County Retirement Plan

When Cisco and Texas voters go to the polls next Tuesday they will be asked to ballot on the proposition of authorizing a plan for the individual couunties to setup retirement pro grams for od or disabled couunty workers. This is one of five proposed changes in the state constitution to be settled in the election.

Several Texas Counties, including Dallas, Travis, Jefferson, Galveston and El Paso, already have their own systems for four new deep tests. A fifth well aiding county employees. Some 75 Texas cities now have the for the same area now is being Texas Municipal Retirement System, and the amendment drilled. would set up a similar program for all the counties.

Details of the new county worker proposal, if adopted, would be decided later by the Legislature. It would apply to all appointive officers and employees. Like the present county-by-county system, local option elections would decide which counties take part.

Although state and local governments were slow in following the trend toward disability and retirement programs, they are catching up fast. Texas teachers have such a system. pecially the first half, but were So do state employees. Local plans cover many thousands of others in the larger cities.

> Benefits vary under the individual plans. Under the statewide plan for city employees, workers draw pensions of from \$30 to \$200 monthly with an average of \$75. Payments are based on pay and length of service. The employee usually puts aside five per cent of his salary and the taxpayers match

Local setups usually permit a worker to retire sooner than the 65 year age minimum of the social security program.

If the proposition is approved by the voters, the state-wide system for counties will be started probably in 1953. If will, of course, mean more spending for the counties that join the program. Butu the countes themselves will have to vote on the program in local option elections if the statewide poll is favorable.

An adequate retirement program might be an inducement for more capable workers to become career public servants. These are some things you will want to weigh carefully when you go to the polls next Tuesday.





Wheat prospects were improved in the northwest. Color of the growing crop was better, and wheat seeded in the dust was coming up to a stand. Some additional acreage was seeded. Prospects for small grains and cover crops in central and east Texas were also improved, with sufficient moisture in most areas to complete planting and to benefit growing crops.

Harvest of sorghums in the northwest was delayed by damp, disagreeable weather. In most northern High Plains counties, however, harvest was nearly completed. Digging and thresh ing of peanuts was interrupted by wet weather in north Texas. Vines were killed on crops not yet harvested. Sweet potato harvest was nearing completion, with light yields but good quality reported. A very light pecan
