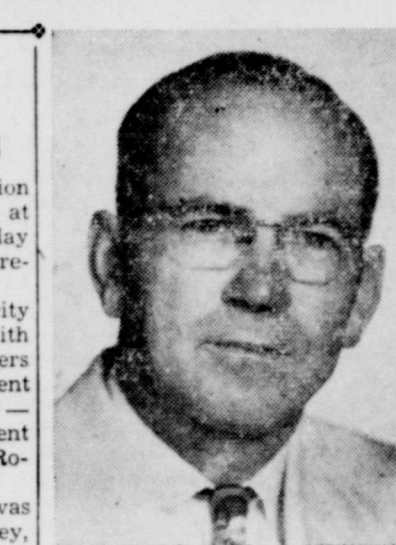

Socialism, as a system of government, has taken some setbacks in countries where the people still have the right to vote.

A still more important test will come when the British people go to the polls to again make a choice between Clement Attlee's Labor government, and the Conservatives under the leadership of the doughty Winston Churchill.

In the last general election, the Labor government managed to gain a paper-thin majority, after having won a relatively easy victory in the previous post-war election.

These anticipations stem from the belief that a majority of the British people have become fed up with the fruits of socialist policy.

The British polls all indicate a Conservative victory, and a Conservative majority in Commons of, perhaps 50 seats and possibly more.

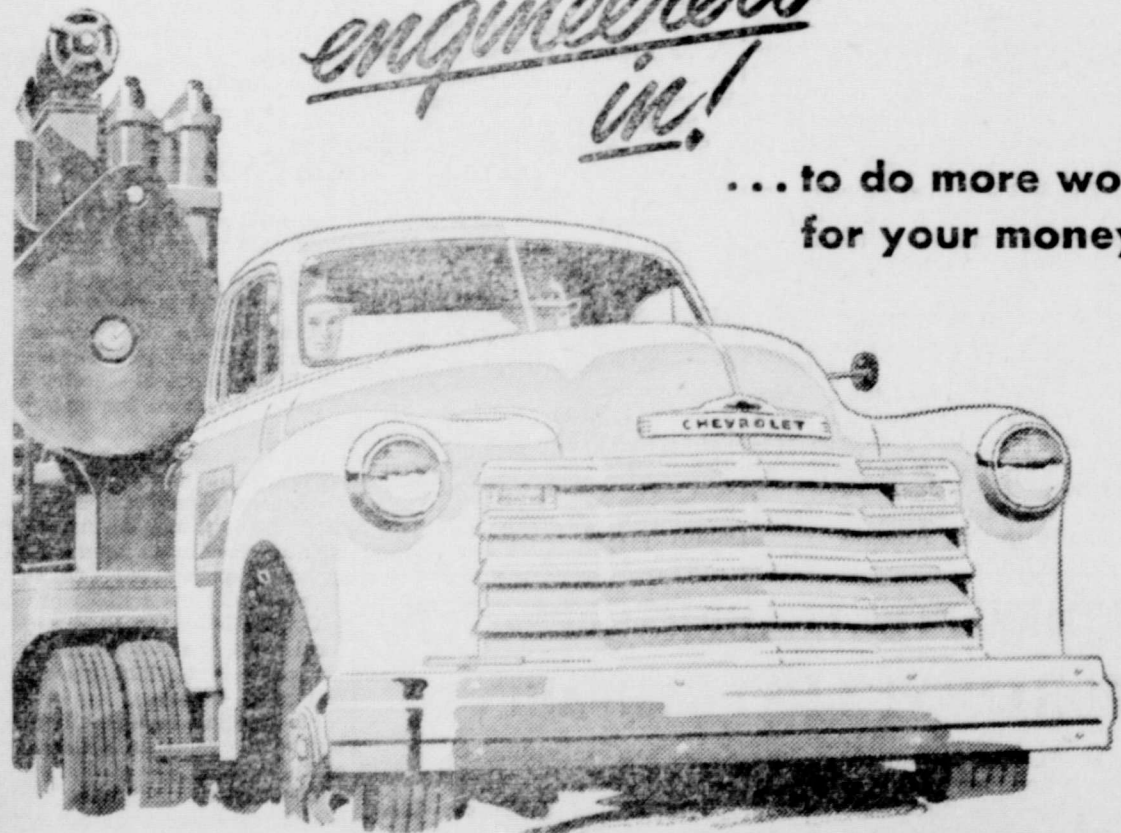

Euell Porter To Bring His H-SU Choir Here Soon

ABILENE, Oct. 20. — When the Hardin-Simmons university chapel choir makes its appearance at the First Baptist Church of Cisco at a 7:30 p. m. concert October 29, it will be directed by Euell Porter, former president of the Texas Music Educators association.

Porter has given the South-west music which has emphasized the dark choral tones of singing, a quality which Porter teaches and believes to be particularly appealing to the listener and whose variety of use makes its application practical and necessary.

"Many musicians recognize the usefulness of the organ effects possible, as well as the beautiful symphonic qualities of voice obtained only with the dark tone," Porter believes.

The Hardin-Simmons instructor is certain that singing with precision, a balance of voices, and clear tone qualities are most important factors in making a successful choir. Porter believes that "all music is good — popular, classical, or sacred, but that there are definite degrees of goodness. Music should be taught for the sake of the participant may enjoy it to the fullest."

It seems to be self-evident that Porter's philosophy is practical. During his three-year stay at Hardin-Simmons, his A Cappella choir toured 5,000 miles annually throughout Texas and New Mexico. It sang at the Southern Baptist conventions in Oklahoma City and Chicago. It also has sung for the past three years at the Texas Baptist convention.

Archie Jones, head of the Music Education department at the University of Texas, has described Porter as not only the outstanding choral director of the Southwest, but also of the United States. "When he was named as head of the Music Educators Association it was a tribute to the growth which he has given choral work during the past ten years in Texas."

When Porter accepted the Hardin-Simmons position, he returned to his alma mater, the school from which he graduated in 1933. He received his master of education degree from Texas

A&M and has done graduate study at the University of Texas and the University of Colorado. Indicative of the popularity of Porter among students was the fact that approximately 20 students came to Hardin-Simmons from Sam Houston when Porter accepted his present position.

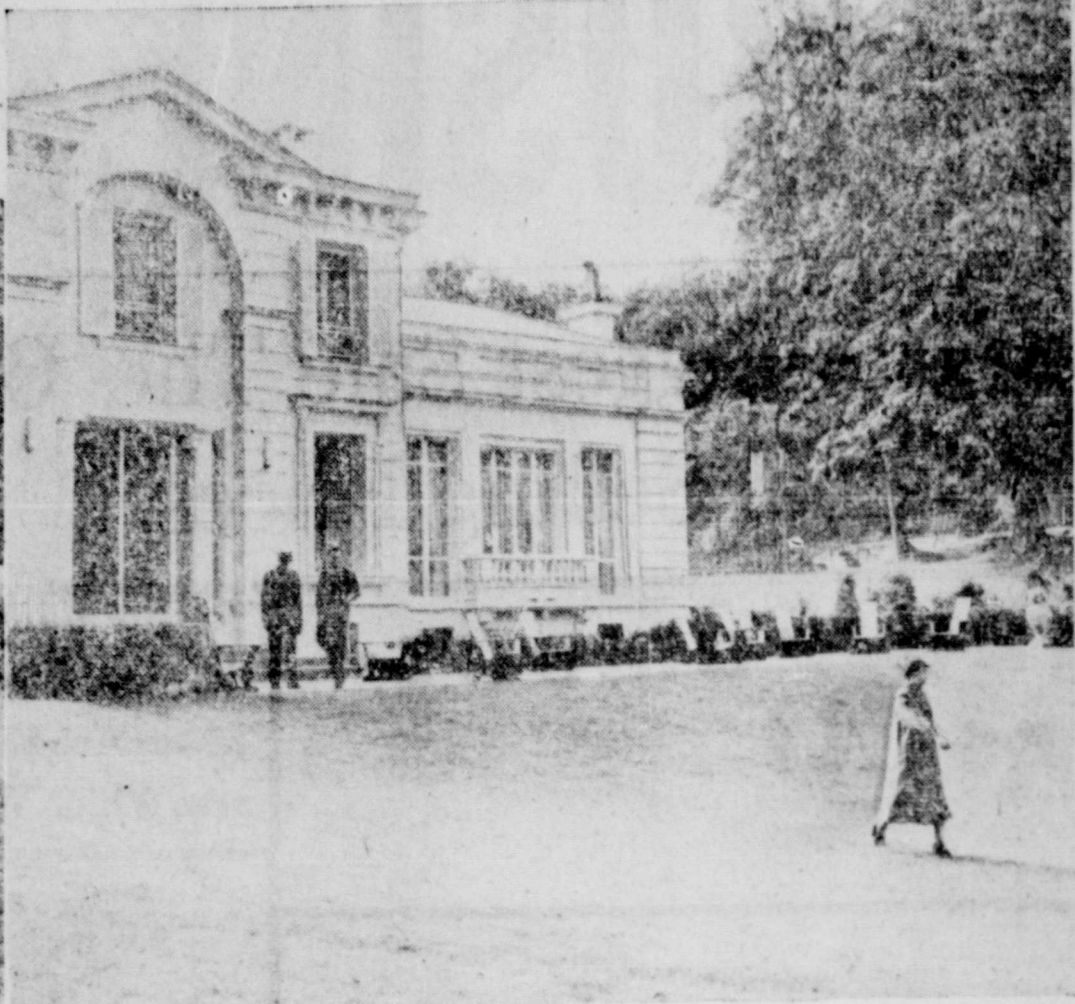

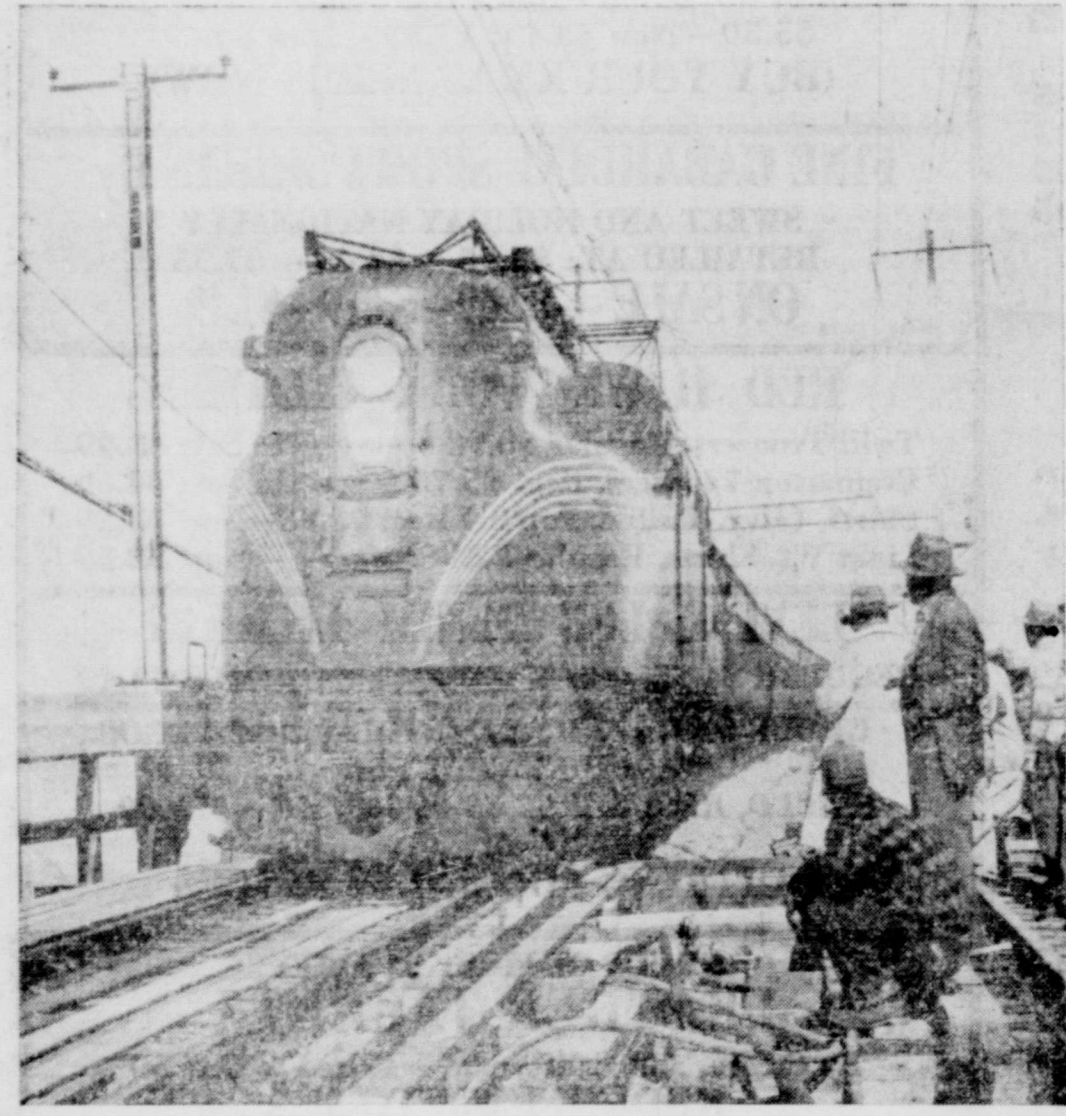

Pneumatic Heart Disease Causes Children Trouble

USTIN, Oct. 19. — Rheumatic disease is now the first cause of death among children ten to fourteen, and is second to tuberculosis at ages 15 to 25. Despite the importance of this disease its cause and cure is not completely established. No vaccine such as those which prevent typhoid fever, diphtheria, smallpox and whooping cough has yet been developed, and its prevention and control are not known, however, some of the danger signals and with the

physician's accurate diagnosis some of the damaging results of the disease may be prevented. Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, points out that in general the danger signals of rheumatic fever are pain and swelling in the joints of the knees, ankles, elbows or wrists. The pain is usually felt in one of these centers and spread to the other. Often times a child will get irritable and cross without any visible signs of a good reason for this attitude; he may cry easily or develop habits of nervousness. A physician should be consulted at once in such a situation, for these symptoms may be the beginning of rheumatic fever. Exposure to frequent chilling, damp or overcrowded living quarters, a poor diet, an attack of scarlet fever, a bad cold or other infection caused by certain streptococcus germs are likely to be predisposing factors in the appearance of rheumatic fever. According to Dr. Cox the best safeguards against this disease are to have each child and adult examined at least once a year by a physician, to have the right kind of foods for an adequate diet and to have plenty of rest, when the disease is suspected of being present, a doctor should be consulted at once.

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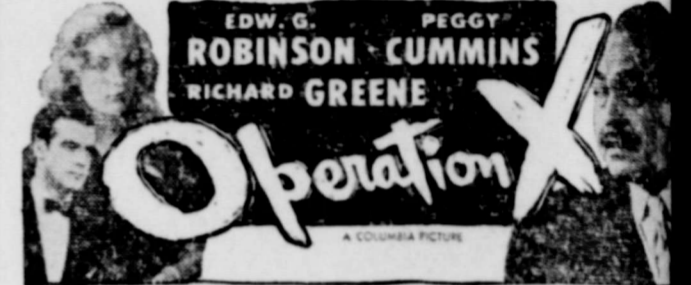
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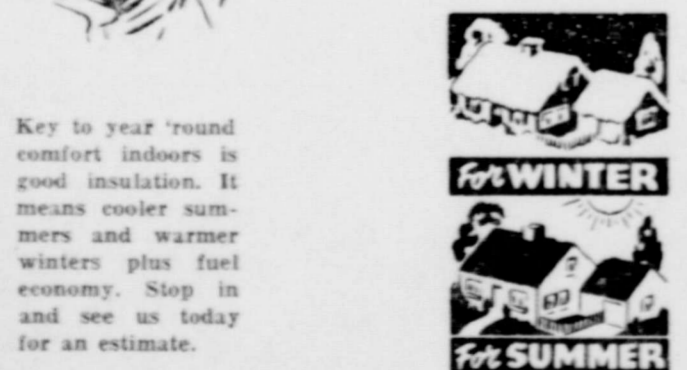
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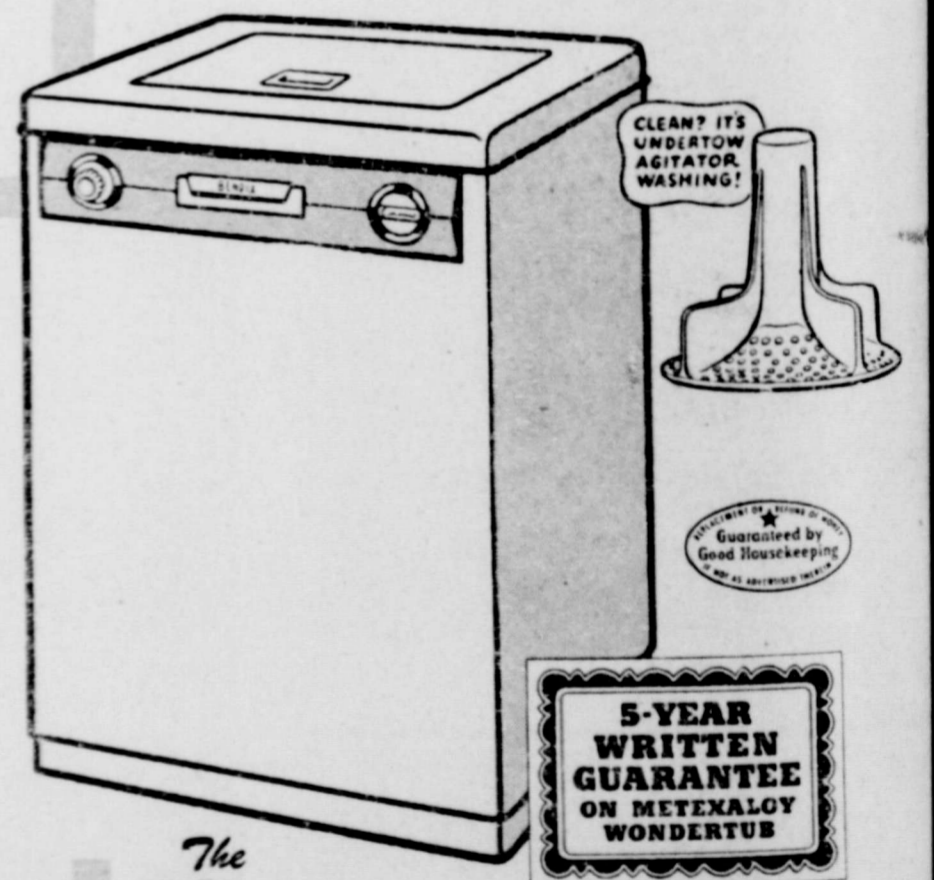
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
