Rapid Progress Made In Harvest In Good Weather

Rapid progress was made in harvesting mature crops in Texas during the past week, as open weather prevailed over most of the State. Along the upper coast, however, showers and heavy dew slowed rice combining and the scrapping of cotton. East Texas farmers were planting winter cover crops as well as clovers and small grains for pastures, with good moisture for germination and early growth.

In central and north Texas, the limited moisture was being dissipated by wind and high temperatures, and soils in those areas were again getting dry. Droughty conditions continued in western and northwestern counties.

Cotton harvest progressed under generally favorable weather conditions. Farmers in Low Rolling Plains and southern High Plains counties were gathering their crops as rapidly as possible, with a short supply of pullers and pickers reported. Northern Blacklands counties were about the half-way mark with harvest, and were progressing rapidly.

Prospects for a top crop in northern and northeastern areas, following the mid-September rains, were disappearing rapidly, owing to weevil and boll worm activity. Pulling and picking was virtually completed in central and south Texas and the plow-up of stalks was resumed with dry weather.

Wheat seeding in the northwest made slow progress during the week and the crop that was up to a stand was making slow growth, as dry weather continued. Planting of small grains and cover crops was making fair progress in central, eastern and southern areas. Harvest of sorghums was widespread in the Cox calls "a significant public High Plains, but was nearly completed elsewhere. 
