#### Open Weather Is Aid To Harvest On Texas Farms

Harvest of mature crops pro gressed without interruption as open weather continued for the second consecutive week in Texas. Droughty conditions have spread eastward and southward to again cover the State, except along the coast and some extreme eastern counties. The dry weather delayed seeding of small grains and retarded growth of small grain and winter legume crops that were already up to a stand. Army worms invaded small grain fields in increasing numbers in central, southern and southeastern counties.

Seeding of wheat and other small grains was almost at a standstill during the week, although some additional wheat acreage in the northwest was dusted in. Small grains that were up to a stand made virtually no growth, and some crops were dying. Harvest of grain sorghums continued in the High Plains, with some of the northern counties nearing the half-way mark. Harvest of Corn and sorghums in remaining areas continued, but was near completion. In the Coastal Bend, secondgrowth and fall-planted sorghums made good growth, with moisture supplies favorable for continued development.

A light harvest of late hay was put up in east Texas, and the last alfalfa cutting of the 1951 season was being baled in the northeast. Open weather permitted the curing of high quality hay. Peanut harvest was active in the north-central counties with light yields reported. Some peanuts were being baled for hay without threshing. Sweet potatoes were being dug in northeast Texas, where late planted crops made additional growth after the fall rains. Rice harvest was well advanced in most counties, but was delayed somewhat by wet fields in the eastern part of the belt. In the Panhandle,

sugar beet harvest was started. Cotton harvest continued active under favorable conditions in the later producing areas of the State, except in the northern High Plairs where snapping and pulling were just starting. The tempo was increased in southern High Plains and Low Rolling Plains counties, where possibly a fifth of the crop is gathered, and in the Cross Timbers, with about a third harvested. 


