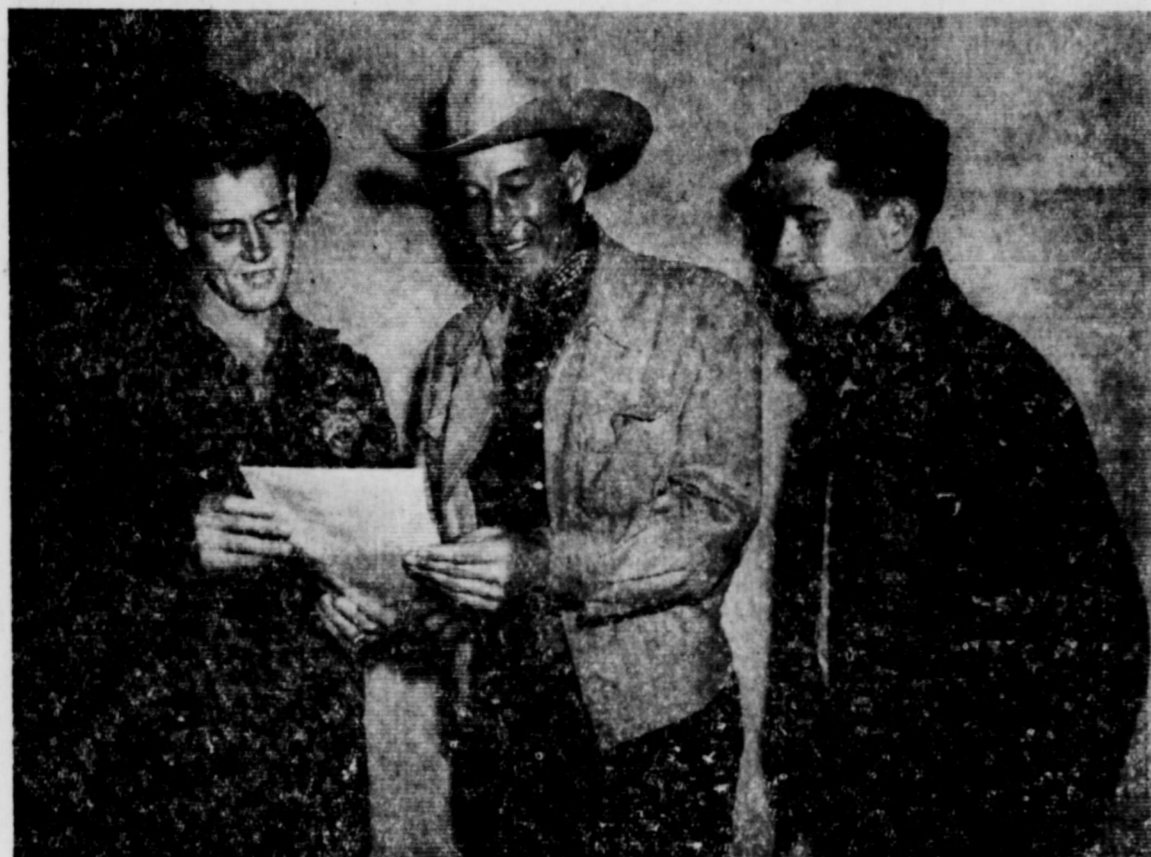

Negro Is Sought In Daylight Burglary

When asked what he wanted the Negro asked about the price of oil and left the building when he was told the price.

Latimer became suspicious and checked the office where it was discovered that some one had opened the safe and stolen the \$84 in currency. The cash drawer was not bothered.

It was believed that the Negro customer had entered the office after E. S. Martin, a partner in the firm, had gone to lunch and Mr. Latimer was alone working in the rear of the building and took the money from the safe.

BANK'S RESOURCES PASS FOUR MILLION FOR NEW HIGH RECORD

Resources of the First National Bank of Cisco have passed the \$4,000,000 mark for the first time in the history of the institution and deposits are at an all-time high of nearly \$4,000,000, according to a statement of condition prepared today at the call of the state banking commission.

Total resources amounted to \$4,081,401.02. Deposits totaled \$3,859,964.17—a gain of \$241,633.28 over those shown in the report for December 30, 1950.

The gains of the banking resources and deposits were regarded as reflecting a healthy business condition for the community. Deposits normally drop off in the first few months of the year due to tax payments.

Loans at the bank also showed an increase during the three month period, going from \$962,553.04 to \$994,587.80—a increase of \$32,029.76.

New Building, Various School Repairs Seen Without Tax Hike

Members of the board of trustees of the Cisco Consolidated School District have completed a study and have concluded that a new junior high school building can be erected here and substantial improvements made to other building and facilities without increasing the tax rate. President G. R. Nance told members of the Cisco Lions Club in a talk Wednesday.

Mr. Nance explained that the voters of the school district can vote a bond issue of between \$120,000 and \$130,000 in effect this improvement program without increasing the tax rate because of increased valuations through consolidations and due to new buildings and improvements in taxable properties during the past few years.

The trustees have taken no official action on the program, but the matter has been under consideration for several months, Mr. Nance said. He believed that action in the form of an election might be forthcoming within two months.

Agreement Made On Operation Of Polio Foundation

AUSTIN, April 12.—Reaffirmation of the operational agreement between the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis and the Gonzales Warm Springs Foundation concerning polio patient care was announced here.

Representatives of both organizations conferred at Gonzales to discuss joint policies, particularly as concerns costs to NFIP chapters in Texas on a reimbursable cost basis for polio patients treated at Gonzales at chapter expense, and also dates for separate fund raising activities.

Warren Kingsbury, regional NFIP director, said: "We had a harmonious discussion and renewed agreements affecting smooth functioning of both the National Foundation, which spearheads the over-all fight against polio in Texas and the Gonzales Foundation which is expanding its facilities and therefore is helping to rehabilitate an increasing number of polio cases each year."

Speaking for the Gonzales Foundation, Ross Boothe, president, said: "Polio patient care for post-acute cases has become a major phase of our hospitalization program. As our facilities are increased, we will be able to extend our full program of treatment to even more polio cases, along with the general crippled children case load."

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'Education For Citizenship' Event To Be Staged On April 20 by WTCC

A dynamic program designed as "Education for Citizenship" and being sponsored by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce in conjunction with the Abilene Chamber of Commerce and Abilene Christian College, will be held in Abilene on Friday, April 20. Featured speakers on the program include John Ben Shepperd, presently Secretary of State of Texas and formerly President of the U. S. Junior Chamber of

Alger Hiss case and the Gerhart and Hans Eisler cases. 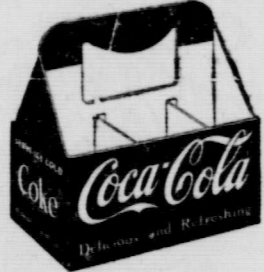
