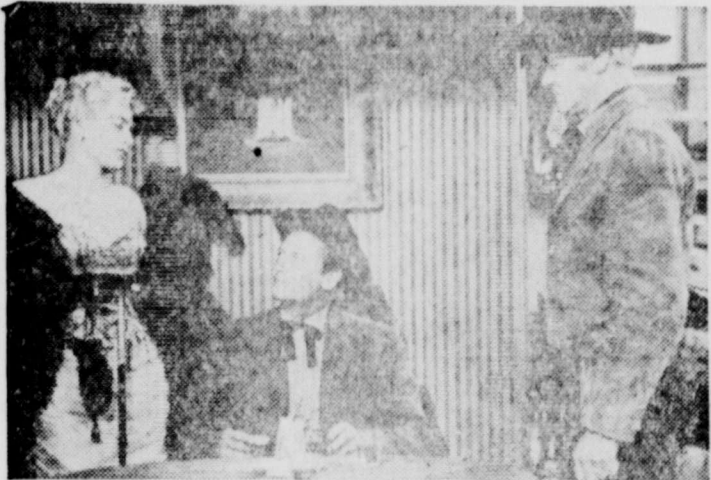

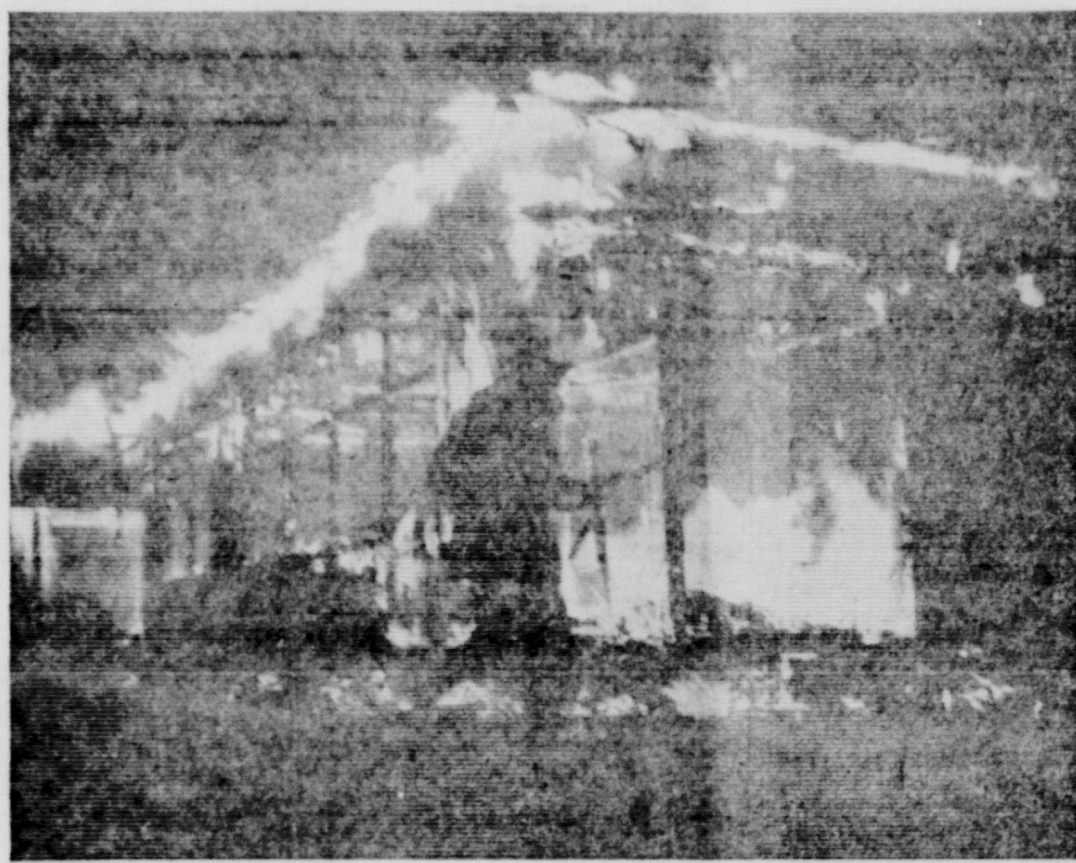

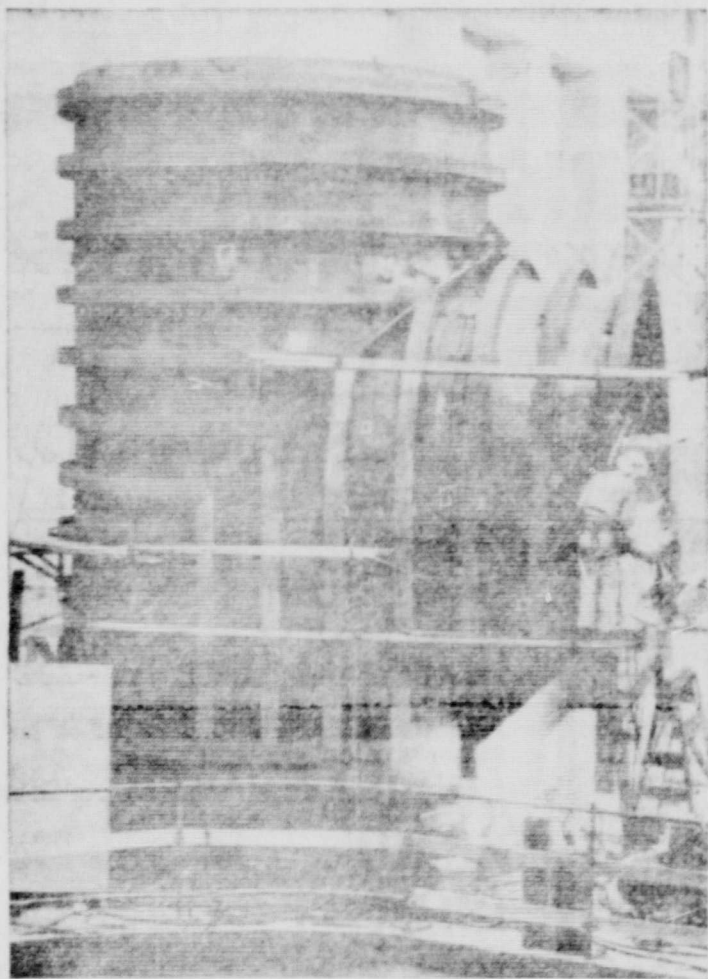

IN PARAGRAPHS**

U. S. Army engineer mobile map makers in Korea are equipped to roll trucks to virtually any area and make maps to order in a matter of hours.

Eight sergeants of the U. S. Army 24th Infantry Division received battlefield commissions as second lieutenants during January.

First Thailand Korea casualties evacuated home left Tokyo January 11 aboard a U. S. Military Transport Service aircraft.

Song books containing hymns in English and Korean have been distributed in Korea by the U. S. Army to American and Korean Christian soldiers.

More than 30,000 landings have been made on the carrier USS Leyte since it became part of the United Nations Naval Forces in Korean waters.

The first Turkish soldiers wounded in Korea to be sent home were taken from Japan in January by British Royal Air Force aircraft ambulances.

More than 2,000 flights over enemy areas have been made by pilots of the U. S. Army 1st Cavalry Division Artillery's light aviation section in Korea.

A trophy honoring Army boxing champion Cpl. Levi Jackson, a Negro soldier killed in Korea, has been established in the Far East Command.

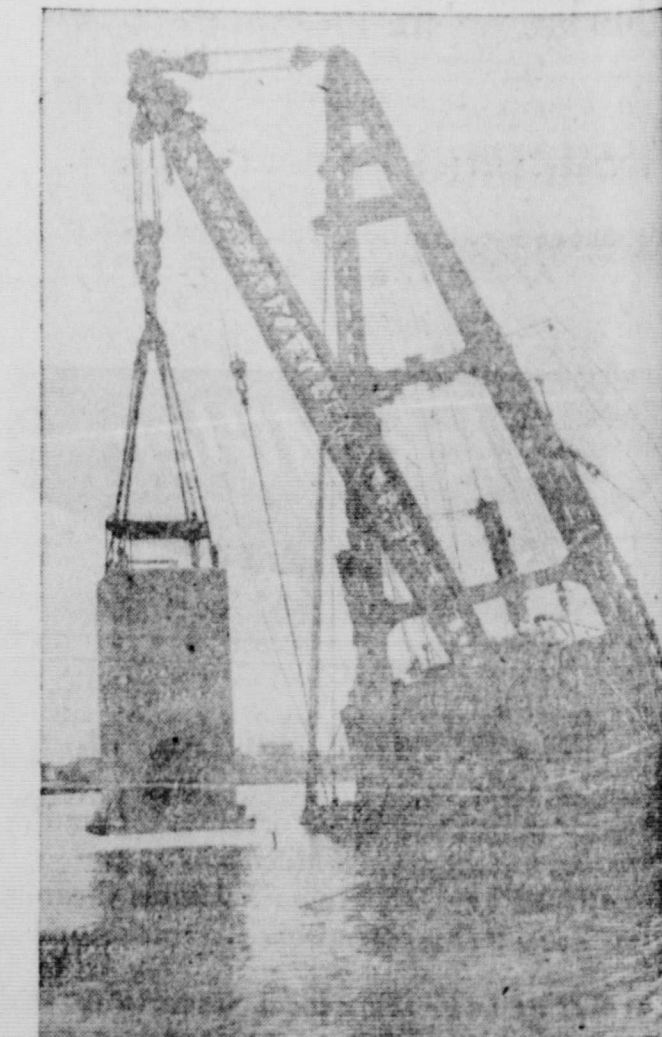
A type of deer with tusklike fangs about three inches long has been found in the Korean mountains by U. S. Army soldiers.

Heart Ailments  
No Longer Spell  
Doom, Cox Says

AUSTIN, March 15.—Too prevalent today is the belief that heart disease is the spell of doom and that one must cease all work and activity. Modern medical knowledge easily disproves this notion, and thousands of case histories bear witness to its falsity.

Heart disease, medical science now knows, is not a single ailment. Many troubles can afflict the heart — some less serious than others. While some restrictions are necessary, it is now generally true that patients with any form of heart trouble should be active within the limits of their capacity.

Not all persons with heart ailments can continue working at their same pace. Obviously there are those who require bed rest and often a very strict limitation of physical and mental activity. But there are many who can continue working, performing some type of useful or productive activity, without fear that their hearts will suddenly give out.

A person with a mild heart disorder can in most instances per-

form any kind of job for which his skills qualify him.

No individual with a heart condition, it should be cautioned, should determine for himself whether he is able to work or not and how much work he can do.

Just as there are many who become cardiac invalids because of fear, there are those at the opposite extreme who ignore proper medical advice and subject their hearts to unnecessary strain and abuse by overactivity. Only a competent physician is qualified to say what are the limits of an impaired heart.

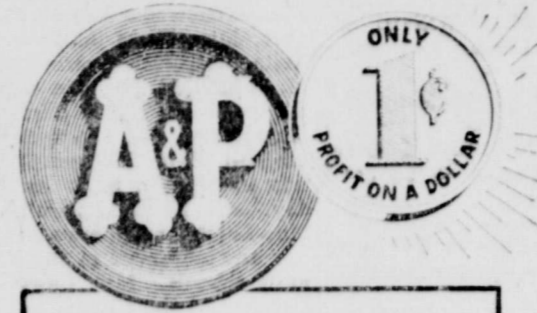

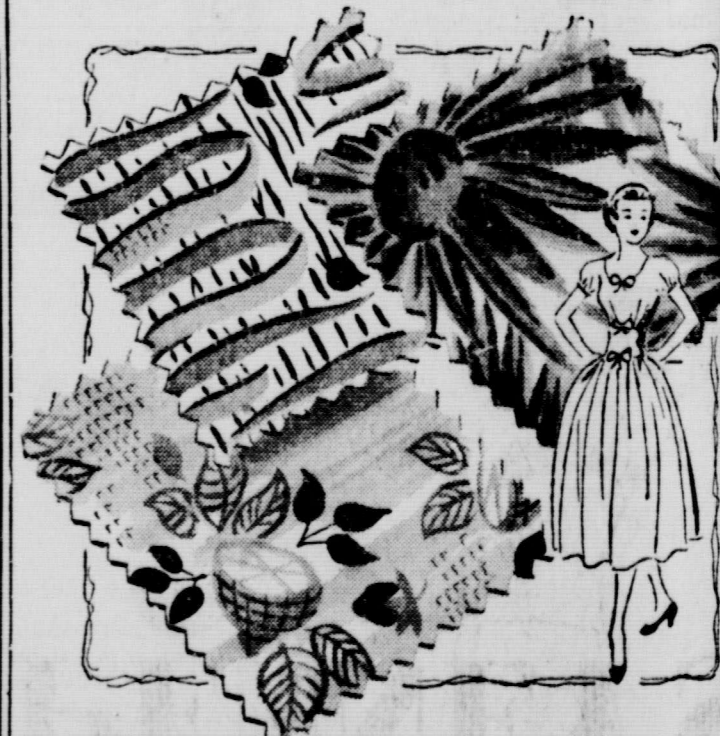
