OPS Forms Plan To Handle Excise **Tax Collections**

FORT WORTH, Oct. 30 .- The Office of Price Stablilization has clarified its propsals to govern pass throughs by wholesalers and retailers of changes in certain manufacturers' excise taxes which become effective November 1.

OPS pointed out that where excise taxes have traditionally been listed separately by resellers and passed on to the customer only on an actual dollars-and-cents basis, no percentage markup will be per mitted on the tax increase

However, the recent Herlong amendment to the Defense Production Act and other factors require OPS to allow wholesalers and retailers a percentage markup on such taxes in those cases where such sellers have customarily treated the amount of excise taxof trust. The OPS pointed out today that under the Herlong amendment the agency is required in any new regulation 'or amendment thereto' to reflect the customary percentage margins over cost of the pre-Korean period, May 24-June 24,

In view of the Herlong amendment, wholesalers and retailers who have customarily taken mark ups on costs including excise taxes must be permitted to continue to do so. Further, any new regulation of OPS, it was pointed out, also will have to permit markups on excise taxes, if such markups have been customary in the indus-

Mississippi Lime **Test Flows Oil**

A western extension for Cisco townsite oil was in prospect today after the E. C. Connally No. 1 A. Z. Myrick, semi-wildcat just south of the city, recorded a good show of oil and gas in a drill stem test.

The Myrick well topped the Lake sand pay horrizon at 3,410 feet Sunday afternoon. After drilling ten more feet, a drill stem test was run from 3,413-20 feet. Gas appeared at the surface in two minutes. With the tools open two hours and 20 minutes, recovery was 50 feet of oil and 90 feet of very heavy

oil-cut mud. Drilling in the well was continuing at 3,435 feet at noon to-Observers said the outlook for the well was "very good." It was regarded by some oil men as a better prospect than two flowing wells drilled in recent

Besides the Myrick land of more than 200 acres, Connally has other holdings in the area of the now well. He drilled the townsite discovery well - his No. 1 Sam Baugh.

A potential Mississippian oil strike for the area southwest of Cisco was also in prospect here today. The Ownsby Drilling Company No. 1 Mrs. Effie Brown was being completed in the reef formation

According to reports, the Brown well flowed approximately 100 barrels of oil on a completion test. Some 20 feet of a 73-foot Mississippi lime section was perforated for the completion effort. Production was from about

3,700 feet. The Brown well is about five miles southwest of Cisco. It was understood that Ownsby has considerable acreage under lease in the area and that future develop-

ment is planned. Two miles north of Cisco, the Harold M. Kupp No. 1 Weddington was drilling in the top of the Ellenberger lime formation.

In the Bankline-Owens pool, five miles northeast of Cisco, the Bankline Oil Company's No. 1 Reynolds-White was drilling at 3,090 feet in an offset to production.
