fixed daily or weekly money rate When work is paid for on the premium system the instrument can also be used for finding the time
allowance that is to be added to the actual time oceupied on the con-
tract. The instrument consists of two large wheels, with broad, flat faces,
mounted on the same spindle. The spindle is carried at each end in porting stand. One of the two wheels is securely keyed to the spindle, and the other is free to re-
volve. A spring of sufficient strength to canse the two wheels to revolve together, presses the loose
