Pickup Hits Brockman's Store Friday

On Friday, June 21 about 11 a.m., a 1983 Chevrolet pickup which was southbound on Highway 214, failed to stop at Highway 60.

The driver, J. B. Buske, 87, of Friona, continued south across Highway 60, jumped a curb, crossed a parking lot, and crashed into the front of Brockman Sales.

The impact shattered a large glass window and pushed two shelves of merchandise back about two feet.

Buske suffered minor injuries and refused transport to the hospital by Friona EMS. Store owner Tommy Brockman was in his office a few feet away and was not injured.

Buske was arrested by Friona police, charged with DWI and later released on

EVERY MORNING I turn on the news to find out if we are all going be speaking Arabic soon. Our President is certainly swimming against a lot of currents and undertow in this war against terrorism. He needs much help from the folks back home...meaning us. I received an interesting e-

Ellis mail last week from a friend who had received a letter from Lindsey Yeskoo, wife of Paul Yeskoo, who is serving in Shanghai as a Foreign Service Officer. This details her experience of meeting President Bush when he was in China recently and it under-lines why we need to pray for him and all our nation's leaders. "Dear Family,

It is a dull, polluted Monday morning here in Shanghai, and we await news of President Bush's safe arrival back in Washington DC. He just left here less than 12 hours ago. Everyone is breathing a sigh of relief that no terrorist incidents occurred here over the past days.

Security was tight, as you will have seen on TV. On Friday afternoon, a crowd of 600 consulate/embassy staff plus families were invited to a reception in the Atrium of the Shanghai/Portman complex at 3:15 p.m., to meet both GW and Colin Powell. We waited a very long time due to all the security we had to go through, but our anticipation outweighed our tired bodies and sore feet.

Finally, the President was announced and it was so incredible to see him walk in with Secretary Powell and take the podium before us; especially with all the recent events.

Quite emotional for us all, actually.

He gave a tremendous, candid, yet heartening speech, and then was escorted down to the floor to meet the crowds. Everyone was of course behind a tight rope, and there were Secret Service men and security guards everywhere. There was no way he could meet all, but he did a great job of

shaking hands with as many as possible. Colin Powell followed immediately behind him but, surprisingly, he did not seem so engaging. Maybe the Secretary was understandably tired and distracted after his previous trips to Pakistan and India. Anyway, the three kids and I were in the very front row, and had an extraordinary experience with President Bush.

He came along and shook Chris's hand first, noticing that activity in 1937 by the he was all dressed up and said, "You're looking sharp today, boy!" Chris was so proud and pleased at the recognition. He went on and took the girls' hand and spoke to them.

I leaned over and mentioned that we pray for him every day. He stopped dead in his tracks, which must be a definite security no-no; the SS men got really antsy. He searched my eyes as if to see how much I really meant what I was saying. Then he gave me the most amazing and unexpected personal response for about 30 seconds or more.

He gave me a specific series of instructions about the very things he most needs prayer for, on behalf of himself and the nation. He urged me that the threat against America is very great, and that one of our focuses in prayer needs to be "the shielding of America" and wisdom for him as he leads the country through this time. I don't know why, but as I looked into his face, he let me see for those brief moments, a tiny part of the agony he himself is going through, and the weariness.

He finished the conversation by putting his hand on my right shoulder in an affectionate, brotherly sort of way. People were pressing in at this point and almost knocking the four of us right into President Bush. Many of them were the Chinese staff who work for Paul, who would not have understood any of that conversation; but others caught snippets and came after-

wards to ask me what we had spoken about.

The President moved on. Needless to say, the whole experience was unforgettable. I cannot begin to tell you how deeply this unusual, unexpected and powerful encounter has

affected me. What a blessing to have a professing Christian as our President. He truly does have the weight of the world on his shoulders. Please pray that God will sustain him and give him wisdom and discernment in his decisions. Pray for his protection and that of his family. Our President needs Christians around the world to be praying for him 24 hours every day."



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When Choosing Mutual Funds, Look for a "Good Fit"

It's easy to invest in a mutual fund. In fact, with more than 8,000 funds available, you've got an abundance of choices. But as a mutual fund owner, your investment philosophy should not be "the more, the merrier." Instead,

look for the right funds--those that meet your individual needs.

How can you make sure you're choosing those funds that
are appropriate for you? For starters, look for funds that match your own goals and risk tolerance. If you want your money to grow so that you can meet long-term objectives, such as college for your kids or a comfortable retirement, then you may be interested in growth-oriented funds, which typically contain stocks of medium and large companies. You'll need to be aware, however, that the prices of stock funds will move up and down every day. As a stock-fund investor, you have to accept this risk to your principal in exchange for potentially high returns.

On the other hand, if you need cash flow, you might want to consider income funds, which may be made up of bonds and dividend-paying stocks. If you own income funds, your principal may not fluctuate as much as it will in growth funds. But income funds, particularly those made up mostly of bonds, run another risk--the risk of losing purchasing power to

As you can see, different types of funds carry different benefits and different risks. That's why you may want to build a diversified portfolio of growth, growth-and-income and income funds.

What else can you do to research suitable mutual funds? For one thing, make sure you truly understand a fund's history and its management. When was the fund started? Who manages the fund? How long have they been in their position? What's their investment style? Once you know the answer to these questions about a specific fund, you'll be more

comfortable with owning that fund, and you'll be less likely to be surprised at any moves that the fund's managers make.

How about a mutual fund's performance? Shouldn't that be a key factor in choosing a particular fund? You'd certainly think so if you saw any of the countless advertisements that tout a given fund's return. But underneath the large print showing a fund's performance, you'll read this message: "Past performance does not guarantee future results." This isn't just a legally required tag line--it's the truth.

And yet, a mutual fund's past performance could be important to you, because it shows that the fund's management has the discipline and a success rate that longterm investors need. Just keep in mind that things can change: A successful portfolio manager could depart the fund, or the economic climate could worsen for the fund's holdings, or

the fund could alter its investment philosophy. Ultimately, in choosing mutual funds, you should consider a number of points before investing. Pick funds that meet your goals and investment personality, look for managers whose investment style appeals to you, seek out funds that invest in vehicles with which you're comfortable, and, most importantly, discuss your decisions with an objective investment

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Historic Hotel Still A Handsome Landmark

Land Trust Company, was for business in 1926. It was located on Texas State Highway 28 (now State Highway 86) 14 miles east of Bovina, 12 miles southeast of Friona, 22 miles west of Dimmitt and 27 miles northeast of Farwell. The XIT Land Company (Capitol Investment Company erected in 1925, and opened for business in 1926. It was Investment Company, Limited) built this hotel to accommodate land buyers who were brought into this country when the ranches were being sold to farmers.

The Hotel was an

attractive nine room, two-story stucco structure and was erected at a cost of \$18,000 (\$182, 162.57 in \$18,000 (\$182, 162.57 in today's money). When the hotel first opened it was operated by a Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Wilkerson, who had moved here from Oklahoma (and later assisted by Mrs. Wilkerson's sister, Mrs. E. G. Adams), who were also assisted by several other helpers. It had been reported that, on one occasion in 1928, there were 137 guests staying at the hotel!

On the first floor of the building, there was a lobby, a dining room, office, bath, kitchen and living quarters for those in charge. Upstairs, there were two large bedrooms which could accommodate a dozen beds accommodate a dozen beds each, two small bedrooms, a hall and a bath. In 1940-41,



Cotton Growers, Inc. learned Friday, June 21 that USDA's Risk Management Agency had announced changes to new rules deferring appraisals at least 15 days beyond the applicable late planting period in cases where spring-seed crops fail to emerge due to drought conditions.






