LEGISLATIVE BULLETIN

LEGISLATOR'S PAY — This past week the House adopted a proposed constitutional amendment to raise Legislator's pay. The vote was 105-31. Under the terms of this piece of legislation, Legislators would receive \$25.00 per diem for the first 120 days of a regular session and \$7.50 for each day thereafter. At present Legislators receive \$10.00 per diem for the first 120 days and \$5.00 per day for each day thereafter. They also get 25c a mile for travel from their residence to the capitol. Under the new legislation passed Tuesday, the mileage allowance is omitted. However, it adds a stipulation that no Legislator, whether licensed as an attorney or not, will be permitted to conduct any practice before a state board or agency while the Legislature is in session. This proposed pay increase would be effective in 1953 and will not be retro-active. Naturally, it will have to be approved by the Senate, signed by the Governor and submitted to a vote of the people in a statewide election to be held in 1952.

TIDELANDS — Legislation declaring the states own the submerged coastal lands is now stalled in both the House and Senate. Senator O'Mahoney of Wyoming, Chairman of the Senate Interior Committee, has delayed action by this committee to give preference to an administration interim bill which places control of the offshore area temporarily in the hands of the Interior Department. Sentiment indicates that a large number of the Senate will turn

SAFETY — Enactment of legislation requiring annual inspection of all motor vehicles in Texas on an annual basis was virtually assured Wednesday. On that date the Senate passed a bill already passed by the House designed to cut down on the total of accidents caused by defective vehicles. The final vote was 19-9. The measure now goes back to the Senate for concurrence on minor amendments tacked to the bill by the Senate.

NATIONAL DEFENSE — Wednesday, the House of Representatives set up the machinery necessary for calling out the State Guard in the event of an emergency. The bill would permit the Governor to make the call. However, the bill provides for no appropriation.

TAXATION — The House of Representatives passed the omnibus tax bill which would raise approximately forty-five million dollars in new state taxes, during the next two years. The final vote was 76-63. The measure now goes to the Senate for action there. This is the second tax measure passed by the House in the last ten days. The other measure was a natural gas tax, sponsored by Representative Jim Sewell of Blooming Grove which would place a 1c tax per 1000 cubic feet on the gathering of natural gas. Estimates indicate that some fifty-eight million dollars could be raised under the Sewell bill in a two year period. These funds would be earmarked for use by schools, rural roads, and municipalities.

GENERAL SALES TAX — This

last Tuesday the House killed a proposed constitutional amendment to prohibit the levying of a general state sales tax or state income tax. The final vote was 89-23. Everyone speaking on the bill indicated that he was against the sales tax or an income tax, but did not want to place such a restriction in the constitution of our state. Representative Marshall Bell of San Antonio was the author of the proposed constitutional amendment.

Thin Out Tiny Carrots For Dish You Won't Forget



If home garden crops were rated according to the quantity of vitamins they contribute to the family diet all season long, the carrot would probably be rated next to the ornato. If your family belongs to the anti-carrot faction, and you are planning your first vegetable garden, do not omit carrots from the schedule just because of that prejudice. If you have never eaten carrots fresh from your own garden, then you have no idea how delicious they can be. Sow a row, with the very first rows you start in the garden. First, mix the carrot seed with just a pinch or two of early radishes, because carrots germinate slowly and the radishes will come up right away and "mark the row" as gardeners say, so you may avoid disturbing it in cultivation. In a shallow drill, sow the seeds thinly. When the radishes appear and mature, pull up and eat them promptly, so they will not crowd the carrots which succeed them.

Let the carrots grow without thinning until some are as thick as lead pencils, then begin to thin out and cook the excess roots. You will be amazed at the flavor and tenderness of these tiny carrots, and from then on your prejudice will disappear. While carrots are most delicious when they are young, they still remain sweet and tender after they have grown all summer in the garden. They will mature well standing so close in the row as to touch each other. But the best plan is to make successive sowings, and harvest them before they are full grown. If you wish to can carrots, the smaller they are the more delicious you will find them next winter. It is a good plan to sow a special row for canning, and harvest them when they reach the size desired. When carrots are allowed to mature, they should be pulled when the tops begin to turn yellow. If left in the ground after that they will lose quality.



Substitute Postal Clerk Exams Set By Civil Service

The United States Civil Service Commission today announced an examination for Substitute Postal Transportation Clerk to fill positions in the Postal Transportation Service of the Post Office Department in the following States: Arizona, California, Colorado, Delaware, Florida, Idaho, Illinois, Iowa, Kansas, Michigan, Montana, Nebraska, Nevada, North Carolina, North Dakota, Oklahoma, South Carolina, South Dakota, Tennessee, Texas, Utah, Washington, West Virginia, and Wyoming.

Appointments to these positions are restricted to persons entitled to veteran preference; however, applications will also be accepted, for a limited period, from persons not entitled to veteran preference who live in the States of Arizona, Nevada, Utah, and Wyoming. Such persons will be considered only when qualified veterans are not available.

The Post Office Department prefers men for these positions. To qualify, applicants must pass a written test and, in addition, they must be residents of the States mentioned and must be physically able to perform the duties of the position which require physical exertion. The age limits for nonveteran applicants are 18 to 62 years. There is no age limit for applicants entitled to veteran preference. The basic initial rate of pay for these positions is \$1.41 1/2 an hour. For a substitute who is employed on the day shift and who regularly works 40 hours a week, the average annual salary thus amounts to approximately \$2,943. In addition to the basic salary, 10 percent additional is paid for any night work between the hours of 6 p. m. and 6 a. m. Full information and application forms may be obtained from the Commission's local secretary, Sam B. King at the Cisco Post Office.

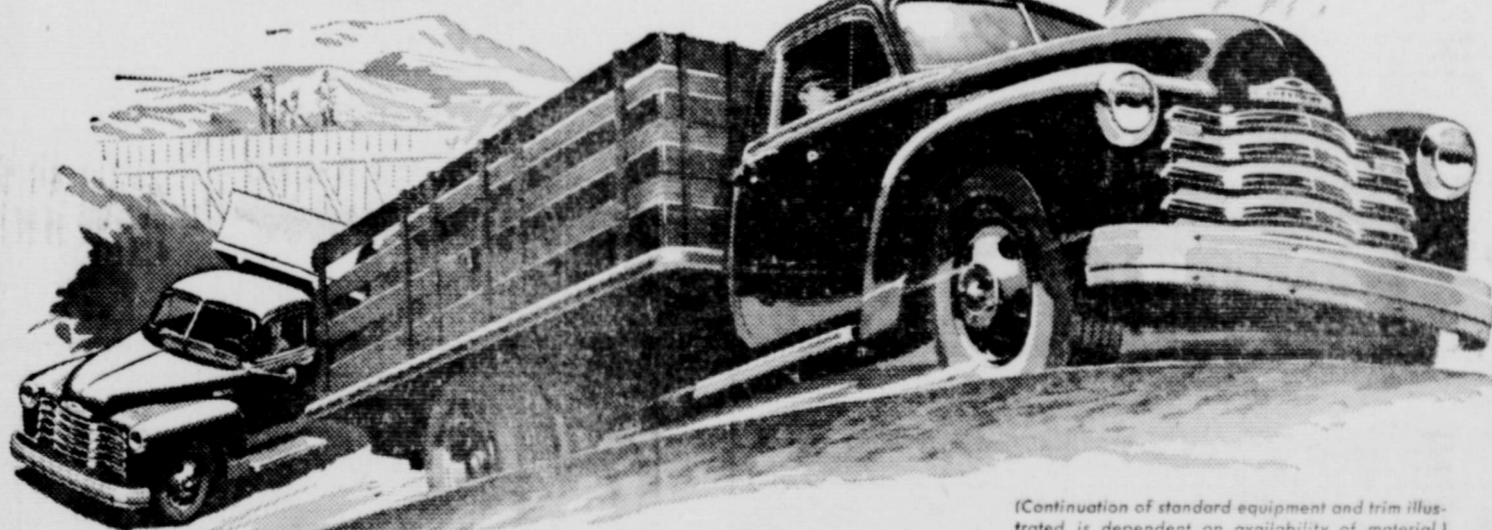

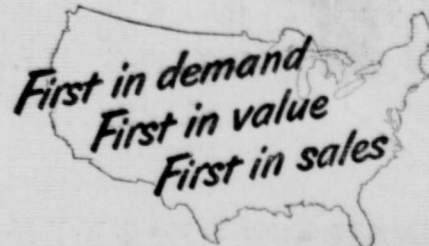

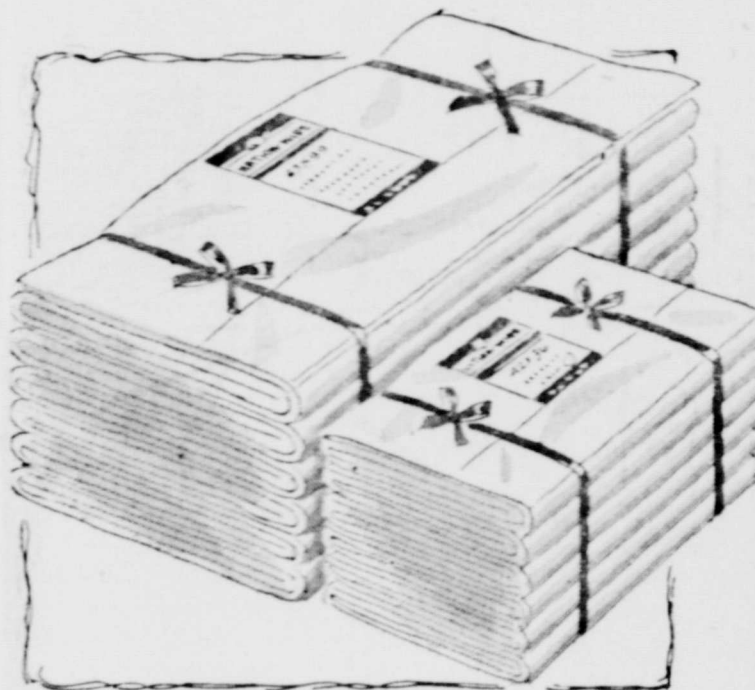
