Citizens Asked To Help Keep Cities Clean Of Rubbish

AUSTIN, March 22.—"All citizens must cooperate with their neighbors and local authorities if Texas' town and countryside are to be kept free of unsightly and health-menacing accumulations of garbage and rubbish," warns Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

"Since garbage, rubbish and other types of refuse are of no value to the producer, by the same token they are of no value to a neighbor. Everyone is responsible for the waste materials which he produces and is, under obligation to collect, store and dispose of these materials in a sanitary manner. The officials of every municipality or other political subdivision encounter the problem of collecting and disposal of waste material discarded by their residents."

"Improper disposal of refuse presents definite hazards to public health for such material create breeding places for rats, flies and other vectors of disease transmission. Odors, smoke and disagreeable appearance are other important considerations."

"The State Health Department and County Health Units are vitally interested in proper storage, collection and disposal of refuse and stand ready to aid towns or individuals in solving their problem. Receptacles for storage should be of water tight metal with lids that fit. Final disposal is a serious and difficult problem which individuals and communities must solve according to local conditions. Waste materials should never be dumped on property belonging to another person or organization."

## Erwin Prange To Deliver Sermon At Grace Service

Good Friday night at 7:30 o'clock Erwin Prange, a student at Concordia Seminary in St. Louis, will deliver the sermon at Grace Lutheran Church.

The Good Friday services, with Holy Communion, will climax the Lenten services scheduled at Grace church. Candidate Bill Bachus, former teacher of Grace Lutheran school, will be in charge of the liturgical portion of the service.

This service will mark the first appearance of Student Prange in a Texas pulpit. After three more years of training at Concordia Seminary, in St. Louis, and a few courses at Washington University in St. Louis, Mr. Prange plans to enter the Lutheran Ministry.

## Series E Bonds To Draw Interest Another 10 Years

DALLAS, March 22.—Congress has just completed legislation that will postpone "writer's cramps" and other inconveniences for millions of Americans who bought United States Defense Bonds during and since World War II.

Nathan Adams of Dallas, state Defense Bond chairman, received notice Tuesday from the Treasury that the Senate had passed and sent to the president a bill giving owners of Series E bonds the option of holding their bonds for all or any part of another 10 years, with accrued interest. The bill, passed by the House several weeks ago, will go into effect on May 1, tenth anniversary of the beginning of Series E bond sales and, consequently, the date on which bonds sold on May 1, 1941, will reach maturity.

"This legislation is going to save bond owners a lot of time and trouble," Mr. Adams said. "Many of the people who own Series E bonds will want to reinvest the money as they mature. If this bill had been passed, they would have needed to take their bonds to the bank as they matured, sign them and have new bonds issued."

"When you have literally hundreds of these bonds, as many Texans do, signing them for redemption can be a tedious job that results in a tired and aching hand."

Mr. Adams said that the automatic extension applies only to Series E bonds. He emphasized that the extension is purely optional with the bond owner and that the holder of maturing Series E's can cash them in for full value at any time.

Owners electing to hold their bonds under the new plan will receive 2½ per cent simple interest on them for the first 7½ years of the extension and interest during the final 2½ years at a rate to bring the total interest to 2½ per cent compounded. The 2½ per cent interest during the earlier years of the extension is somewhat better than for new bonds.

"Now the owner of Series E bonds who wants to reinvest his money as they mature only has to hold to them," Mr. Adams said. "If he holds them for the full period of the extension they will pay him a return of 79 per cent on his original investment."

He said that the bill also would keep a lot of money in savings that otherwise would pour into the spending stream and add to inflation.

## BIG SIX PLANS TO SET PIPE IN OIL PROSPECT JUST NORTH OF CITY

The Big Six Oil Company planned to set pipe Thursday night in their No. 1 B. W. Martin, the semi-wildcat oil test a mile north of Cisco on the Breckenridge highway. The decision to set pipe resulted from favorable tests in the Lake sand.

A spokesman for the company said that 18 feet of Lake sand was cored in the hole. It was topped at 3,448 feet. A drill stem test was run late Wednesday with a good show of oil cut mud. An electric survey of the hole produced good results, they said.

While awaiting the arrival of pipe, the operators elected to continue the hole to the Marble Falls lime. This was expected to be found by late Thursday.

Another new well was in prospect for the Bankline-Owens pool five miles northeast of Cisco in the Savage Bros. 1 D. B. Perdue. A Lake sand drill stem test Wednesday showed gas to the surface in one minute. The test was run after cutting six feet of the sand. Operators planned to

drill through the sand before beginning completion work.

A new project for the area is the J. M. Hickey and Sons No. A. E. Hart. It will be an offset to production 330 feet from the south and 3,750 feet from the east lines of Section 57, Block 4, H&TC survey.

## City Equipment Not Available For Trees

City street department equipment is not available at this time to haul off debris from trimming trees and cleaning work, Mayor G. C. Rosenthal said today.

Mr. Rosenthal added that the first week in May has been designated as official cleanup week in Cisco and that city equipment will be made available to pickup tree trimmings and other debris during that time.

## Goes To Bedside Of Daughter In Hospital

## Freeze Damages Crops Last Week In Part Of State

Spring vegetables, fruit, and early planted corn and cotton were damaged by freezing temperatures which occurred over practically the entire State on March 13. Peaches and plums were in full bloom in most areas and losses may be heavy. High winds were taking limited moisture supplies. Additional rain and warmer weather were needed in all areas.

Wheat and oats made only fair progress. Drought, frosts, and insects have reduced stands of fall sown acreage in the High Plains. In other areas spring sown grains and fall seedlings, the bulk of which did not germinate until late February, were developing slowly. Cutworms and greenbugs continued to cause severe damage in northwest and High Plains areas and infestations were becoming more prevalent in Northern Blackland counties.

Some early stands of cotton and corn in south Texas were killed by frost. Seeding of corn continued in central counties and was becoming active along the Red River.

Progress of commercial vegetables was seriously retarded and some damage occurred in early spring tender crop areas as the result of low temperatures. Sub-freezing temperatures the early part of the week were reported over a considerable part of the west end of the Valley and growing conditions the remainder of the week were poor.

Range and pasture feed continued to make good growth only in northeastern counties. In central and southeastern counties, dry soil was checking growth. Freezing temperatures also caused some damage to clovers in that area. In the west where rains fell a week ago summer grass was greening, but more rain and warm weather were needed. The northwest continued too cold for grasses to start.

South Texas continued critically dry except in a few areas along the coast where light showers fell. Goat shearing was well along in Plateau counties and sheep shearing was getting started in the southern Plateau. Demand for stocker cattle eased slightly as new range feed has not developed as expected.

B. W. Allred, regional range conservationist, SCS, and Jim Gray, extension sheep and goat specialist, San Angelo, will address the visiting county agents and vocational agriculture teachers at 9 a. m.

Individual and team prizes will be awarded in judging of livestock, dairy cattle, and poultry; and in grass identification.

THE PICTURE IN 1952

The people of the United States, and their government, are confronted by the gravest possible problems — war and peace, ever-rising taxes and inflation, more schisms between management and labor, the possibility of having to support a great military force here and abroad for many years, and so on down an almost endless list.

First of all, the feeling is very strong in both Democratic and Republican circles, that Mr. Truman will not run again. The Constitutional amendment restricting any President to not more than two years in the job has been passed, and, while it specifically exempts the incumbent, it is an indication of public feeling.

The great question mark is the appealing and somewhat confusing figure of General Eisenhower. As Newsweek puts it, "If Washington is right about Harry S. Truman, there's a good chance that General Dwight D. Eisenhower can get the Democratic nomination for President in 1952 just by asking for it."



### Data On Space Required By Long-harvest Crops

Most of the vegetables which have a long harvest are slow growing. One sowing will usually suffice for the Liberty garden, but it is easy to sow too much for family needs.

This is especially likely to happen with greens, such as Swiss chard and New Zealand spinach. These are among the most efficient of crops, comparing their yield by the space occupied. One sowing of either will be ready to start harvesting in 60 days, and a family serving can be harvested from six inches of row.

They can be sown as soon as the frost leaves the ground in the early spring. In sixty days you begin to cut the leaves as needed, and this can be continued in a normal year for sixteen weeks, occasionally for three or more weeks longer. These crops replace the leaves you have cut. You do not actually cut a serving from the plants growing on six inches of row; but their replacement activities provide repeated harvests from the same space, so that this small unit is your guide for planning.

Overplanting of these crops causes poor quality. They must be cut hard to maintain tenderness. Chard leaves should not grow longer than ten inches, and only the tips of New Zealand spinach stems are cut. The harder you cut, the more tender

leaves are produced. Parsley is a similar crop, usually overplanted. Broccoli, the home gardener's cauliflower; salsify, vegetable oyster plant; parsnips, which give an all-winter harvest, egg plant, peppers and late tomatoes are all crops which require only one sowing or planting to produce a harvest that continues until winter's arrival.

Data for estimating the garden space required for these crops follows:

Hardy crops should be sown as soon as the ground can be worked, regardless of frequent frosts. Tender crops, and all plants started under protection, should not be sown or set out in the garden before danger of frost is over.

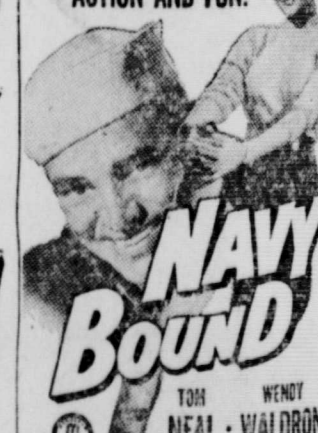
