HOUSTON, April 7. — W. C. Kuykendall of Cisco, student at Texas Technological College, at Lubbock, has been named second place winner in the statewide design competition sponsored by the Texas Society of Architects for the cover of its official magazine, THE TEXAS ARCHITECT.

David C. Baer, Houston architect and Editor of the magazine, made the announcement following a judging by the T. S. A. board of directors of the best entries submitted by students of Texas' five architectural colleges. Wm. G. Rupe of Beeville, a University of Texas student, won first place.

Kuykendall is a fourth year architectural student at Texas Tech. He is 23 years old and is married.

THE TEXAS ARCHITECT, scheduled for publication about throughout Texas each month May 1, 1951, will be circulated to more than 9,000 people and organizations. The design competition was the first step in a program to acquaint the public with the Texas architectural profession.

The church is located at 400 West 17th Street.

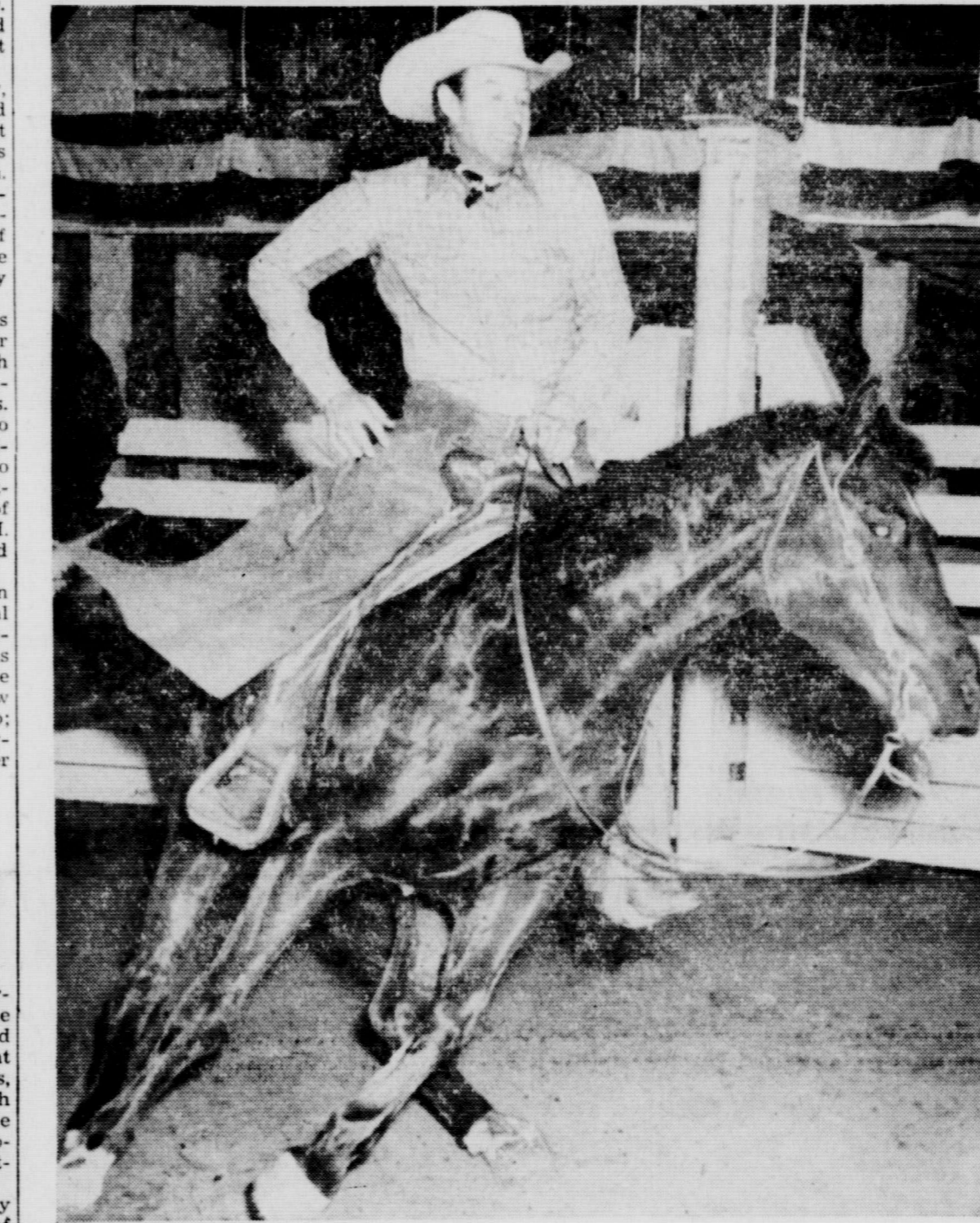

Merchants Reminded They Must Be Ready To Comply With OPS Rules

Merchants were reminded that it is their individual responsibility to secure copies of federal price ceiling regulations and to comply with them. Ellis H. Boyd, Fort Worth District of the Office of Price Stabilization, said that deadlines are rapidly approaching for several types of business, and that doing business without complying with the regulations will be in violation of the federal laws.

"Our enforcement staff is being organized and investigators will be sent into our 53-county district to check on compliance with the regulations," Boyd said. "Each of the regulations has been well publicized through our newspapers, the radio stations and Chambers of Commerce in most cities. It now is up to the merchant, large or small, to get a copy of the regulations and comply."

The director added that merchants seeking information should write the Fort Worth District Office of Price Stabilization at 2914 W. Lancaster for information concerning the regulations.

All types of business and industry must keep all records of the base period, December 19, 1950 through January 25, 1951. These records must be on file in the place of business and available for inspection by a representative of the OPS.

Boyd listed several of the categories affecting the majority of businesses in the Fort Worth District.

They are as follows: Livestock Slaughterers — Several regulations apply, but a slaughterer who has not registered by April 15 will be prohibited from butchering livestock after that date.

Restaurants, cafes and all types of eating and drinking places, went under special regulations April 1. They must file report with the District OPS at Fort Worth by April 30.

Service stations were placed under regulations that govern sales and deliveries of gasoline, heating and lubricating oils, liquefied petroleum gas and some other products, effective March 26. They must file a report and post correct prices in their places of business as indicated by the regulation.

Retail and wholesale grocery stores are under special regulations that control 60 percent of the food items. This regulation became effective April 5, and all grocery concerns, wholesale and retail, must be in compliance by April 30.

Numerous other types of retail firms are under Regulation No. 7, and there are 2,044 such stores in the Fort Worth district, such as department stores, men's clothing, women's apparel, shoe, furniture, household goods, floor coverings, and several others.

Price charts under this regulation must be filed with the Fort Worth office prior to April 30. Unless these charts have been acknowledged by this office prior to May 30, the retailers under this regulation cannot sell items listed under Regulation 7.

Sow Garden Peas as Soon as Soil Can Be Prepared

Though peas give a small harvest for the space occupied, they are so delicious when grown in the home garden, and cooked immediately after harvesting, that many gardeners are willing to give them the space needed.

Hot weather is their greatest enemy, so they do best in sections where spring comes early, or in the northern tier of states where summers are cool.

Everywhere the first sowing of peas should be made early as possible, having in mind that the finer varieties, which have wrinkled seed, may decay if the soil remains cold and damp too long after they are sown.

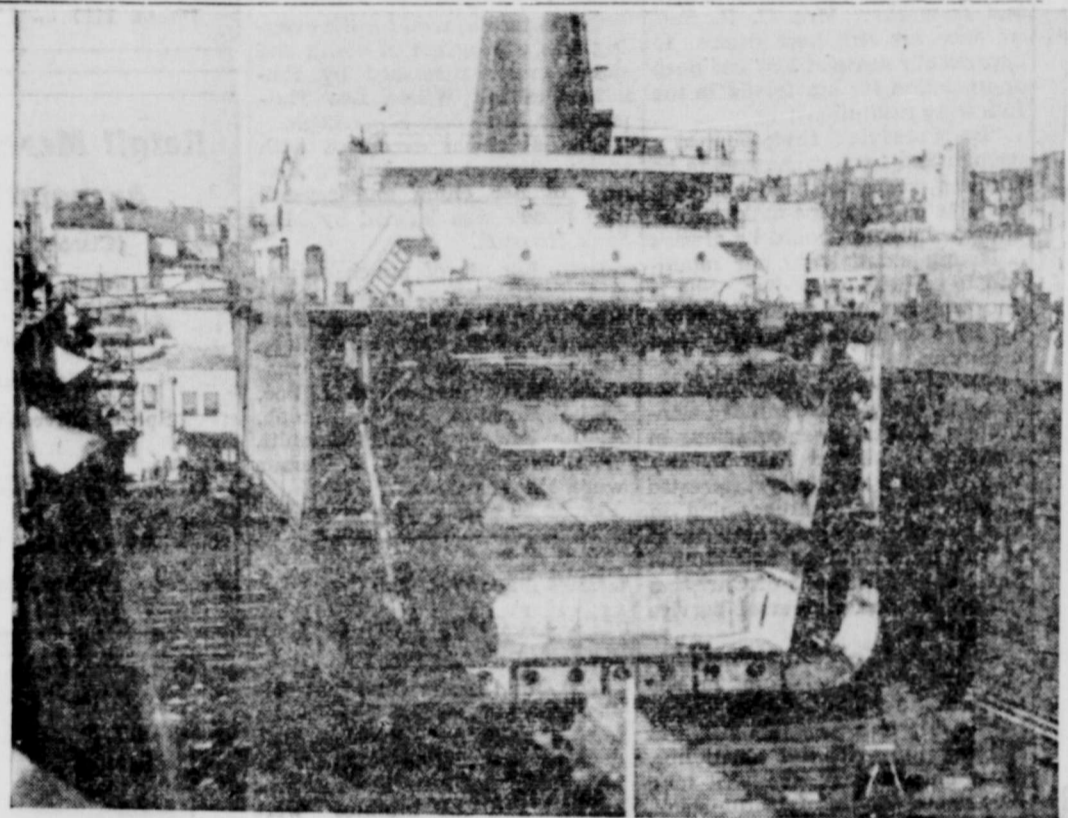
Where spring comes late, and summer follows quickly, only one crop of peas is likely to be successful, and for this an early dwarf variety should be grown under the most favorable conditions.

In sections where weather conditions are favorable to peas, it is

possible to grow them in twin rows six inches apart; in the space between the rows the weeds are pulled, but the soil is not cultivated.

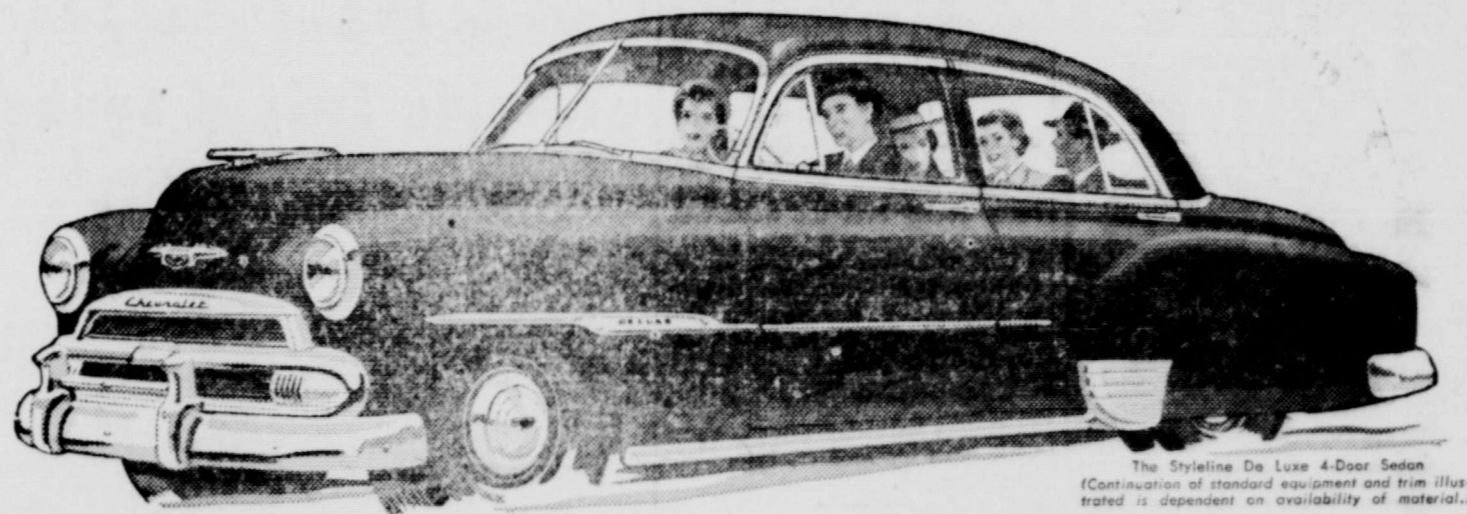



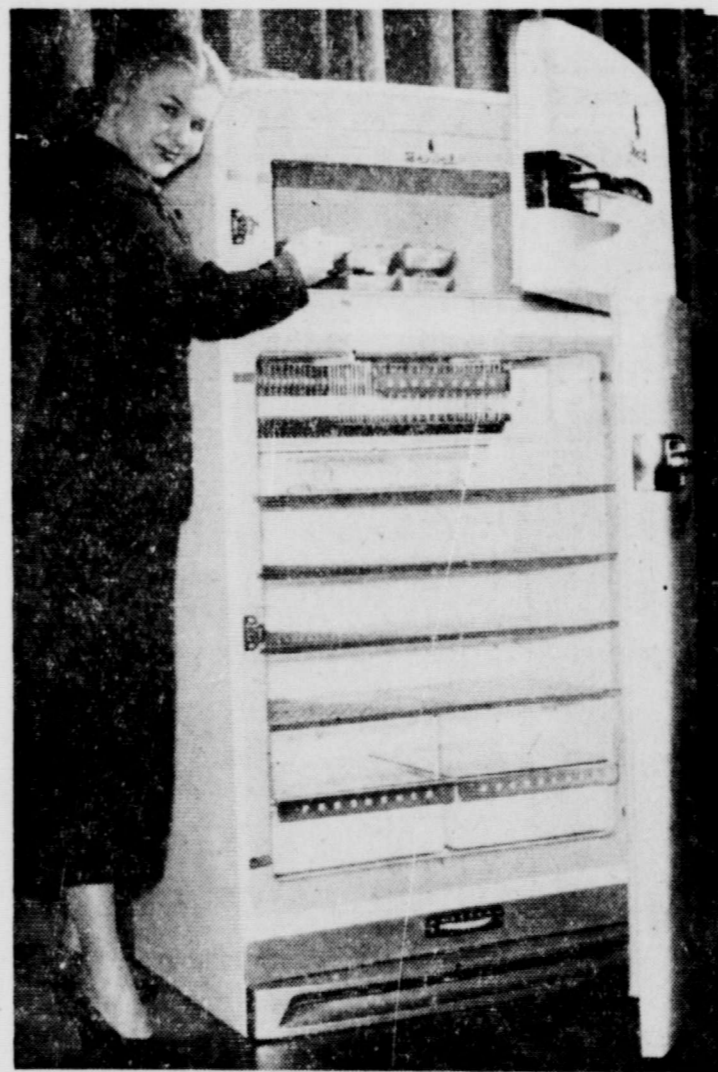
