Guardsmen are draft exempt. They attend drills for two hours on Thursday night and go on annual week-end maneuvers. They received regular army pay during periods.

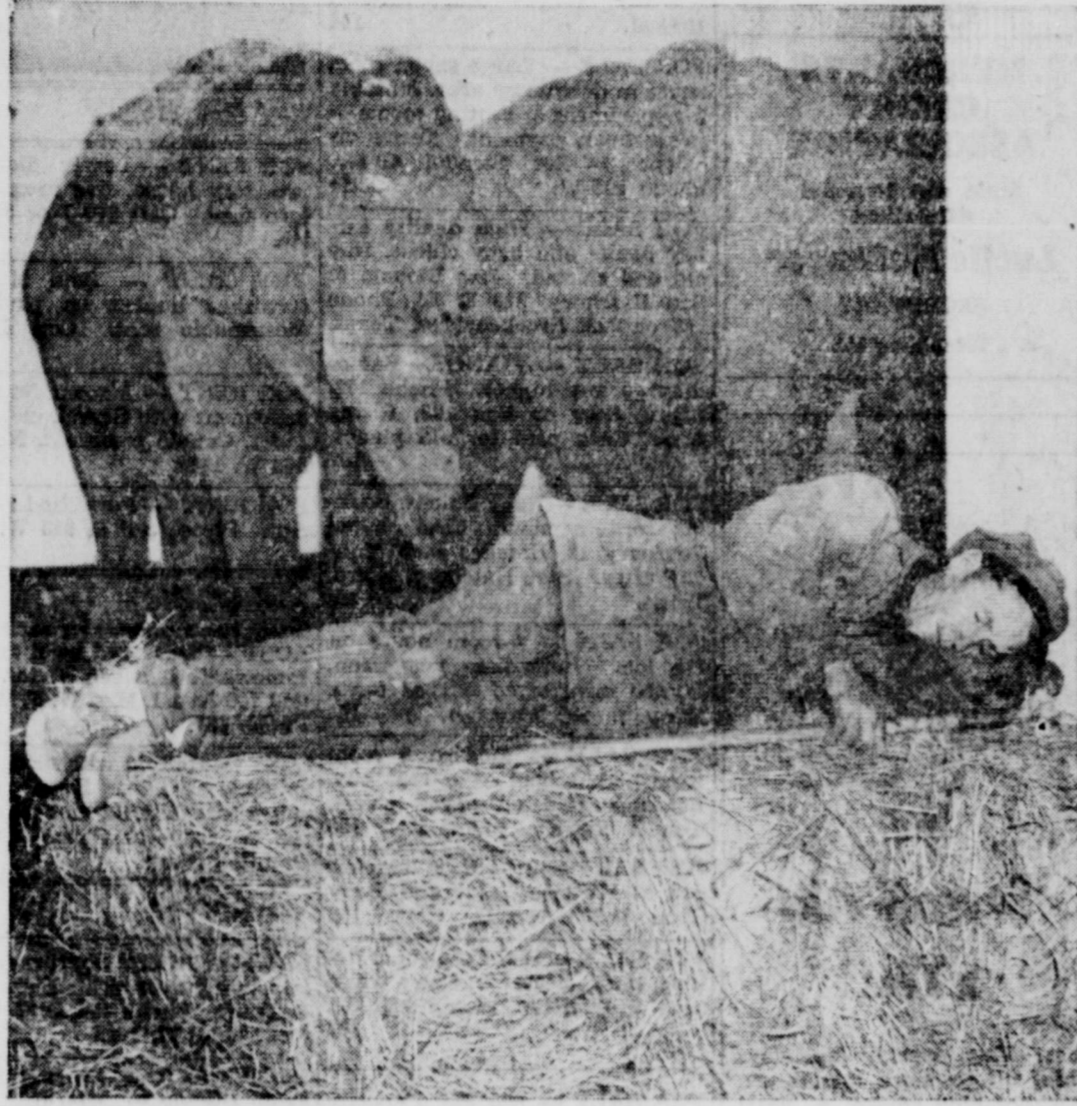

Veterans To Talk MacArthur Firing

Mass meetings in 800 Texas communities to discuss the firing of General MacArthur by President Truman were ordered today by State Commander Bill Elkins of The American Legion who also called in the department executive committee, the department foreign relations committee and the department defense committee for a meeting in Austin Sunday, April 22.

Embarrased by telephone calls and telegrams from all sections of the state, Commander Elkins declared "this is too momentous a question for the Legion to take snap judgment on."

Some of the Legionnaires defended MacArthur and others were equally vocal in defense of President Truman as commander in chief.

"Legionnaires are all veterans. We are not dodging or pussy-footing. I believe any half-baked, half-cooked action by me, as commander, would not represent the 100,000 Texas Legionnaires. In a few days we can all look at the matter in a proper perspective. That's why I am urging every Texas Post commander to call a mass meeting at once, thrash out the matter, and through their division and district commanders bring their sentiments to Austin. Then we can all get together, let our hair down and come to a sensible agreement."

Interested non-Legionnaires as well as all Legionnaires from across the state are invited to attend the meeting of the State Legion governing body, Elkins said in his statement.

Wm. Earl Barron Buried Monday In Military Service

William Earl Barron, 53, was buried in Oakwood Cemetery Monday afternoon with full military rites conducted by the John William Butts Post 123 of the American Legion.

Barron, a Naval veteran of World War II died suddenly in Andrews at 4 p. m. Saturday. He became ill and his wife took him to the Andrews hospital for treatment. His condition improved and she was taking him home when a second heart attack proved fatal.

Mr. Barron was born in Nimrod on June 25, 1897, and lived there and in and around Cisco most of his life. He had lived in Andrews for about six months. He was married to Mrs. Cora Bennett in Cisco in July, 1947.

He served in the United States Navy from July, 1942, until he received an honorable discharge in August, 1945. He went in as Seaman 1st Class and was discharged as Carpenter's Mate third class. He had no overseas duty.

Funeral services were conducted at 2 p. m. from the First Baptist Church with Rev. Ralph T. Wootton directing. Thomas Funeral Home was in charge of the arrangements. The body was brought to Cisco by coach.

Survivors include his wife, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. P. Barron of Cisco; three brothers, D. C. Barron of Killeen, Herman Barron of Cisco, and Graham Barron of Quinlan and a sister, Mrs. W. W. Reed of Fort Worth.

During the afternoon, 25 outstanding West Texas business and professional leaders will discuss their vocations with the seniors.

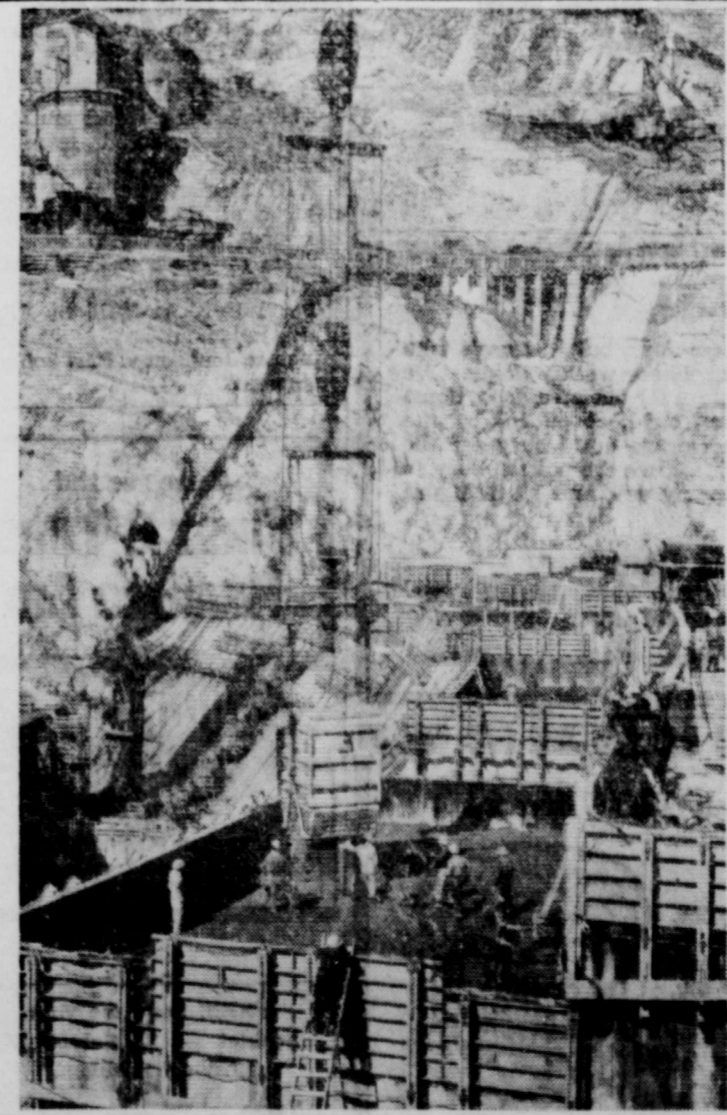

Drill Stem Test Is Run In Well On Kleiner Land

A drill stem test was run early today in Bankline Oil Company's No. 1 Kleiner Estate, a wildcat oil test some seven miles northeast of Cisco. Recovery was 600 feet of mud with no show of oil, according to reports, and drilling was resumed at 3,290 feet. The test was in a Lake sand section.

Location of the well is in Section 71, Block 4, H&TC Survey. Permit calls for a 4,500 test with rotary equipment. Choate Drilling Company of Cisco has the contract.

Elsewhere in the area, testing was continuing in the Big Six Oil Company No. 1 B. W. Martin, a semi-wildcat location just northeast of Cisco. Completion work is in progress.

Some six miles southwest of Cisco, preparations were continuing to seek to complete the Wilcox Investment Company No. 1 C. W. McElreath as a Strawn sand well. Pipe has been set at 2,257 feet. Completion work is due to begin later in the week.
