Mr. A. Z. Myrick, the local dairyman who has done a lot in furthering the movement in the county, sold three Jersey heifers the other day. These heifers came from artificially bred cows. And they sold for \$100 each, and they were between two and three months old.

MR. HICKSON told us about a cow named Daisy Madcap that has just broken the world record for butterfat production. She produced 34,553 pounds of milk, testing 4.1 per cent and 1,413.6 pounds of butterfat. This is the equivalent to 1,767 pounds of butter and 16,071 quarts of milk every year.

What is interesting about it is the fact that this cow's full brother was used in the local artificial breeding program until his recent death. Eastland County dairymen are still using two of this cow's half-brothers in their program.

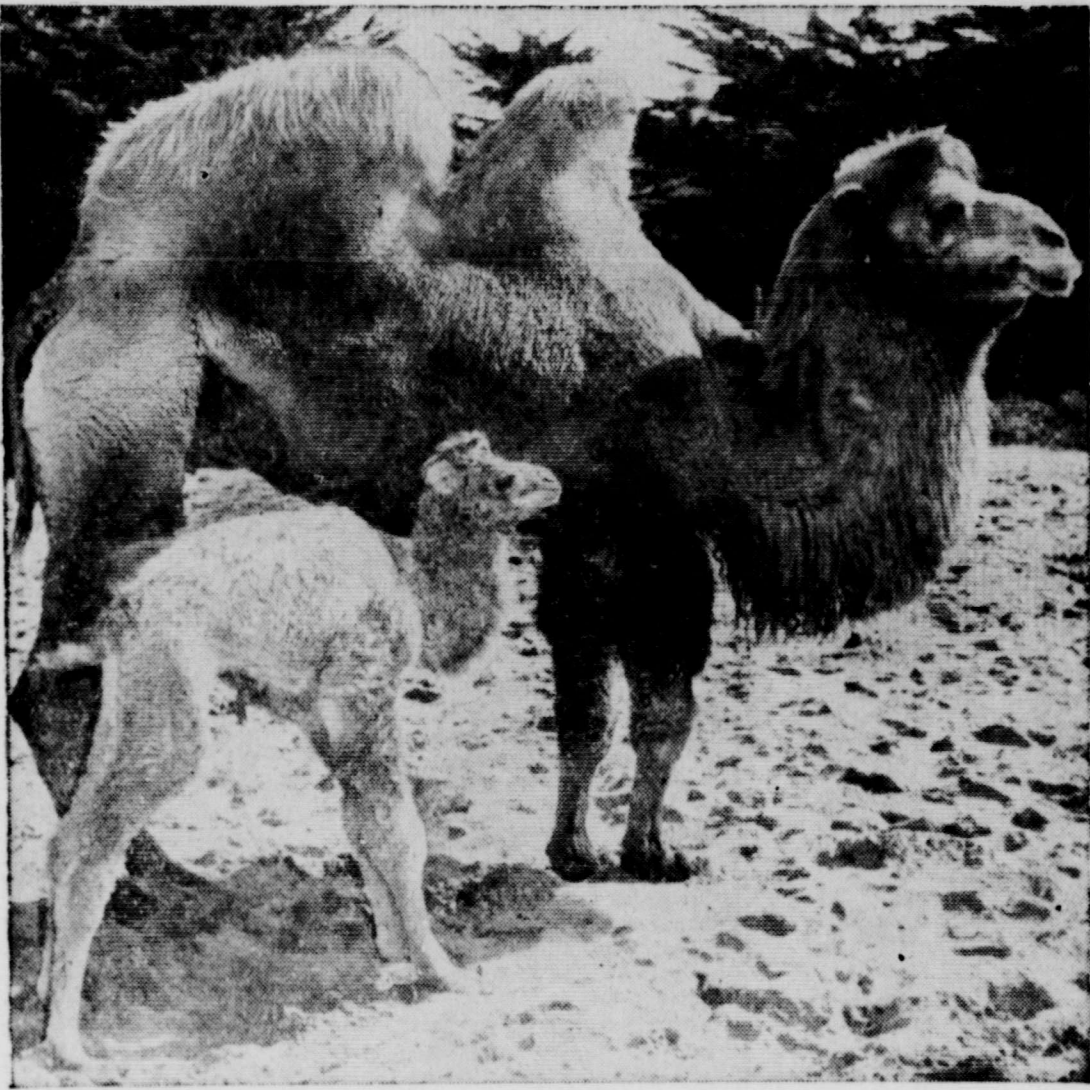

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Prosecuting Attorneys To Consider Means Of Fighting Organized Crime

Attorney General Price Daniel has called a meeting of the state's 315 prosecuting attorneys to consider means of waging a more vigorous fight against organized crime in Texas.

"In addition to stamping out the organized gambling which now exists, Texas should let the world know that it will not tolerate entry into this state of the

gamblers and racketeers who are now being run out of other states by exposures of the Kefauver crime investigating committee," Daniel said.

"I know of no group which can sound the warning and back it up better than the county and district attorneys acting in cooperation with their local law enforcement officers," he continued.

The meeting, to be held in Austin March 30-31, will be patterned after a national conference called last year by the Attorney General of the United States at the request of the state attorneys general.

Speakers will include Fred Meredith, chairman of the House Committee charged with investigating organized crime in Texas, Col. Homer Garrison, director of the Department of Public Safety, Bill Decker of Dallas, president of the Texas Sheriffs' Association, Carl F. Hansson, president of the Texas Police Association, and Bill Huck, president of the Texas Constables Association.

"Since the race-horse bookie wire was ousted by court injunction, Texas has fewer tie-ups with the national gambling syndicates than any of the larger states, but outside gambling interests have made definite attempts to enter the state in recent months and they would do so again if we do not take preventive action immediately," the attorney general said.

Daniel said, "Recent bomb killings aimed at Fort Worth and Dallas gamblers and charges of corruption of local officials by gambling interests in other cases indicate that the situation is already bad enough to be of state-wide concern."

Legal Notice AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE DRILLING OF AN OILWELL WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF CISCO, TEXAS.

SECTION 1: That it shall be unlawful for any person, partnership, association of persons, or any corporation to drill or commence to drill a well for oil or gas within the City Limits, or to work upon or assist in any way in the prosecution of any such well, or to produce oil and/or gas from a well within the City limits without a permit for the drilling of said well and production of oil and/or gas the reform having first been issued by the authority of the governing body of the City in accordance with the terms of this ordinance.

SECTIONS 2 thru 21 inclusive pertain to the method of securing the permit and the regulatory powers of the City of Cisco Commission or its agents.

SECTION 22: That any violation of any of the terms of this ordinance, whether herein designated as unlawful or not, shall be deemed a misdemeanor, and any person or corporation convicted of any such violation shall be fined in a sum not exceeding \$200.00 Dollars, and any person so convicted shall be committed to jail until such fine and the costs are paid. Each day of the continuance of such violation shall be considered a separate offense and be punishable separately, and any person, agent or employee engaged in any such violation shall on conviction so be punished therefor.

Senate Bill Will Change Setup On School For Deaf

TUSTON, March 20.—Senator Wagonseller has introduced a Bill in the Senate that is designed to go far toward improving the educational facilities of the Texas School for the Deaf. Section 2 of the Bill states that:
"The control, management and direction of the affairs, property and business at the Texas School for the Deaf is hereby transferred from the Board for Texas State Hospitals and Special Schools and vested in the State Board of Education."
Senator Wagonseller introduced this bill in order to remove the Texas School for the Deaf out from under the stigma of being classed an Eleemosynary Institution.

Twenty five years ago the School for the Deaf was under a Board of Trustees, i. e. a Board of Education. The students who graduated at that time were well educated. They now hold responsible positions all over America. Then, the Texas School for the Deaf was placed in the classification as an Eleemosynary Institution.

Senator Wagonseller said that the school has been made a political football, with the students becoming more and more despondent and without ambition.
Senator Wagonseller stated — "The change and transfer to the Board of Education will place the school rightfully where it belongs

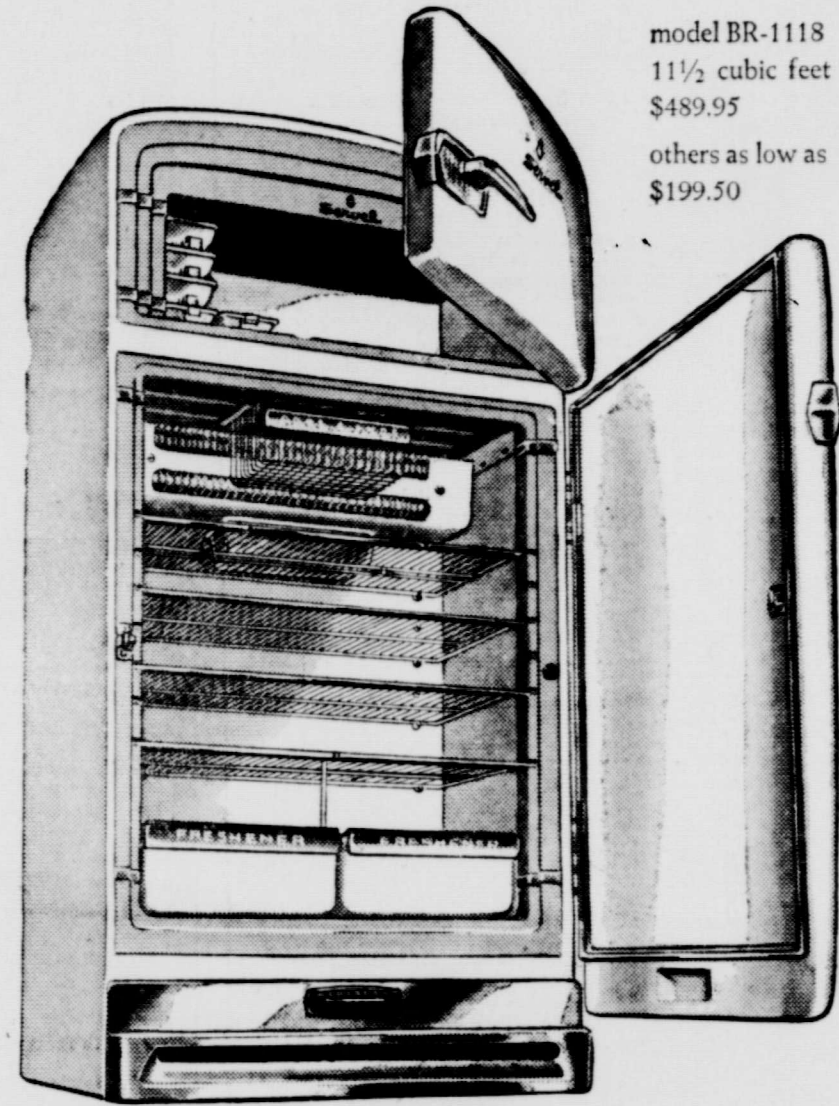

Spade Your Own Garden This Muscle Saving Way

If you want your garden plot to be well prepared, spade it yourself. Weeks may slip by waiting for a plowman to do a job which, by the proper approach, can be reduced to enjoyable and beneficial exercise.

The secret is to take it easy. Spading is not hard work if done a little at a time. A space 20 x 50 feet can be spaded in a leisurely way in eight hours. One hour a day for eight days, and the job is done.



Push Spade Straight Down Its Full Length.

When Soil Crumbles in the Hand, It Is Dry Enough to Work.

But first, be sure the soil is in condition to spade. Never work soil which is too wet; and if the soil is heavy, don't wait until it has become too dry. There is a point between extremes when even heavy clay can easily be lifted, and will crumble under a blow from the spade. You can tell this point by using the "mud pie" test.

Mould a ball of earth in your hand, and pat it to make a mud pie. If the pie holds together, the soil is too wet to spade. If it crumbles, then you can go ahead.

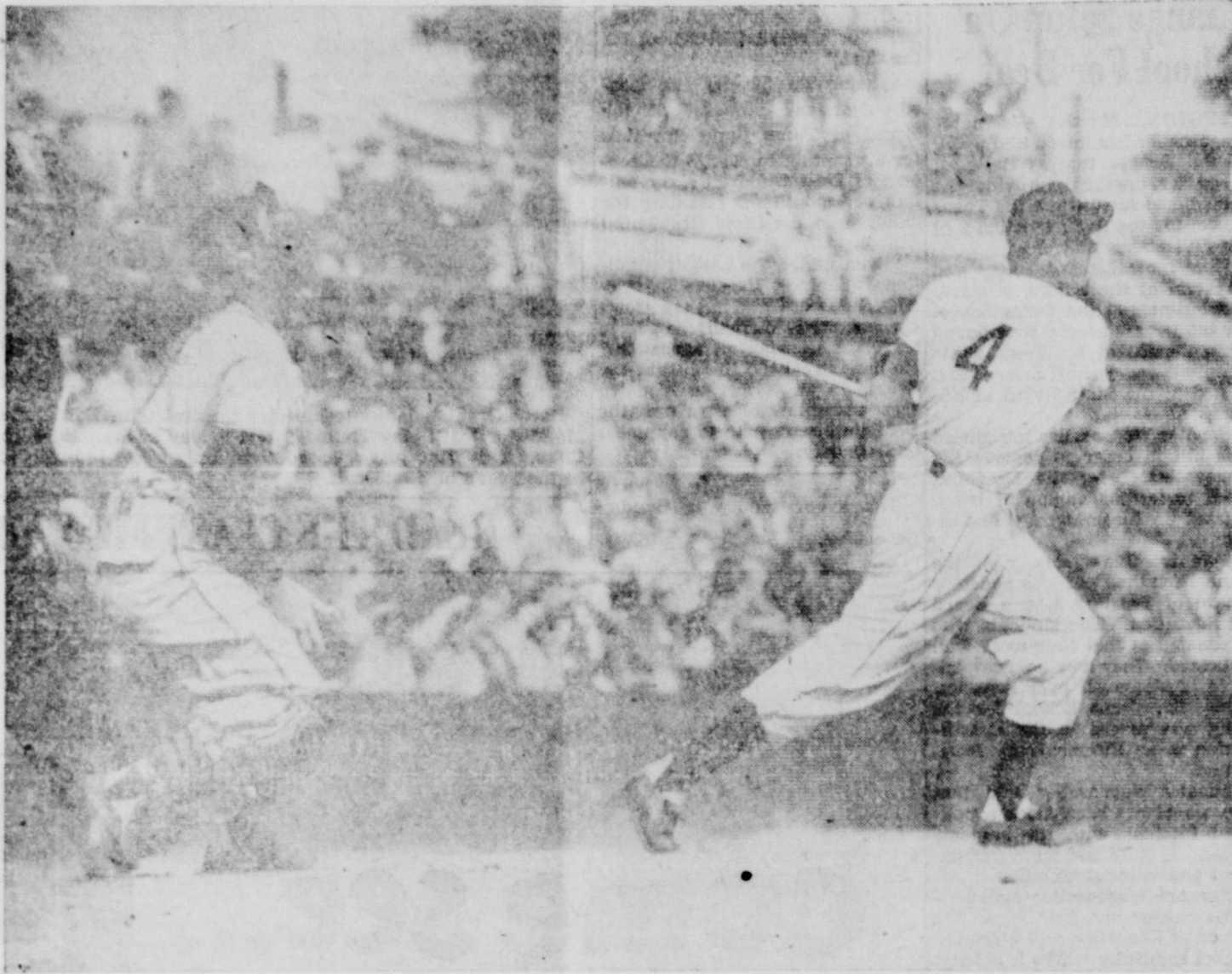
Systematic spading makes the job easier, and more complete. Here is one way to do it: Set a definite task for your first day's work, say a strip six feet wide, running the shortest dimension of the garden. At one end dig a ditch, say one foot wide and the depth of the spade, removing all soil from it.

File this soil near the opposite end of the strip.

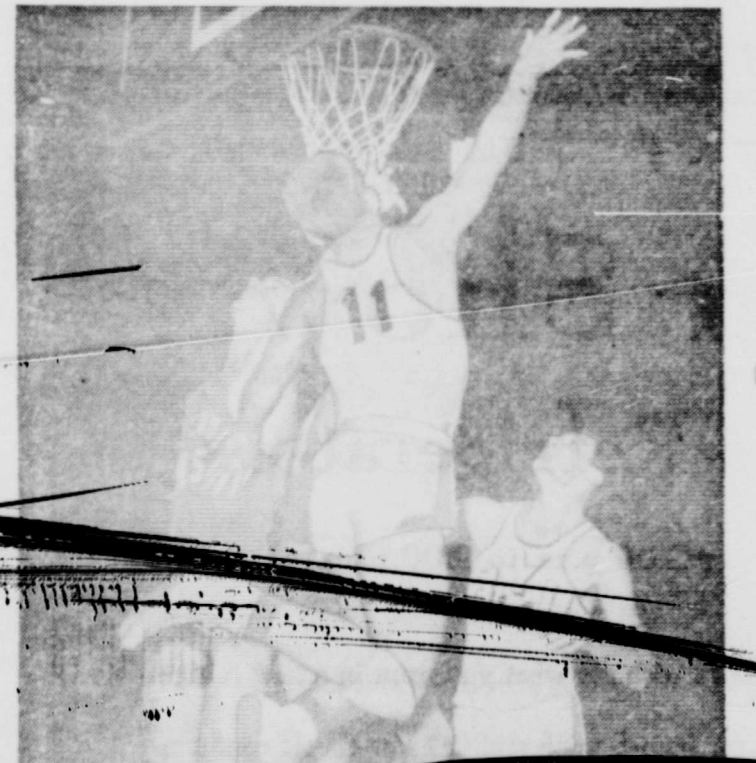
Now begin to spade with the blade not parallel to the trench, but at right angles to it. This enables you to lift the soil more easily, and deposit it in the trench. The spade should be driven down, not on a slant, but perpendicularly to its full depth. Take a small slice of the soil so your back is not strained. Lift it up, turn the spade over, so that the top soil falls underneath and bottom soil on top. In filling the first trench, you have opened a second.

If you wish to spade under manure, spread it evenly over the area, except for the top of your initial trench. When this first trench has been dug, clean the manure from the top of the next trench and throw it into the bottom of the first; then proceed with your spading, piling the soil on top of the manure.

When you have finished your day's quota, you will have an empty trench, which should be filled with the soil you removed from the initial trench.

Farmer's Question Corner

What About Baby Pig Losses?

Q: What are the chief causes of losses in newborn and very young pigs?

A: Non-infectious causes include chilling, low blood sugar, anemia, crushing and starvation. Infectious causes include scours, pneumonia, soremouth, navel ill and hog cholera; also a new disease, gastroenteritis.

Q: What is gastroenteritis like?

A: It usually hits litters three days to two weeks after birth. The pigs vomit, scour, shrink rapidly. Death loss is very heavy.

Q: What can be done about it?

A: No cure or vaccine is available. Affected litters and sows should be isolated. Sows which have recovered from gastroenteritis will transmit immunity to their next litter.

Q: What about preventives for the other pig troubles?

A: Select healthy breeding stock. Feed piggy sows properly. Provide clean farrowing pens, brooder lamps, guard rails. Disinfect navels on newborn pigs. Dull tusks with a fine file. Avoid over-freshly farrowed sows. Have vaccinated against erysipelas, infected farms, and against bacteria near weaning time.

Q: What is the best way to damage from worms?

A: Scrub brood sow before farrowing. Keep pigs in old hog lots. Move them to clean pasture.

Q: Is it possible to avoid anemia?

A: Pig anemia is due to iron in sow milk. The veterinarian can recommend an iron supplement for the pigs.

Q: What about baby pig scouring?

A: Have all litters examined by a veterinarian. Scouring may be due to feeding or to one of the baby pig contagions. Treatment depends on the right diagnosis.

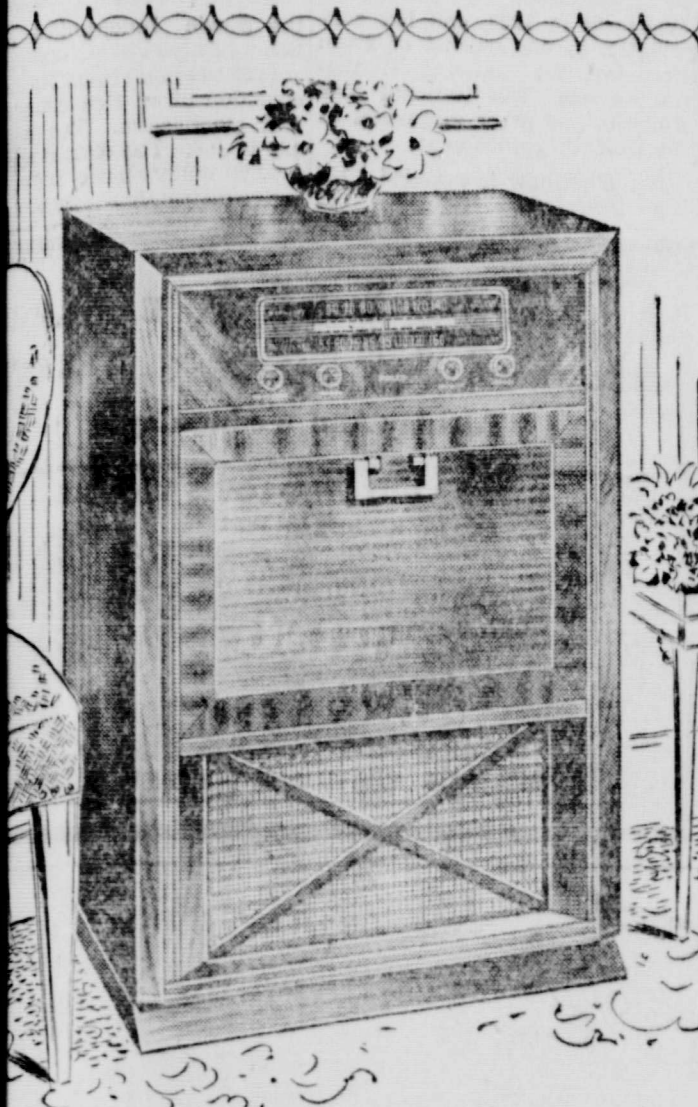

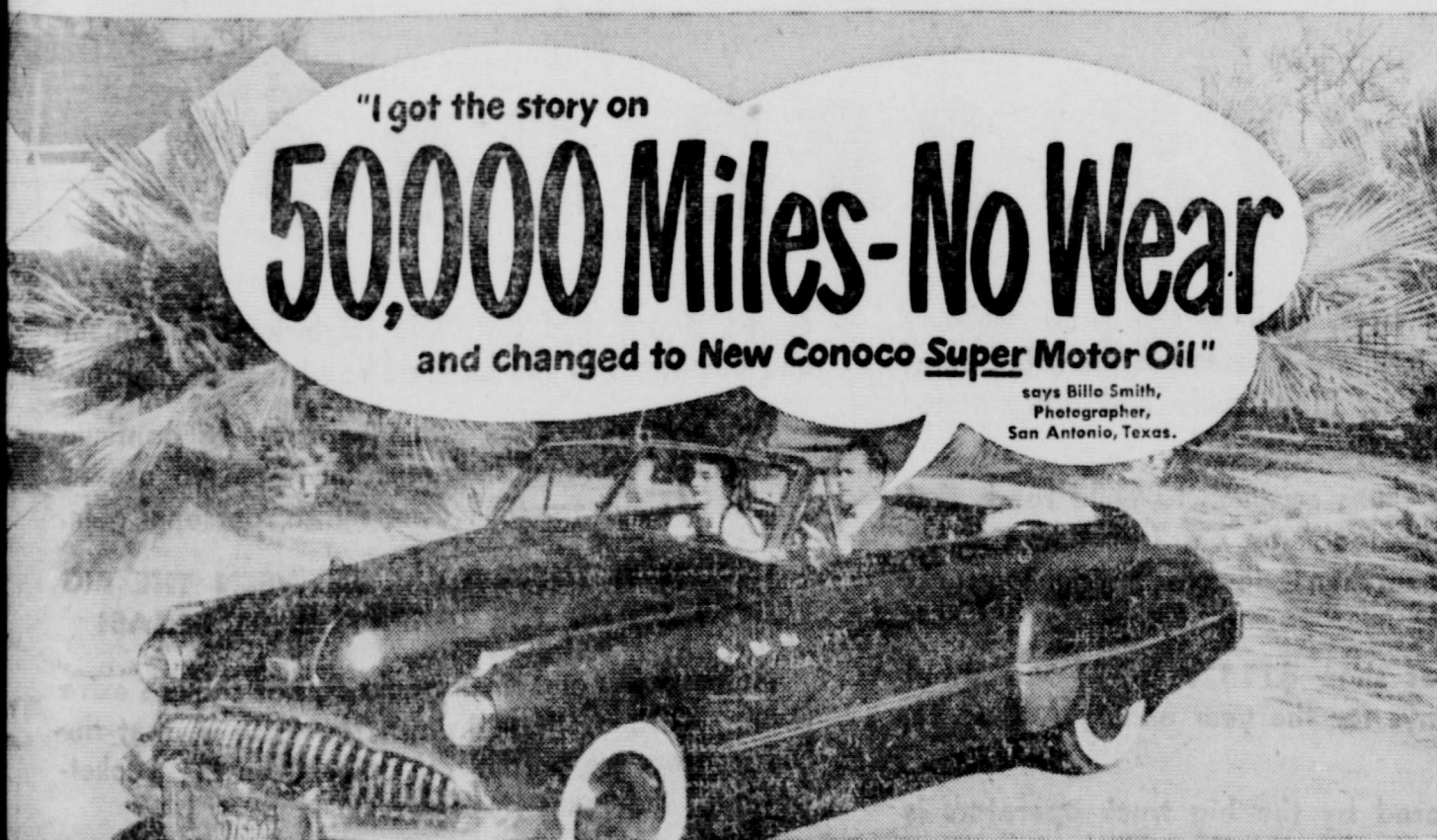

Research Man Is Named For State Economy Agency

Harold C. Bradshaw, an authority in public administration with 19 years' experience in Texas state and local government problems, has been appointed Director of Research for the Texas Economy Commission.

Dr. Stuart A. MacCorkle, Executive Director of the Commission, appointed Mr. Bradshaw effective March 16. Dr. MacCorkle became Executive Director on February 1.

Mr. Bradshaw will assist Dr. MacCorkle in planning the Economy Commission's studies in the administrative branch of the Texas state government. The Commission was organized last year, at the instance of Governor Allan Shivers, to seek ways to increase the efficiency of the administrative branch and to avoid wasteful spending of public money.

Mr. Bradshaw was a research assistant at Texas A&M College from 1934 to 1937 supervisor of governmental cost studies for the Texas State Highway Department in 1937, and served as Economist in Farm Taxation for Texas A&M from 1938 to 1944.

His university degrees include bachelor of science (1931) and master of arts (1932) from the University of Missouri; he held a fellowship in public administration at the University of Cincinnati, 1932 to 1934, and he was

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awarded a master of arts degree from Harvard University, where he held a general education board fellowship, 1941 to 1942.

Mr. Bradshaw was manager of the public affairs department of the Illinois State Chamber of Commerce, 1944 to 1945; acting and associate supervisor of research and statistics for the Illinois State Department of Finance, 1945 to 1948.

From then until November, 1950, he was Chief Internal Revenue Specialist for the Allied Occupation Forces in Japan, in charge of state and local tax work for the occupation. He was responsible for preparing revised tax statutes at the state and local levels and for seeing that taxes were collected as assessed. The significance of his work for the occupation derived from the

fact that, if Japanese failed to collect a fair amount of taxes the United States had to provide more financial aid to Japanese state and local government.

Mr. Bradshaw is the author of Budgeting in Texas Counties, 1931-40, and State and Local Financial Relations in Texas, 1942. He is the co-author of Possible Savings through Changes in Local Government, 1937; Purchasing in Texas Counties, 1944, and Summary and Appraisal of Texas Real Property Tax Laws, 1944. He was agriculture editor of

the Southwestern Social Science Quarterly in 1938, and has contributed to the Journal of Farm Economy, the National Municipal Review, The National Tax Bulletin, and other magazines in the field of government.

Mr. Bradshaw is married. He is 41 years old.

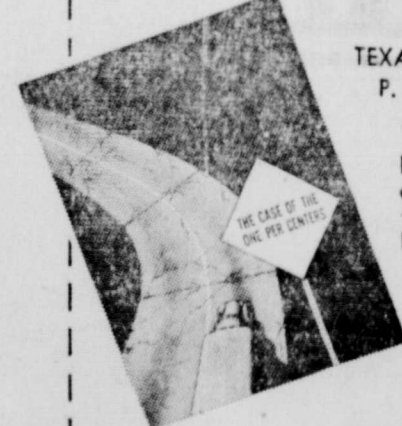
