# **Drill Stem Test** Is Run In Well On Kleiner Land

ly today in Bankline Oil Company's No. 1 Kleiner Estate, a wildcat oil test some seven miles northeast of Cisco. Recovery was 600 feet of mud with no show of oil, according to reports, and drilling was resumed at 3,290 feet. The test was in a

Lake sand section. Location of the well is in Section 71, Block 4, H&TC Survey. Permit calls for a 4,500 test with rotary equipment. Choate Drilling Company of Cisco has the contract.

Elsewhere in the area, testing was continuing in the Big Six Oil Company No. 1 B. W. Martin, a semi-wildcat location just northeast of Cisco. Completion work is in progress.

Some six miles southwest of Cisco, preparations were continuing to seek to complete the Wilcox Investment Company No. 1 C. W. McElreath as a Strawn sand well. Pipe has been set at 2,257 feet. Completion work is due to begin later in the week.
