Loboes Overpower Indians; Win Conference Game, 20-6

The Cisco High School Loboes used old-fashioned power football Friday night to pile up 306 yards rushing and win an easy 20-to-6 conference game from the Comanche High Indians at Comanche. Most of the game was played in a steady rain.

The Loboes struck twice in the first quarter and the outcome never seemed in doubt. Heavy rain in the second and third periods slowed down both teams somewhat, but the Loboes came back in the fourth period to put the game on ice.

Scoring touchdowns for Cisco were Bobby Black, Dan Gray and Doug Johnson. Bobby Cleveland kicked two goals for extra points. Quarterback Robert Jackson, carrying the ball some 26 times, led the Lobo offense as the Cisco team, depending on their ground game, taking no chances with the wet ball and field.

The Lobo line did a splendid job in keeping the Indian attack under control. Gray was one of the defensive stars. His touchdown came in the first period when Wayne Rumsey, another defensive standout, got through and blocked an Indian punt that rolled into the end zone where Gray fell on the ball. Black's touchdown came early in the game — a 11 yard sweep

around end. Johnson's score in the fourth period was a 5-yard off tackle buck. Johnson seemed to have more drive than in any game this season, indicating that his weak knee is no longer a worry. Jackson was Mr. Power, carrying the ball more than he usually does. He had two 35-yard runs called back due to clipping penalties. Reo Evans did a fine blocking job and was injured in the last half, Bobby Cleveland replacing him. Cleveland played on the defense throughout the game.

The Loboes suffered no serious wounds. Guard Red Melton was bruised up in the second period and Rumsey took over his chores in the line. Cleveland handled the place kicking admirably and Boy Gallagher went in for kick-offs.

The game opened with Cisco kicking off. Comanche took over on their 33 yard line, and Hicks hit Turner with a 7-yard pass. Two line bucks then failed to gain and Irvin Brunkenhofer pushed an Indian into the punter, blocking it. Cisco took over then on the Indian 28. Jackson hit center for 5 yards and Black circled for a first down on the Indian 28. Johnson picked up two yards and Black swept to a touchdown. Melton missed the uprights.

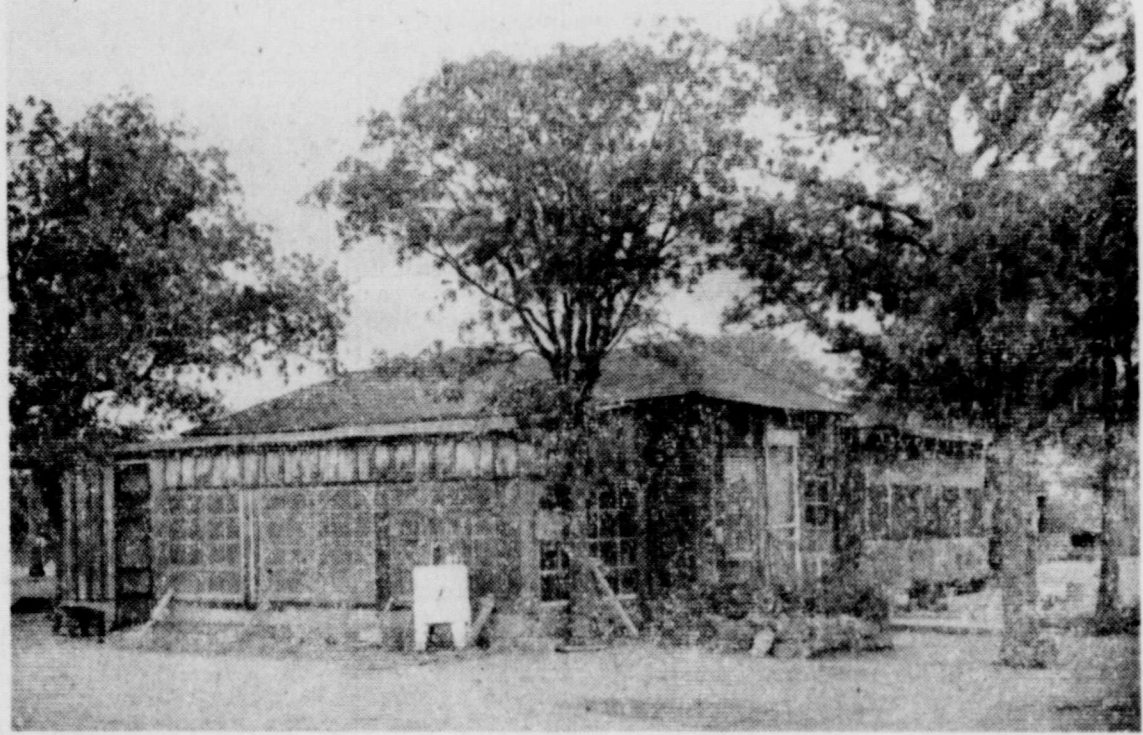

Housing Project Will Hold Opening Sunday Afternoon

A Family Home — Before and After



This picture illustrates the purpose of the \$430,000 low rent housing project in Cisco. The top scene was the home of a family that was assigned the first apartment in the new project. It was known as a sub-standard home — that is, it had no indoor bath room or modern features. The lower picture shows the family's new home — a two-bedroom brick apartment with bath, refrigerator, gas cook stove and heater and many built-ins. The rent paid by the family is approximately the same. Fifty-two Cisco area families will have new homes as a result of the housing project. Ciscoans may see the apartments from 2 to 4 p. m. Public Invited To Inspect New Rent Apartments

All Cisco has been invited to attend an open house from 2 to 4 p. m. Sunday at the newly completed Cisco Housing Project, according to an announcement Saturday by Chairman S. H. Nance of the city housing authority.

The \$430,000 project was accepted Thursday by the authority from the E. M. Lambert and Son Construction Company, the contractors. The first tenant lease was signed the same day, and half of the apartments are expected to be filled during the coming week.

Considerable detail work goes into the completion and processing of each application and lease contract. There were some 65 applications on file for the 52 apartment.

The open house will enable Ciscoans to see what their city has done to raise the living standards of low-income people, Mr. Nance said. He pointed out that the project's purpose is to raise living standards. He saw little likelihood of the apartments competing with rental properties that are standard.

Those who attend the open house were asked to visit vacant apartments unless tenants invite them to enter their quarters. Everyone was asked to be careful to keep the apartments clean and free of mud and not to handle the appliances.

The project includes apartments of all sizes — from one bedroom to four bedrooms. Each apartment is equipped with an electric refrigerator, a gas stove, hot water heater, wall heaters, and many built-in features. They have concrete floors, metal windows and are entirely modern.

Nearly a year was required from the time the project application went in until its completion.

Mr. Nance asked members of the housing authority to attend the open house event to assist in showing visitors through the apartments.

Plans at the First Methodist Church call for each night to be dedicated to special groups. Monday night will be Men's Night; Tuesday, Women's Night; Wednesday, Family Night; Thursday, Teachers and Officers Night; and Friday, Youth Night.

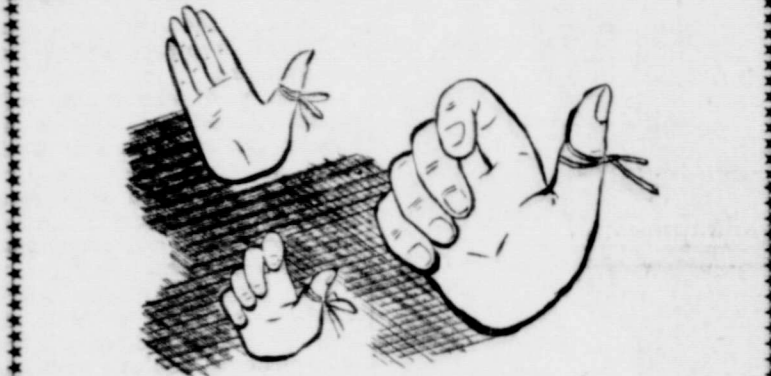


H-SU CHOIR WILL SING HERE IN MONDAY NIGHT PROGRAM

Turner made 11 yards on three bucks, and then got loose for 44 yards to the Cisco 15. Turner then drove to the Cisco 6 on two bucks. Hicks passed to Turner for 5 yards. Here Turner hit the line and fumbled, Cisco recovering and taking over on their 20. Jackson got loose for 24 yards as the half ended.

Third Period
Webb brought the kickoff back to the Cisco 25. Jackson picked up 10 yards on two bucks. Jackson made 3 yards and Black got loose for 43 yards to the Indian 20. Johnson made 2 and Jackson drove 10 yards. Four line bucks failed and the Indians took over on their 7. Turner got loose for 13 yards in two tries and then the Loboes held and forced a punt on the Indian 40. Jackson picked up 13 yards, Black 4, Johnson 2 and Jackson's jump pass was intercepted on the Indian 18 as the quarter ended.

Fourth Quarter
Hicks banged through for 14 yards. Three plays then failed and Turner punted to the Cisco 27. Johnson got 12 yards in two bucks, and three bucks netted Jackson 21 yards to the Indian 43. Black circled for 20 yards, Johnson for 11 and Black made 3. Johnson then drove through for a touchdown. Cleveland converted.

Gallagher kicked to the Indian 37. Bob Qualls recovered a fumble on the Indian 45. Cisco drew a 15 yard penalty, and Black made 5. Johnson lost 14 yards on a passing effort. Jackson made 5 yards and his punt was blocked, the Indians recovering on the Cis-

co 35. Three plays made a first down, and Turner got 12 yards on three more plays. The game ended on the Cisco 11.

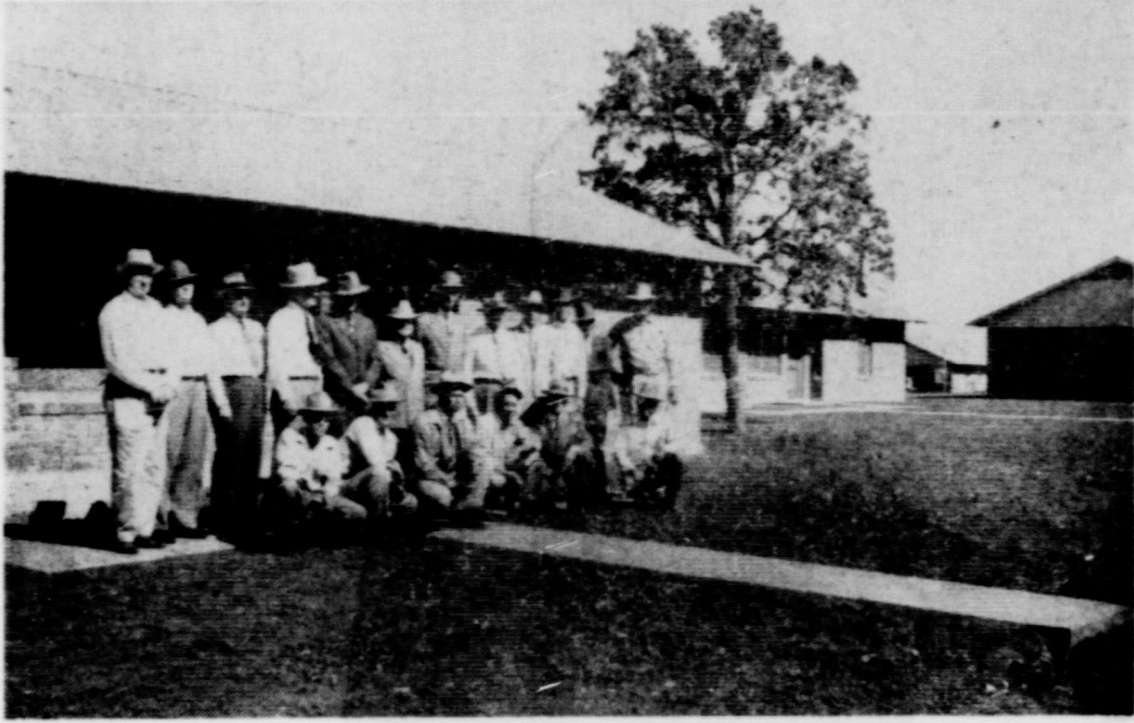

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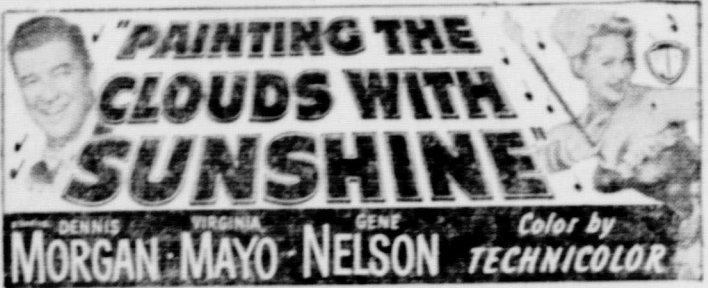

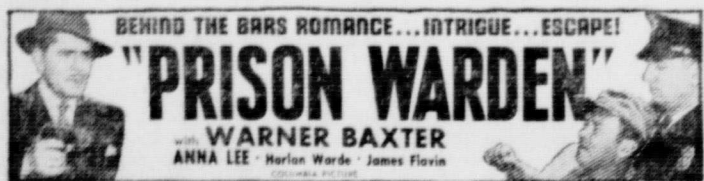
