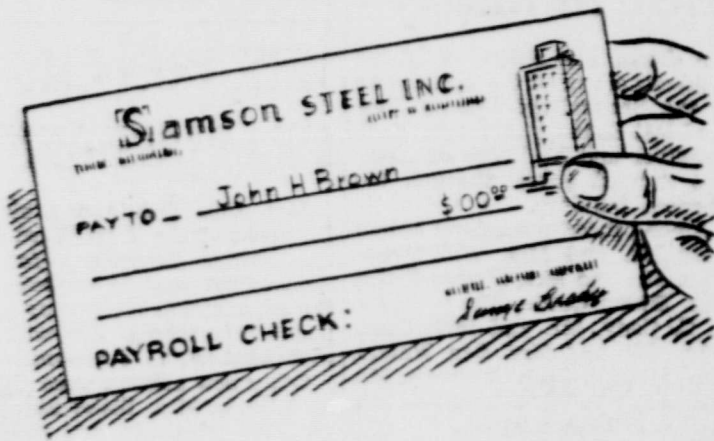

Young Men Ask If It Is Patriotic To Enroll In School During War

COLLEGE STATION, April 18. - "Will I be doing the patriotic thing if I go to college and enroll in ROTC?"

That is a question, according to inquiries now being made of Texas A. and M. College military officials, that hundreds of boys over the state about to graduate from high school are asking.

And Col. H. L. Boatner, commandant at A. and M., has gone on record with some answers.

The United States government, Colonel Boatner points out, thinks enough of the ROTC program that it makes it worth the while of a student to enroll in it. The government pays 90 cents per day to advanced ROTC students under contract - junior and seniors who will be commissioned as reserve second lieutenants on graduation.

This will amount to a total of about \$393,200 paid to advanced ROTC students at A. and M. during the 1950-51 school year. Each student who completes his ROTC training receives during the contract period approximately \$513. In addition, he is issued clothing which would cost him about \$230 if he bought it himself and the clothing is maintained or replaced as needed.

The government, Colonel Boatner pointed out, gives the equivalent of an \$875 scholarship for two years at current rates, to the student who takes ROTC training during his four years in college.

Only students in advanced ROTC, of junior and senior standing, are given contracts and receive the cash allowance. But the basic students - freshman and sophomores - receive the clothing issue.

The student's part of the contract is to "pursue the course to completion." All A. and M. students presently under contract have received Selective Service deferments. Contingent to the deferments is the student's agreement to complete the course, accept a commission when it is tendered him and serve at least two years on active duty when called.

The cadet corps at A. and M. now numbers 3,884. Of this number, 1,575 juniors and seniors are under contract. The total comprises both army and air force cadets. These contracts will pay some \$700,000 to the holders during their last two

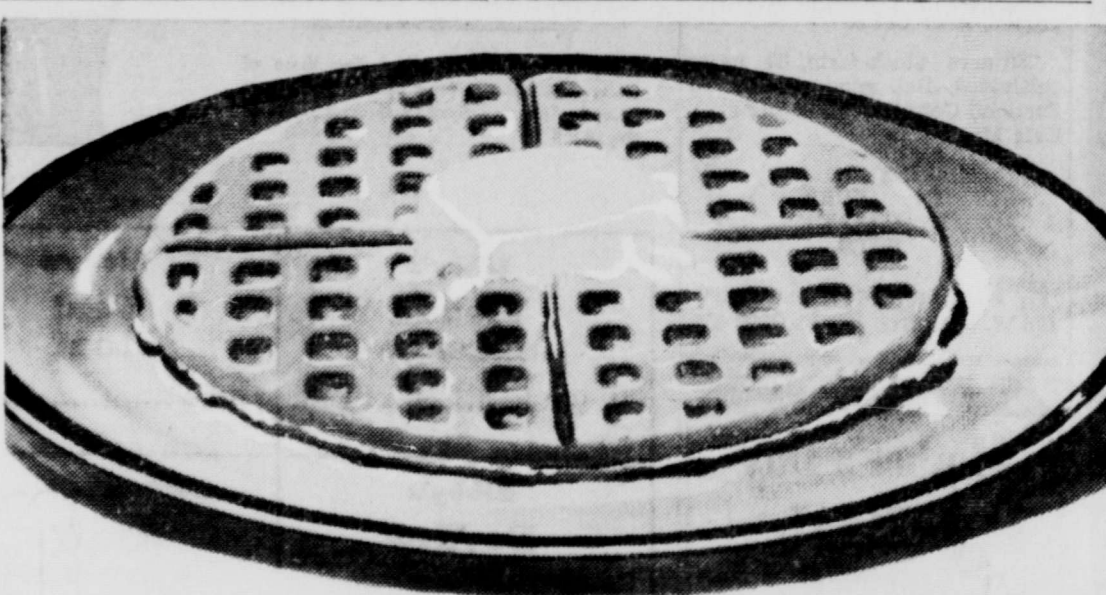

### Vivid Tale About De Soto Begins New U of T Press

AUSTIN, April 18.—Publication of a vivid tale of the man who discovered the Mississippi River centuries ago marks an auspicious beginning for the recently-reorganized University of Texas Press.

"The Florida of the Inca," the story of Hernando De Soto's expedition for the conquest of North America, is the first book to be published by the University Press, new publishing division, set up last July. It is a History Book Club selection for May.

Dr. John Varner, University of Texas associate professor of English, and his wife, Dr. Jeannette Varner, translated the book from the original Spanish. Garcilaso de la Vega, son of a Spanish conquistador and an Indian princess, wrote the story almost 350 years

ago. It was first published in Lisbon in 1605. Known as "El Ynca," de la Vega was the first native of the Western Hemisphere to become important as a writer.

The 700-page volume contains a frontispiece and end-papers by Reese Brandt of the University's Art Department and other illustrations from old Spanish woodcuts.

"The Florida of the Inca" sells for \$7.50. Pre-publication comments term the book a "superb translation."

Dr. Walter Prescott Webb, University of Texas history professor and noted author, says: "The fact that so much beauty and charm have survived translation is a tribute to the Varners."

"This is romance as well as history, for it is true to the spirit of its age," Dumas Malone, prominent historian, comments.

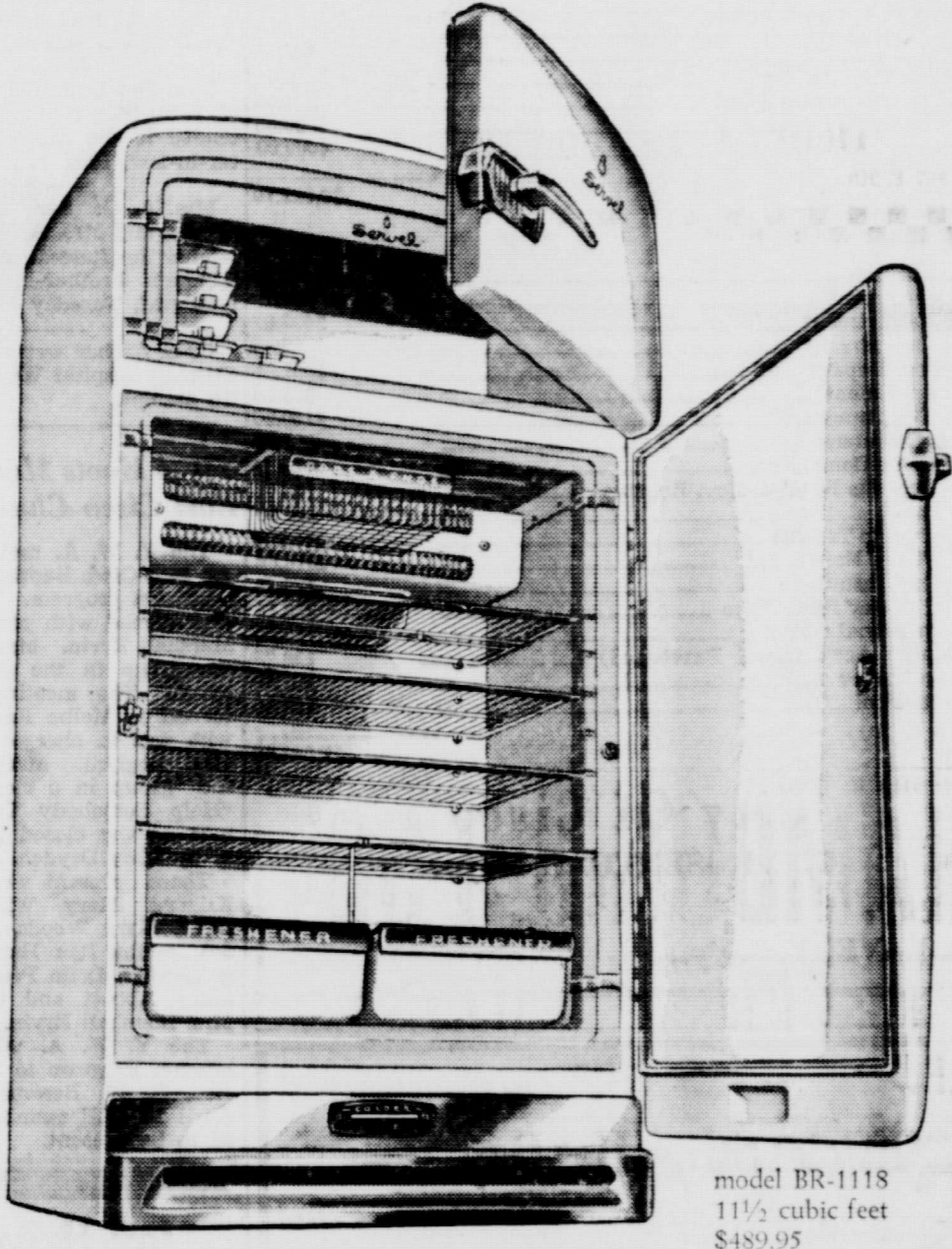
Varner is a native of Mount Pleasant. He attended Austin College in Sherman and was graduated from North Texas State College. Mrs. Varner is a graduate of the University of Alabama, and both received doctors' degrees from the University of Virginia. They began translating the book three-and-a-half years ago.

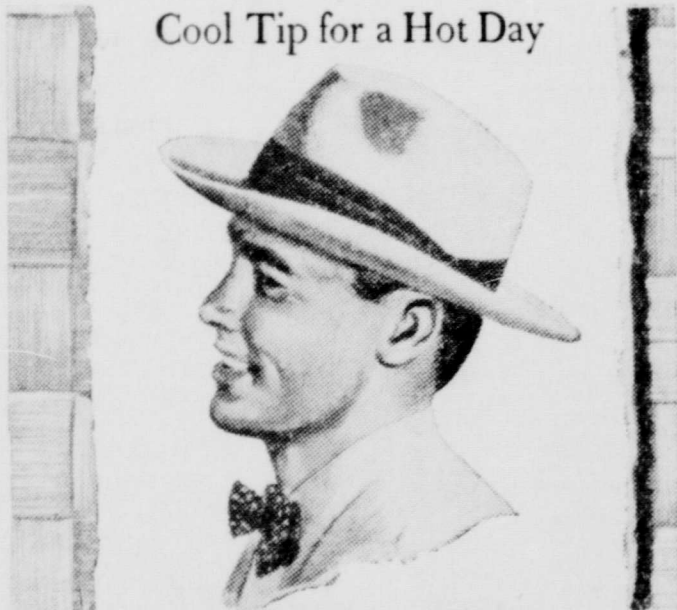
