Coach Ferguson is headed for Paradise

Friona Head Coach and Athletic Director Bob Ferguson has resigned to accept a position with the Paradise Independent School District.

Ferguson has been a mainstay in the FISD system for 16 years, joining as an assistant coach under James Morton in 1992 and being promoted to head coach in 2002. In 1992 the chiefs went 0-10 but rose to a 1996 state 3A semi-final game in Texas Stadium before losing to Tatum. Ferguson has coached football, baseball, track, and powerlifting during his Friona career.

Paradise is located in Wise County, near Bridgeport and Decatur. They are a 2A school playing as the Paradise Panthers. He told the Star staff this week that the population of Paradise is about 500, but the high school enrollment is 328, similar to Friona.

"Paradise is about the size of Nazareth," Ferguson said, "but the surrounding area is

made up of small communities that feed into the Paradise system."

At Paradise, Coach Ferguson will not have a head coach role. "I'll be assistant coach in football, baseball, powerlifting, and track," he said, "which is basically what I did when I first came to Friona." He also teaches science and the Paradise ISD just recently passed a bond issue which includes a new science facility.

Deirdre Ferguson, a Friona second grade teacher, will teach in the Paradise elementary school. Son Alex will be a junior next year and daughter Ashton will be in 4th grade.

Friona Star publisher Ron Carr noted that, "Coach Ferguson has always been very accessible and cooperative in providing statistics and information to the newspaper. We wish him and the family all the best in this new career adventure."

Bob has accepted a coach/teacher position with the Paradise Independent School District after 16-years in Friona. There were many well-wishers for the Ferguson family.

Lenders gain understanding of dairies

High Plains lenders are familiar with the cattle feeding industry, but they need a different financial understanding with the dairy industry.

After requests from several lenders, Texas AgriLife Extension Service held a seminar to allow bankers to hear from specialists and dairy operators about the industry and its financial needs, said Dr. Steve Amosson, AgriLife Extension economist in Amarillo.

Many of the bankers came in with some understanding of dairy, but needed a broader base of knowledge regarding how the industry works, Amosson said. "They are trying to figure out if it is a niche market," he said.

"We wanted to help them understand things like herd turnover rates, cash-flow requirements and how prices are derived."

The dairy industry in Texas has an economic output of about \$3.9 billion, said David Anderson, AgriLife Extension economist from College Station. "It is not a small industry, and more and more of it is moving to the Panhandle."

Dr. Ellen Jordan, AgriLife Extension dairy specialist, said there are currently permits for about 2 million head of dairy cows in the High Plains, but she explained to the bankers that the industry would never grow that large here. Many of

those are permits obtained by landowners trying to market their property, Jordan said.

The region has about 150,000 head of dairy cattle and that could double in the next 10 years, but the numbers won't grow rapidly beyond that due to limited water supplies and other conditions.

Some of the most pressing issues for producers, as outlined in meetings of the Southern Great Plains Dairy Consortium, are environmental quality and related regulations, product quality and safety, economics and marketing, labor (ability to attract, retain and house), water utilization and energy resources and related costs, Jordan said.

Two producers, Mike Schouten of Deaf Smith County and Harry DeWitt of Pamer County, said coming to the High Plains from the Stephenville area has meant some changes in their operations.

One of the biggest is the amount of farming they have to do to control feed costs on the dairy. That has meant different ways of dealing with their line of credit, they said.

Another is providing an education for those not familiar with the industry. "One of the biggest faux pas you can make as a banker would be to appraise my cows and then determine the market has moved and you change your appraisal, which changes my operating ability," Schouten said. "Try to keep from

going too high in the first place, so no major changes are necessary."

Using reclamation values and understanding there is a certain amount of risk involved is the best practice, the two said. DeWitt said when times were tough in 2006, an average-producing cow would be valued at \$1,700, and six months ago, that price would have been \$2,300.

Anderson told the group that while dairy cow numbers have gone down significantly across the nation, production of milk has gone up - with the High Plains as a growth region.

Feed costs for the past three years have risen from \$6.70 per hundredweight of milk to more than \$7.60 per hundredweight. And the cost to produce milk in the Texas north dairy area has gone from \$15 per hundredweight to \$17 per hundredweight, Anderson said.

"The largest cost component is feed on a dairy; it's more than half of the operating expense and getting bigger," he said. Because feed prices are higher, the milk-to-feed ratio traditionally would indicate this should be a time of herd reduction, Anderson said. But it is not. Dairy production is still a profitable industry because of higher milk prices. "Much of the price increase being seen by consumers now is being spurred by (international) trade," he said.

Strong exports, an Australian drought and lower production

in Europe has kept milk prices high, Anderson said. The exports are not of fluid milk, but rather milk-derived products such as whey and powdered milk.

He explained the complicated milk pricing system, saying the price of cheese is ultimately what determines the price of milk. Class I milk goes for milk; Class II is for ice cream; Class III is for cheese; and Class IV is for butter and powdered milk.

The Class I price is based on location and the value of milk in making cheese, butter and powder, he said. It takes approximately 10 pounds of milk to produce a pound of cheese. Therefore, if cheese is \$1.90 per pound, it makes the price of that milk \$19 per hundredweight.


Historically speaking, the cheese price is about \$1.40 a pound, so the industry is experiencing some extremely high prices right now. However, their costs of production have risen significantly as well.

Non-fat dry milk increased in price last year due to export trade, but is now beginning to come down, Anderson said. Butter prices went down last year. But whey, a by-product of making cheese, has seen a jump in prices because of the increasing popularity of protein drinks.

"If we ship a lot of powder over to another country, we are going to have higher milk prices here," he said. "It changes every month, by the value of those products."

Sooner than they like to think, they will be dragging out the old yearbooks, and




Don't know why a boat lady would be emailing recipes, except that most ladies are walking recipe books anyway. Don't know how ya'll do it. Nina says this casserole is quick and easy but still tastes like you spent all afternoon in the kitchen.

Most of you ladies already know how to make this don't you? I think I have had this several times in different ways. Quick and easy and sounds good too. Can you use Rotel with green chiles? How about sour cream and onion Doritos? Experiment. Your family will love you for it.

Mexican chicken casserole

- 4 boneless chicken breasts
- Doritos chips
- 1 small block Velveeta cheese
- 1 can Cream of Chicken soup
- 1 can Cream of Mushroom soup
- 1 can Rotel
- 1 cup chicken broth

Boil the chicken breasts until cooked through. Set aside one cup of the broth. Cube the chicken and lay in the bottom of a greased 9 X 13 dish. Crush a layer of Doritos over the chicken. Slice the block of Velveeta into 11 or 12 even slices. Lay them over the Doritos, leaving cracks. Mix the Rotel, both soups, and the broth. Pour this mixture over the cheese. Cover and bake for about 25 to 30 minutes at 350 degrees.

When I was a child back in the 50s, Reeve Lake was pretty much out there all by its lonesome near the corner of Highway 214 and Highway 60. There was a baseball field just north of the lake just about where the community center now is and it was the only field we had for many years. Some great games of summer baseball took place there.

The lake was a playa lake and its size depended upon the rainfall in any given year; and there were certainly no trees gracing its shores back then as there are today. This past Sunday on Mother's Day from 1 to 4 p.m., this Lake was once more the scene of activity with the latest Fishing Derby Day sponsored by the City of Friona through the Texas Junior Angler's Association. This is the fifth year for the derbies under City Manager Terri Johnson.

For their investment, the City of Friona gets 500 lbs of grain-fed channel catfish, special prizes awarded including a bike, tents, sleeping bags, fishing gear, tackle boxes, skate boards and T-Shirts. Trophies are awarded for the biggest

fish caught overall—the bike—and for the largest fish caught in each of three age groups: 6 & under, 7 to 11, and 12 to 16. Adults are allowed to help their little ones fish when necessary.

The Texas Junior Angler's Association also provides fishing poles and bait for the junior fishermen to use for anyone who needs them. If you break a line, just come back and get another pole that's rigged and ready to use. City Employees take turns working at the Derby when their families are not fishing. Glendel Jones, city employee, has been diligently working to get the area cleared for this special event and 4-Way Pump Company made a special donation toward the Derby.

It was heartwarming to see the approximately 150 children plus their families turned out for this wonderful family outing. T-Shirts and smaller trophies were also available for a donation of \$10 to the Texas Junior Angler's Association. Jeff Scott, of the TJAA, said that our "Friona kids were some of the nicest and most polite that he's seen" (and he goes all over the state of Texas). I was really proud to have been there to hear that and just wanted to share it with all of you, especially the parents.



PPHM opening Colt exhibit

Samuel Colt is in the building.

It took three semi trucks to bring the blockbuster exhibition *Samuel Colt: Arms, Art and Invention* to the Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum. One of the four museums in the nation and the only Texas venue to host this exclusive exhibit, PPHM is also the last chance for the public to see the collection before it goes back into storage in Hartford, Connecticut.

Beginning May 24 the exhibition will be open to the public in the Harrington Changing Gallery.

From firearm prototypes to fine art to awards from the Czar of Russia, the Samuel Colt exhibit gives a broader perspective of this highly influential business man whose innovations in manufacturing and marketing changed the way business was done in America.

In many respects Samuel Colt was more a man of the twentieth century than the nineteenth. The Bill Gates of his day, Colt was both an inventor and a name. His marketing savvy produced the first celebrity endorsements, introduced "new and improved" as an advertising motto, and demonstrated the value of branding. Colt introduced production lines six decades before Ford and invented machinery for making interchangeable parts for pistols, which other manufacturing industries soon followed after.

The exhibition opens with the development of revolving firearms. Their evolution had been stalled for two centuries until 1830, when sixteen-year-old Colt had what only can be called an epiphany, one that forever changed his life and the history of the world. As a crewman aboard the Boston brig *Corvo*, Colt had observed the locking action of the ship's wheel and whittled a model of what was to become the first practical revolver.

The exhibition traces his progress in perfecting effective, cost-efficient revolvers. While other inventors were attempting to redefine the architecture of the handgun, Colt devised new styles that were to take hold, and that continue in use to this day.

Colt knew that a product's fine craftsmanship and aesthetic appeal were crucial to consumer acceptance. Colt's arms are immediately identifiable, characterized by simplicity of form, elegant line, and eye-catching finishes meant to reflect light—highly polished blue steel, color casehardening, and cool white silver-plate.

Colt's remarkable standing as an international celebrity is confirmed with the display of presentation pieces and awards from admirers worldwide, such as Russian Czar Alexander II and Japanese shogun Tokugawa Yoshinobu.

Admission prices to PPHM during the Colt exhibition (May 24-September 1) will be \$12 for adults, \$6 for children, \$5 for members, and \$3 for member children.



Elliott M. "Mr. Ed" Bailey



Consider options before breaking out CRP acres

Officials with the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) are urging farmers to consider USDA compliance and program eligibility before converting Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) acres to cropland production.

"More than one million acres in Texas covered under CRP contracts will expire in the next year and a half, and we could see a lot of land use changes, especially in the Panhandle region," said Don Gohmert, NRCS state conservationist for Texas. "We want landowners to understand options available to them and what they need to do to remain in compliance for USDA programs."

Conservation compliance, which began with the 1985 Farm Bill, is still in effect. Compliance means that farmers need to control erosion on highly erodible land, which includes CRP acres, in order to stay eligible for USDA program benefits, including farm loan programs, disaster assistance, commodity price supports, and conservation programs.

According to NRCS, the most common ways farmers get out of compliance with USDA is by eliminating soil-conserving crops, such as forage species, and adding a tilled crop, such as corn or

cotton. When the farmer changes his soil cover from permanent grass to annually-tilled crops, he/she should always consider conservation compliance when planning their rotations, in addition to commodity prices.

"The lure of high crop prices may have landowners considering plowing up grassland and planting it to a commodity crop," Gohmert said. "Not only are there compliance issues to consider, but landowners should also look at what is best for the land."

According to Lori Ziehr, NRCS state agronomist, much of the land enrolled in CRP was classified as highly erodible, meaning it is susceptible to wind and/or water erosion. "That soil has not changed over the years the land was in CRP," she said. "If those acres are returned to cropland, landowners will need to take certain measures to ensure those acres will not erode beyond a level that the soil can tolerate."

For example, Ziehr said that a certain percentage of the field may need to be planted to high residue crops each year or that contour windstrips be left at certain intervals to prevent erosion. In some cases, she said, fields may already have terraces that need to be main-

tained to remain in compliance and help lower the potential for erosion.

Before a landowner takes any action at all, Ziehr encourages them to visit their local NRCS field office to find out what a compliance plan would entail and if there are any financial cost-share programs to help off-set some of the conservation costs. "A landowner has more options

when his land is still in grass," she said. "Grazing former CRP acres is another option to consider."

CRP is a voluntary program through which farmers and ranchers plant grasses and trees on marginal cropland acres in exchange for rental payments. The USDA Farm Service Agency administers CRP; NRCS provides technical assistance for the program.

Boll weevil program referendum passes

Ballots in the Boll Weevil Eradication Program referendum held for the Panhandle Boll Weevil Eradication zone were canvassed in Austin.

Texas Department of Agriculture advises that the referendum to continue the eradication program in the Panhandle zone passed with 94% of the votes cast being in favor. Keith Watson was re-elected to the Board of the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation to represent the zone.

Four hundred and two ballots were mailed out, 162 valid votes were cast: 153 For; 9 Against.

State sales tax received

Texas Comptroller Susan Combs announced the state collected \$1.7 billion in sales tax revenue in April, down 1.8 percent compared to April 2007.

"This was a slight decrease compared to the dramatic growth seen in April 2007," Combs said. "For the eight months of fiscal 2008 to date, state sales tax collections are up 6 percent compared to the previous year."

As expected, the slower expansion of the Texas economy in 2008 is translating into sales tax growth below the double-digit pace of the past two years.

May's sales tax allocations to local governments represent March sales that were reported to the Comptroller in April by quarterly tax filers.

Parmer County's May 2008 payment totaled \$49,230.54, broken down as Bovina \$6,762.90; Farwell \$8,486.25; and Friona \$33,981.39. In May 2007, the tax payment total was \$53,365.22.

Comparing tax receipts from the same period last year, payments were down -7.74%, broken down as Bovina down -34.32%; Farwell up 11.19%; and Friona down -4.10%.

For the year, Parmer County cities have received a total of \$204,992.48 as compared to

\$206,866.02 for the same period last year, a -0.90% change.

The Comptroller's next sales tax allocation will be made on Friday, June 13.

Neugebauer denounces housing bailout bill

After the House passed H.R. 3221, *American Housing Rescue and Foreclosure Prevention Act of 2008*, Congressman Randy Neugebauer, the Deputy Ranking Member of the Financial Services Committee and a former home builder and mortgage lender, released the following statement:

"Financial markets are not always kind, but they are efficient. Home equity should be determined by the marketplace, not the federal government. A government bailout for lenders and individuals who made poor choices it is simply irresponsible."

"In any investment, there is risk. At some point, individuals and lending institutions must take responsibility for the choices they have made. We must remember that 94 percent of Americans are making their mortgage payments in full and on time. The bottom line is that it is not in the government's or the taxpayers' best interest to determine the equity of someone's home; that is for the market to decide. The federal government should not be seen as a piggy bank to save the day for those who have acted irresponsibly."

"Within my 30 year career as a home builder and a mortgage lender, I have seen turmoil in the housing and other financial markets. History has proven time and again that the markets will self correct and some investors may lose money on a risk they have taken. While these are unfortunate circumstances, all investors should play on an equal field, without the federal government standing by to insulate one from a loss."

"This bailout is unfair to taxpayers. We have just sent the message that not only do they have to pay their own mortgage, but they have to pay their neighbors' mortgages as well."

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

What is inspiration?

T. LEON TALLEY, Minister, Sixth Street Church of Christ
There are three common theories about how inspiration worked. The first I will mention is:

1) **The Mechanical Dictation Theory**

The idea is that the Biblical writers were no more than secretaries taking dictation from God.

The problem with this theory is that it destroyed the personality of the writers. We don't see this in scripture. For instance, in scripture, we see the difference between Isaiah and Jeremiah. Not much is revealed about Isaiah, the man, but his writing shows his intelligence. He is very analytical in his prophecy.

Jeremiah is a very emotional prophet. He cries for his nation. An outpouring of the human spirit is seen more clearly in Jeremiah than in any other prophet. The differences in personalities can be seen in each of the authors of the Bible books.

2) **The Rubber Stamp Theory**

This is the idea that, had you been in the cell with Paul as he wrote Philippians, that you would not have seen the Holy Spirit enter until Paul had finished. It's the view that Paul just happened to write something God liked, so God decided to include it in scripture.

This would make God reduced to rubber-stamping creations of men. It makes scripture the origin of men, not God. This can't be!

3) **The Theory of Plenary Inspiration**

This theory is that, had you been in that cell with Paul, you would have seen an active dialogue between the apostle and the Holy Spirit. Paul was an active participant. His personality, thoughts, and understanding came out in the text. But the Holy Spirit is actively supervising Paul's efforts, guiding this choice of words, shaping his understanding and communicating divine truths.

The message is breathed by God Himself!

CHS Friona and city team up to keep the fish swimming

The employees of CHS Inc. at Friona, a grain facility serving the region's livestock producers, have teamed up with the city to ensure that fishing in Reeve Lake remains a recreational activity for years to come.

CHS, in cooperation with the city of Friona, has funded the purchase of 100 pounds of bluegills to stock Reeve Lake along with the printing of signs encouraging local anglers to "catch and release." The lake was the site on May 11 of the KidFish contest for local youngsters. Participants in that event were allowed to keep the catfish they caught and were

awarded prizes in a variety of categories.

"We think the annual contest is a great event for our community's kids but we want to make sure the fun of fishing remains available to our entire community," said Jon Douglas, CHS Friona manager. "By stocking the lake with bluegills in addition to the catfish, and posting signs asking that the public release the fish they catch, we can help sustain fish populations for years to come."

The CHS involvement in the restocking effort was supported by a company Seeds for Stewardship grant

which provides funding for local community volunteer activities. CHS Friona manager Jon Douglas presented a check in the amount of \$450 to the city.

The CHS Friona terminal is primarily an unloading facility for yellow corn serving area feedlots and commercial dairies. It has an elevator storage capacity of 880,000 bushels, about two shuttle trains worth, and is among the CHS facilities capable of high-speed unloading of today's 110-car trains. This terminal handles approximately 25 million bushels annually and is served by the BNSF railroad.




