Cisco Junior College Choir



The Cisco Junior College Choir, under the direction of Robert Clinton, director of music, will sing for the annual meeting of the Association of Texas Colleges on April 5th. The choir will present a 30-minute program at the evening banquet in the Plaza Hotel in San Antonio. Dr. Homer P. Rainey, former president of Texas University, will be the speaker.

The Junior College Choir, organized last year, has a membership of 46. Besides the San Antonio trip the choir will make a

tour through North Texas, and will sing a number of programs in this area.

E. T. SPENCE BUYS CISCO CASE DEALERSHIP FROM LOCAL MEN

E. T. Spence announced Saturday that he has purchased the Cisco Equipment Company from Carl Lamb and Stanley Webb and that he is moving his family here from Mineral Wells. The J. I. Case dealership will be open for business Monday as the Spence Farm Equipment Co.

Mr. Lamb and Mr. Webb had operated the firm as the Cisco Equipment Company for the past three years.

Mr. Spence has spent the past few years as a branch manager for four states of the Nichols Wire Steel and Aluminum Company of Davenport, Iowa, with headquarters in Mineral Wells. He formerly operated a stock farm in Eastland County and said "I wish I still had it."

The Spence company will continue to handle Case farm machinery. Mr. Spence said he expects some \$20,000 worth of various implements here soon, along with a complete line of parts. He

expects to have a machinist in his shop to work on all types of farm machinery.

"We plan to hold a formal opening at a later date," Mr. Spence said. "It is our purpose to operate the type of store that will be a farmer's headquarters, with plenty of ice water. We are very happy to come to Cisco and are looking forward to the opportunities here."

Social Security Man To Be Here

Glen McNatt, field representative of the Abilene office of the Social Security Administration, will be at the Chamber of Commerce in Cisco at 2:00 p. m. on Thursday, March 29.

Mr. McNatt cautioned that those persons who became eligible on September 1, 1950, because of the amendments to the Social Security Act should apply by March 31, 1951, in order to avoid losing payments. This is because retro active payments can be made for not more than six months.

Persons who should apply now include workers over the age of 65 who have had at least a year and a half of work under Social Security; children or other dependent survivors of World War II veterans, who are now given Social Security credits for military services; and workers over the age of 75 who can qualify even though they are still employed.

Persons who are not able to contact the representative should write the Social Security Administration, 308 Post Office Building, Abilene, Texas.

Lutheran Group To Attend Meet

The Rev. H. G. Lohmann and R. H. Dunning, lay delegate, of Grace Lutheran Church, and the Rev. M. J. Scaer and Theodore Eifert, lay delegate, of Christ Lutheran Church, will represent their respective churches at the 31st state convention of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod in Houston, March 26-30. Almost 500 delegates will be in attendance, according to the Rev. Roland Wiederaenders of San Antonio, president of the Texas district.

Theodore Eifert will serve on the committee on miscellaneous matters, to which he was appointed by President Wiederaenders. This committee will consider, among other things, rural church life.

Dr. J. W. Behnken of Chicago, president of the Lutheran Church - Missouri Synod, will preach for the opening service on Monday evening, March 26. He will also make reports for, and represent, the international office of the church body.

A unique feature of the Lutheran convention is the doctrinal essay to be delivered by the Rev. J. E. Herrmann of St. Louis, only recently named stewardship counselor for the national church body. "Striving toward a Stewardship-Conscious Congregation" is the subject chosen for convention study this year.

Election of district officials will take place at this convention. Among other matters to be discussed are missions, church extension, stewardship, and parish education.

8 Cisco Firms Are Listed In New Directory

The 1950 edition of the Directory of Texas Manufacturers, just off the press, includes eight firms in Cisco in its descriptions of the 9,800 manufacturing companies in the state. The 306-page book lists all these businesses, first by location, second by the products they make.

The Directory also presents a concise analysis of every major city and town, giving the 1940 and 1950 populations, the location of the city and its transportation facilities, the number of its retail and wholesale establishments and their volumes of business, and a listing of significant area resources.

To safeguard the accuracy of Directory listings, the book was compiled by use of a system, direct from electric-tabulating cards. This method of publication will also allow for more frequent revisions and more supplements to the Directory. The Cisco Chamber of Commerce and other chambers throughout the state gave invaluable help in collecting data for the Directory.

Each firm in the Directory is listed by its exact name and address, followed by the names of officers in the company, type of organization, date of establishment, products made, distribution area, number of employees, and home office location if it is a branch plant.

The Directory of Texas Manufacturers is now available at a price of \$3.50 from the Bureau of Business Research, University of Texas, Austin.

KARL ARMSTRONG, Jr. AMONG MEN ABOARD LOST TRANSPORT

Second Lieutenant Karl R. Armstrong, Jr., of Cisco, is one of 53 men aboard the Air Force C-124 transport that went down early Friday in the Atlantic Ocean some 450 miles west of Ireland, according to word received Friday afternoon by his wife and parents here.

There had been no definite information regarding survivors being picked up at 1 p. m. Saturday. News reports indicated that scores of airplanes and ships were searching the area where it was believed the huge 4-engine plane may have gone down.

Stationed at the Roswell, New Mexico, Air Force base, Lieut. Armstrong was a member of the plane's crew as the navigator. Reports here Saturday morning that survivors had been picked up proved premature, it was reported.

Lieut. Armstrong is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Karl R. Armstrong, Sr., of 1010 W. 14th Street, and the husband of the former Miss Gene Grantham, daughter of Judge and Mrs. R. E. Grantham of Cisco. Mrs. Armstrong, Jr., arrived here Wednesday night to visit.

Air Force officials began a search for the plane after it became overdue Friday in Ireland. Pilots reported seeing flares and possibly rafts in the water early Saturday.

Lieut. and Mrs. Armstrong were married in services here recently.

Three Programs Are Planned For Rodeo Club Arena

The fourth annual Eastland County Livestock and Horse Show to be held Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, March 29, 30, and 31, promises to be the largest and most successful to date. With the primary purpose the improvement of livestock in the Eastland County area, the show provides an opportunity for farmers and ranchers in the county to exhibit the progress they've made in building up the various breeds of livestock in their individual breeding programs.

The horse show, held in conjunction with the Livestock show, will feature both quarter horses and palominos. Breeders of both types from all over the state will exhibit their best animals, and several horsemen from adjoining states have evidenced their intention to attend with their horses. Horse enthusiasts from as far off as Michigan have already made hotel reservations in Cisco for the show week-end, all of which indicates a large attendance in both horses and spectators.

Highlighting the horse show will be two popular performance events. A cutting horse contest, approved by the National Cutting Horse Association in which some of the best cutting horses in the U. S. will vie for the added purse of \$150. Entry fee for this two-gaited and finals event will be \$15. The second event popular with spectators will be the calf roping contest, which has been approved by the Rodeo Cowboys Association. This does not mean that members only are allowed to participate, but that RCA has approved the purse, entry fees, and rules, and that RCA cowboys may participate along with any amateurs. The only restrictions concerning contestants, according to RCA spokesman, Dee Burke, are that blacklist RCA cowboys may not contest. This event promises to be one of the outstanding ones of the show, and many top-notch ropers from all parts of Texas have signified their intentions to participate. Calves, and mighty good ones, have already been procured by 2 of the show's top boosters — J. L. Thornton, and Sig Faircloth, — who also arranged for the purchase of cutting cattle.

Halter classes will be held for both quarter horses and pleasure and stock horse type palominos. Entry fee is \$5 for each class.

In the quarter horse division there will be classes for 1950 horse foals; 1950 filly foals; 1949 horse foals; 1949 filly foals; open geldings; aged stallions; aged mares; grand champion stallion; and grand champion mare.

The Palomino show will have the same classes as the Quarter horse show, except there will be separate classes for pleasure type, and separate classes for stock type Palominos. Both Quarter horse and Palomino halter classes will be judged Saturday morning.

Other performance classes will include an open reining class; with a \$5.00 entry fee; special girls' barrel and flag race, entry fee \$5.00, with a \$25.00 added purse. Other special events will be announced during the show, and contestants will be free to enter at their discretion.

A schedule of Horse Show events is as follows:

Friday, March 30th: 7:30 p. m. first performance. Saturday, March 31st, 2:30 p. m. and 7:30, second and third performances.

Performance events will be worked off in go-rounds starting Friday morning, and the horse show committee will reserve the right to pick contestants to work during the regular performances.

H. Gallup as describing the results of the poll as "a thorough repudiation of the very vocal, radical minority, and proof that now, as in the past, the spiritual leaders of Protestantism believe in and are prepared to defend American system."

Although the dean of an important school of theology declares that our system denies success in power and profit except to a few, 93 per cent of the cross-section of Protestant ministers questioned in the poll said they would prefer to live under a capitalistic economic system such as the U. S. rather than a socialistic economic system.

A recent report adopted by a conference of churchmen and labor leaders denounced enlightened self-interest, the basis of capitalism, as a fallacy. Nevertheless, 74 per cent of the practicing clergymen reached in the poll said that they thought the possibilities for living the good life were greater under capitalism than under a socialistic system.

The clergymen were almost as solidly against even such mild socialistic measures as ownership of public utilities, coal mines, railroads, and banks. Seventy-three per cent were against compulsory health insurance.

Despite the attempts of some theologians to find "valid elements" in Communism, 94 per cent of the ministers who replied said they believe that one aim of the Communists is to destroy Christian religion, and 88 per cent asserted it's impossible to be both a good Christian and a member of the Communist Party.

"In view of the convictions held by the overwhelming majority of clergymen," Stanley High pleads, "is it not to be hoped that they will speak out more forcefully against the influential minority which persistently misrepresents them and the Church?"

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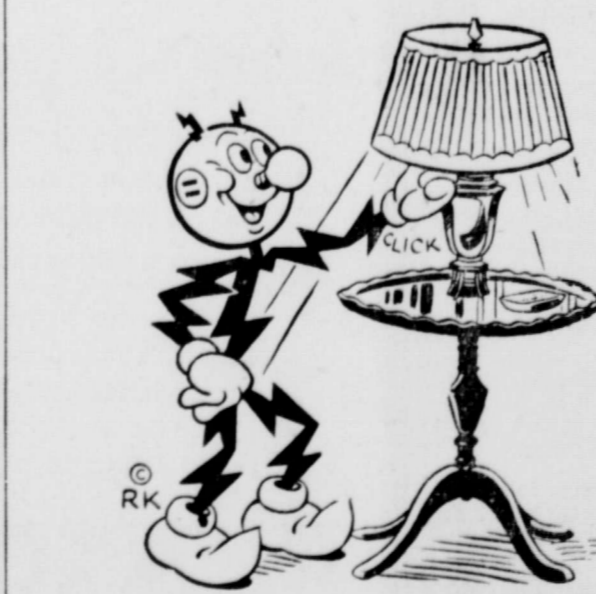
