

Based on its fire loss record, a community can lower its insurance rates as much as 25 per cent in a single year, Brown said. A total of 516 Texas towns and cities are now enjoying fire record credits while only 113 are paying higher insurance rates because of penalties. The maximum credit given is 25% while the maximum penalty that can be assessed is 15%.

A lack of knowledge of insurance laws sometimes results in charges that there are inequities in the rates charged dwelling owners as against those charged mercantile building

"We apply the same yardsticks and the same rate-making system to every class," Brown said The fire insurance commissioner said that the earned premiums of the insurance companies rather than the written premiums are used at a basis for rate adjustments.
