

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



Only students in advanced ROTC, of junior and senior standing, are given contracts and receive the cash allowance. But the basic students - freshman and sophomores - receive the clothing issue.

The student's part of the contract is to "pursue the course to completion.

All A. and M. students presen tly under contract have receiv ed Selective Service deferments Contingent to the deferments is the student's agreement to complete the course, accept a commission when it is tendered him and serve at least two years on active duty when called.

The cadet corps at A. and M. now numbers 3,884. Of this number, 1,575 juniors and seniors are under contract. The total comprises both army and air force cadets. These contracts will pay some \$700,000 to the holders during their last two
