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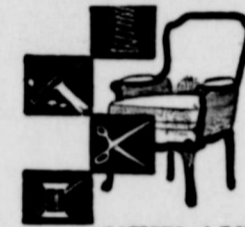
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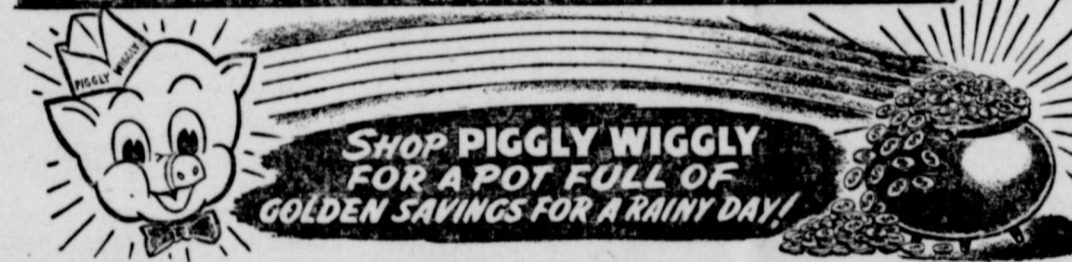

ARMY EXERCISES IN GERMANY



EXERCISE JUPITER—Along 120 miles of the Rhine Valley in Germany, the greatest concentration of French and Allied troops ever assembled under the command of Gen. Eisenhower started the French Fall maneuvers. Stalking through the streets of a small village, above, French Moroccan infantry units play their realistic role during the operations of the maneuvers. The mock



combat included a mass air jump by 500 paratroopers of the French 25th Airborne Division who leaped to join forces with French and American units battling eastward across the Rhine River. Members of a mock German Labor Service unit, top, above, man one of the many amphibious "ducks" which carried U. S. troops across the river in the Commando-like maneuvers. Once across, U. S. troops pile out of the craft and clamber up the east bank with a bazooka, to hurl back the "enemy." A sky-blackening air grouping of Allied planes repelled "enemy" planes.



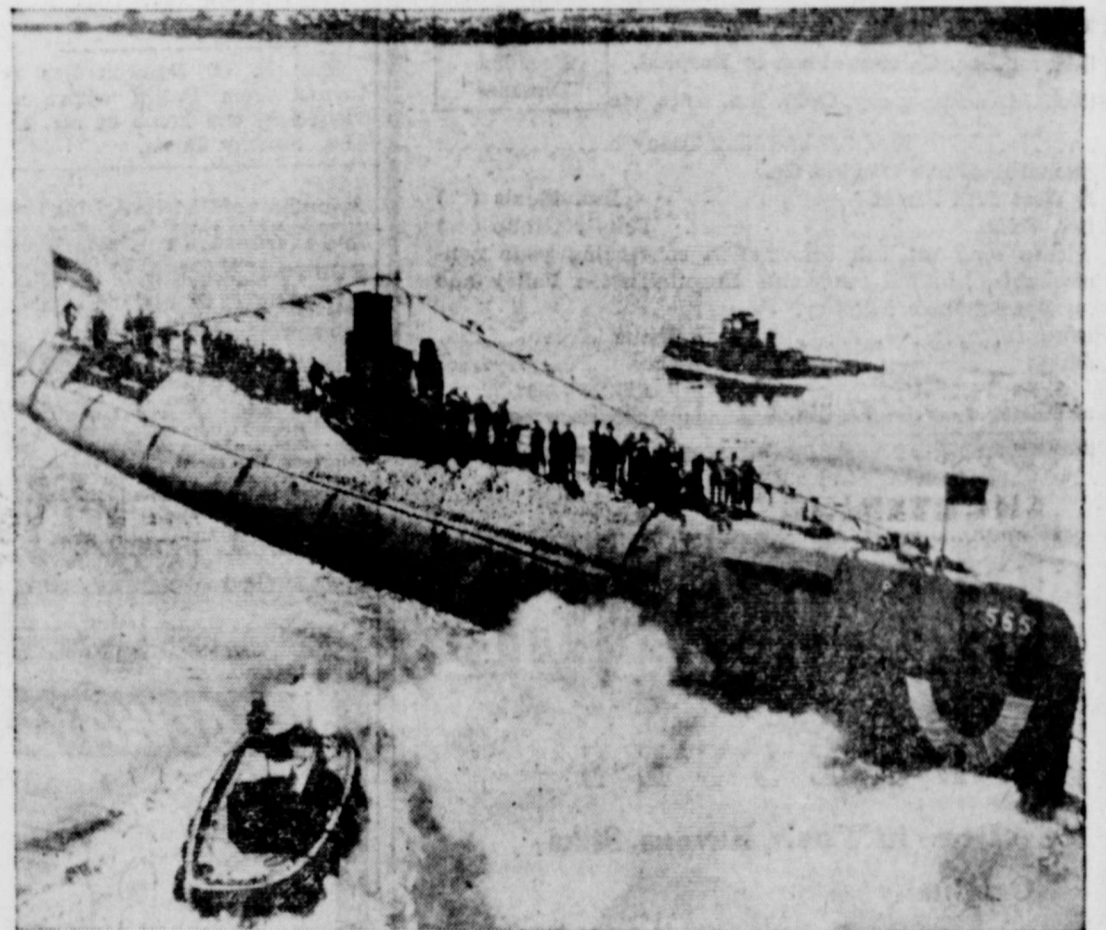

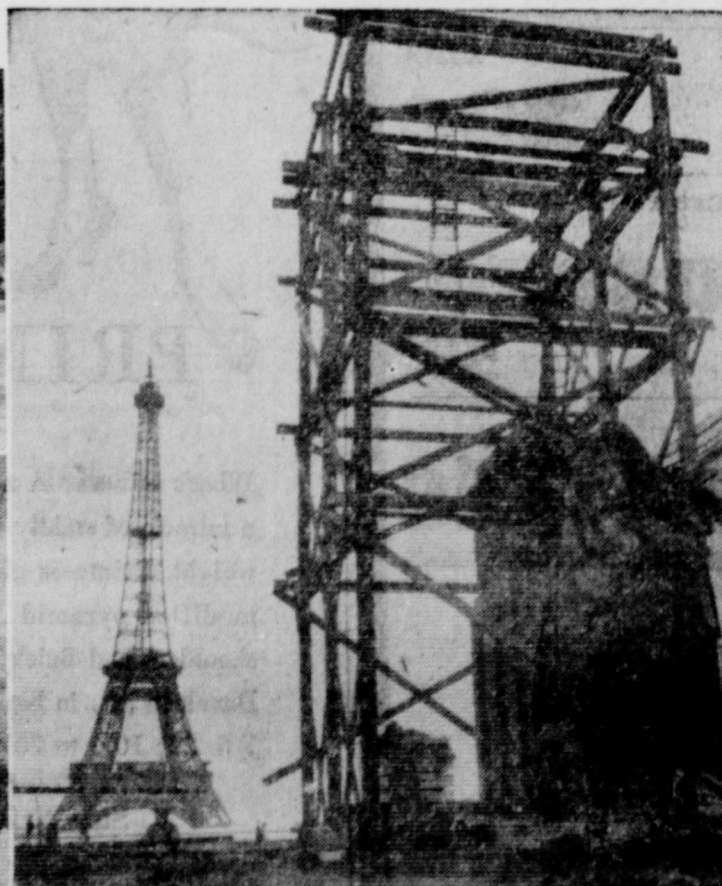

Military Leaders Support Plans For USO Fund Drive

DALLAS, Nov. 1. — Military leaders throughout Texas are strong in their support of the USO as one of the most important factors in the morale of our steadily enlarging army of defense, Ben H. Wooten, campaign chairman of Texas' \$700,000 appeal for the USO, said today.

Said Maj. Gen. K. L. Berry, Adjutant Gen. of Texas, to all commanders of the Texas National Guard, Texas Air National Guard, and Texas State Guard Reserve Corps: "Knowing the necessity for having a USO as you and I know it, I desire each of you to inform your subordinates of what the USO does, and of the necessity of supporting it by taking an active part in a campaign to raise the Texas goal of \$700,000."

Charlie Gibson, State Commander of the American Legion, told local commanders throughout the state: "As members of the Legion, we can best evidence our interest in the welfare of our nation and the members of our Armed Forces, by joining in to help make this campaign for the USO a success. To me, a most important by-product of such a campaign is the interest it helps create among our fellow citizens in so many phases of our national defense program."

Brig. Gen. Paul L. Wakefield, State Director of the Selective Service System, wrote all local board members throughout Texas: "The work of the USO is very closely associated with our activities, because its entire services are devoted to the men and women serving in our Armed Forces. The top leaders of the various branches of service have requested USO and we of the Selective Service of Texas should render every assistance we possibly can."

Gen. C. S. Irvine, commanding, Carswell Air Force Base, Fort Worth, said: "You can be sure of my complete support. I am most interested in the success of the USO program."
