came west and worked in Abilene three years, and in 1919 opened the Savoy Cafe in Cisco. It has since that time.

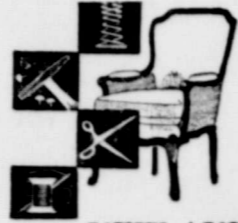

HOLLYWOOD FILM PLAYERS TO VISIT IN CISCO ON MONDAY

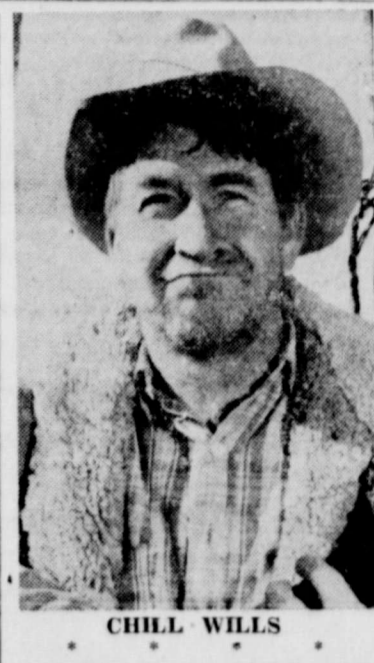

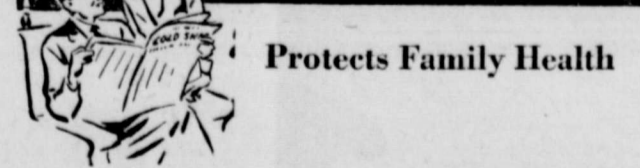

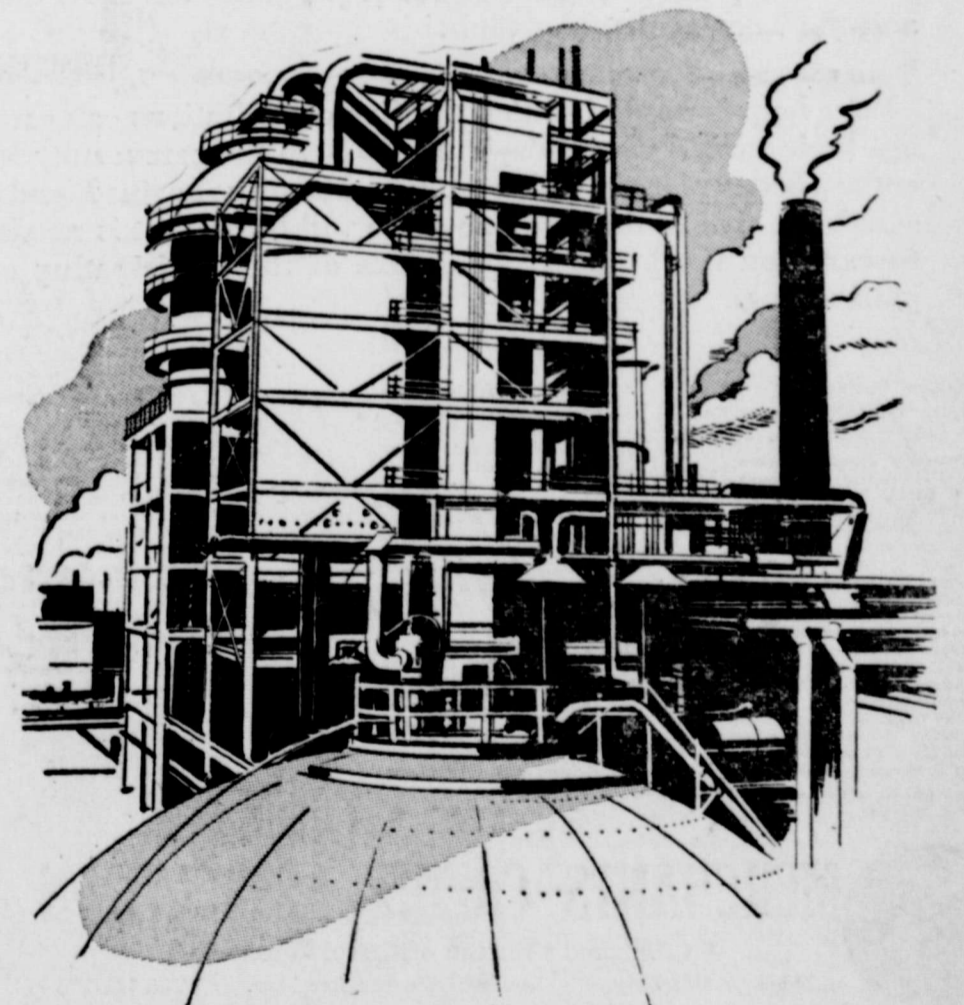
