ONE OF THE students of Cisco High School called this morning to say she will bet that Mr. J. H. Laston can play golf, for he is a splendid master of ceremonies.

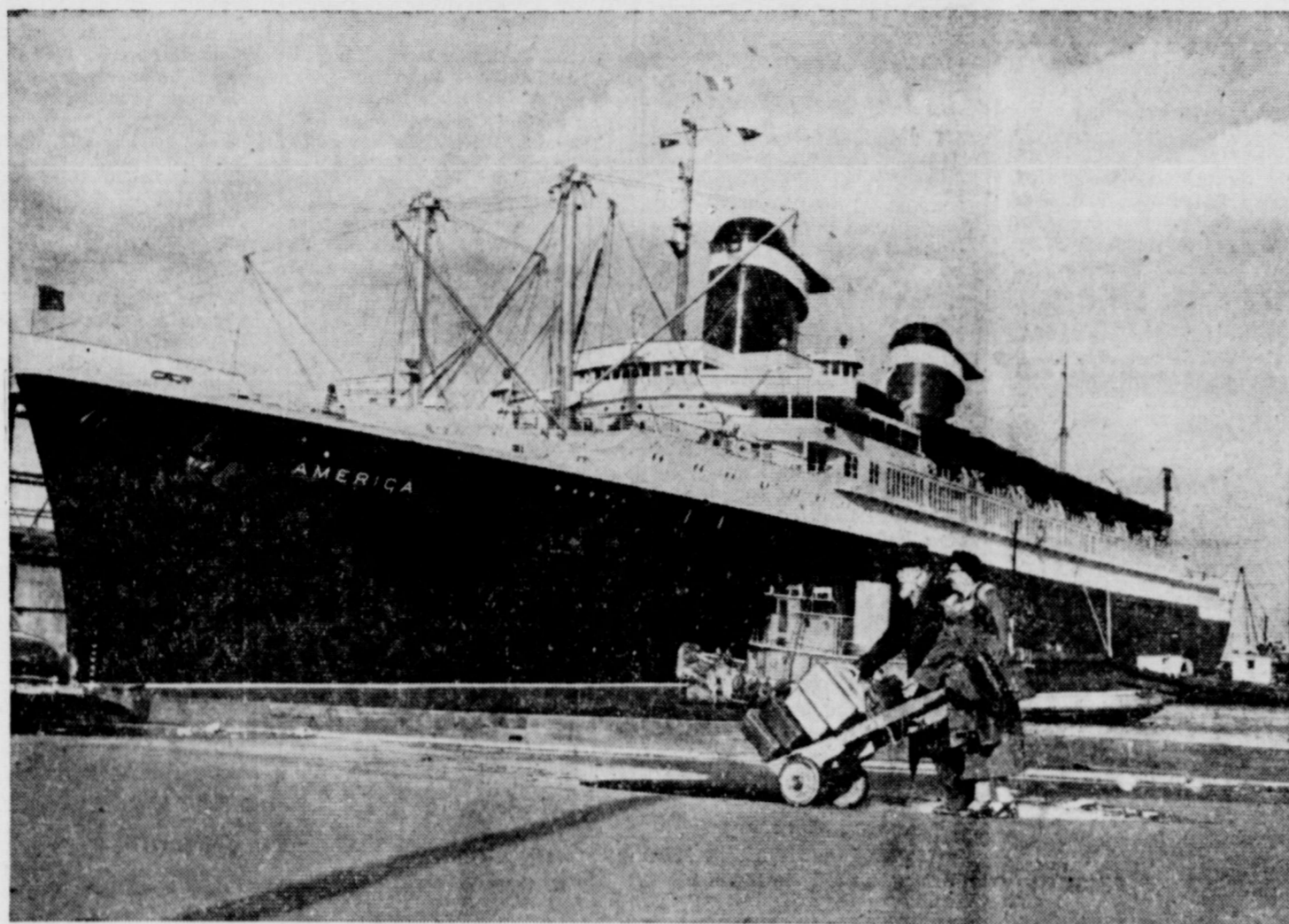
THIS IS A small world and we have Mr. Lonnie Crosby's word for it. He is stationed at Fort Ord, California, for basic army training.

Future Of Livestock Show To Be Decided At Meet Tonight

ELECTION ISSUES

The GI Land Program

One of the election issues which Texans will decide next Tuesday in a constitutional amendment election is the veterans land program.

Two years ago, the state issued \$25,000,000 worth of bonds for the purpose. All of the money was borrowed by veterans who bought some 4,000 farms.

Records show that the average land purchase amounted to \$6,000 at an average of \$60 per acre, including improvements.

If Texas voters give the proposal their approval, the Veterans Land Board will be ready to start issuing bonds and making loans without delay.

Under the new setup, the board will purchase for a veteran a particular tract of land costing up to \$15,000, but the maximum loan it can make would be \$7,500.

After December 1, 1959, money received by the land board through repayments must be set aside to retire the bonds.

The proposed law makes the new bonds more attractive by making them eligible for securing public funds and legal investments for any political subdivision of the state.

This seems like a good proposition. Supporters believe that the state will be able to help its veterans without being out any expense.

But it's up to you and the other voters when you go to the polls next Tuesday.

Duck Hunting To Begin Friday In Most Of State

AUSTIN, Nov. 8. — Wishing Texas sportsmen "good hunting" during the waterfowl season opening at noon, November 9, the Director of Law Enforcement for the Game and Fish Commission listed some reminders for successful shooting.

They are: Daily shooting hours on ducks and geese are from one-half hour before sunup to one hour before sundown.

Bag limits are five a day and ten in possession for ducks and five a day and five in possession for geese.

Shotguns may not be larger than ten gauge; rifles may not be used to shoot waterfowl.

Waterfowl may not be shot on any State or Federal refuge or preserve. Also they may not be shot on any public road or highway.

Waterfowl may not be taken from any power driven boat or from a boat under tow or sail.

Mourning dove, south zone, November 15; general state open season on deer and turkey, November 16, with many local laws taking precedence over the main statute.

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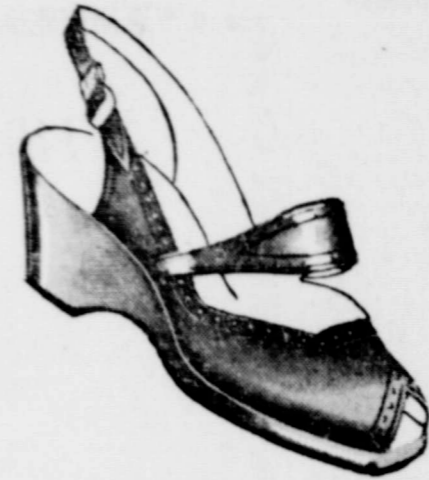
