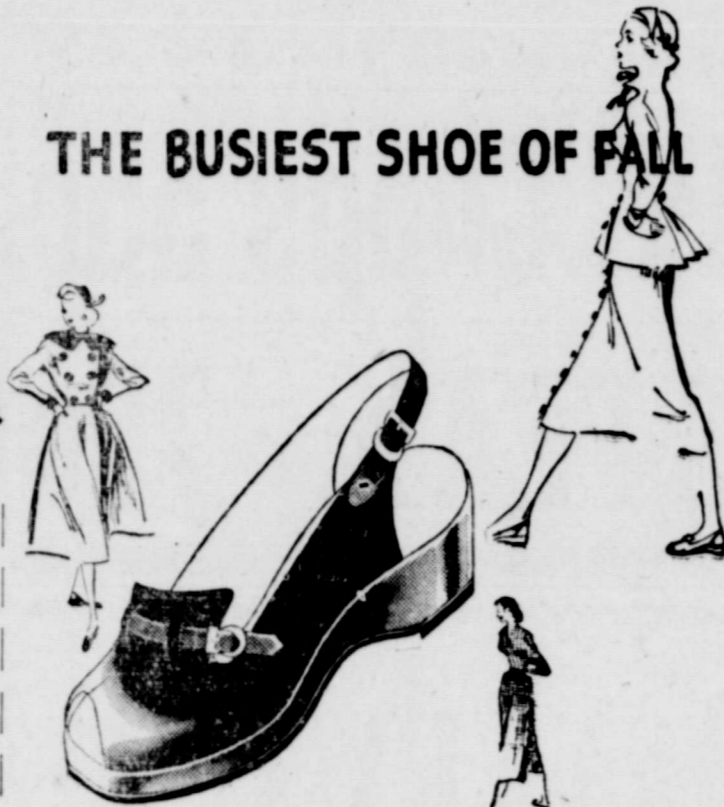

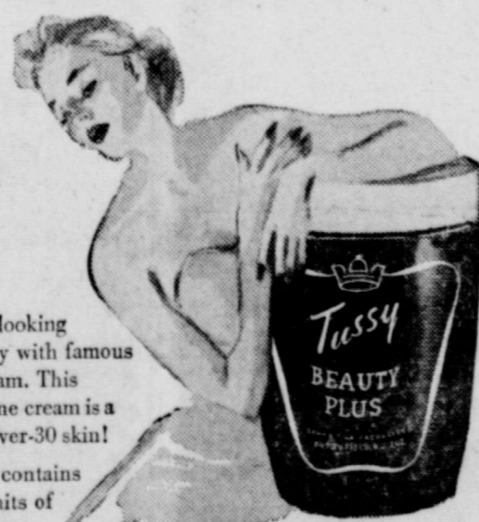

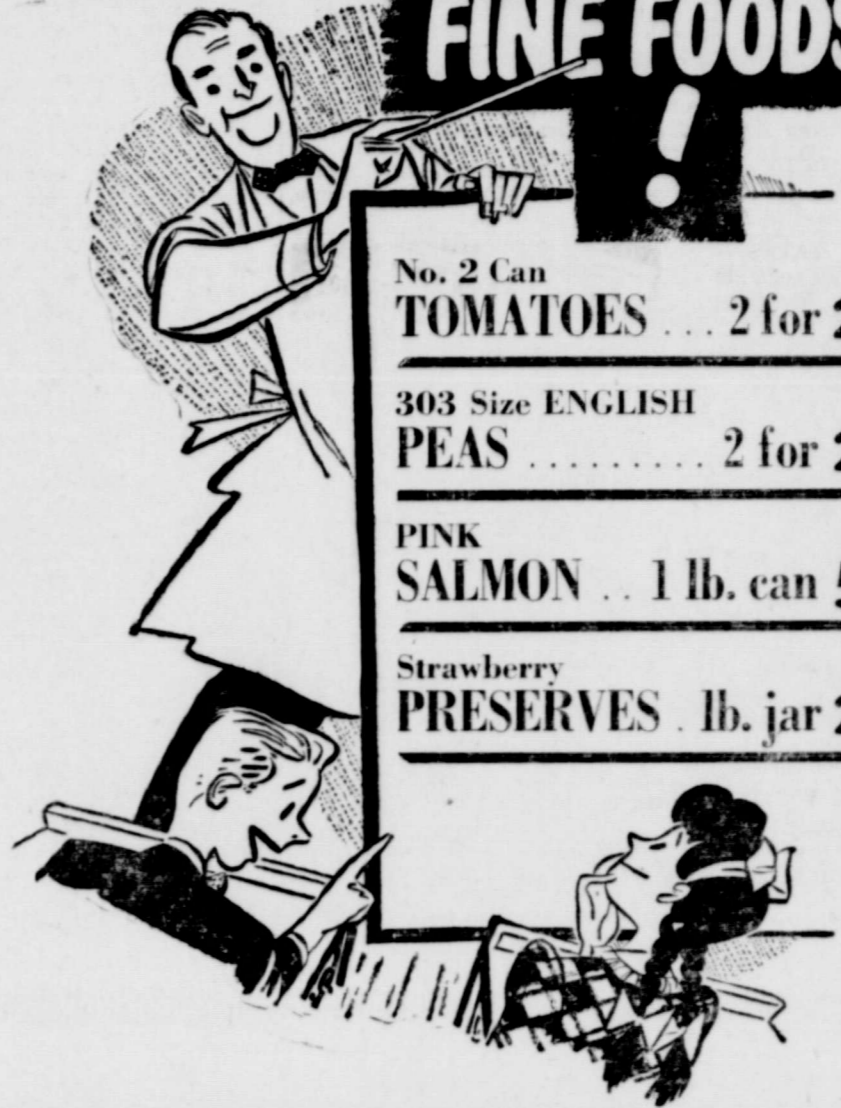

## RECIPE OF THE WEEK

### Party Peach Pie

Broadcast: October 13, 1951

- Mix  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup melted butter,  $\frac{1}{4}$  cups graham cracker crumbs
- Save  $\frac{1}{4}$  cup mixture. Press the rest firmly in bottom and on sides of 9-in. pie pan. Chill.
- Mix  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup sugar,  $\frac{3}{4}$  tablespoons cornstarch,  $\frac{1}{4}$  teaspoon salt
- Stir in slowly until smooth  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup peach syrup,  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup Pet Milk
- Add  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup butter
- Stir over boiling water until thick and smooth. Cook 10 minutes; stir often.
- Remove from heat; stir into  $\frac{1}{2}$  slightly beaten eggs
- Cook and stir over boiling water until mixture thickens. Cover and cool thoroughly.
- Add  $\frac{1}{2}$  teaspoon vanilla
- Pour  $\frac{1}{2}$  of custard into crumb-lined pan.
- Arrange on custard  $\frac{1}{2}$  of (No. 2) can cling peach slices, well-drained
- Cover with rest of custard. Top with rest of peaches. Put rest of crumbs between peaches. Chill 3 hours.


