Two Cisco Boxes **Open For Voters**

A light vote has been forecast for Cisco and all Texas at the polls Tuesday, Nov. 13, when five proposed changes in the state constitution and a question on reallocation of county tax revenues will be submitted to the people.

There will be two voting boxes in Cisco — at the City Hall and at the Cisco Maytax Company. Fred Grist will be the presiding judge at the city hall box, and Billy Huestis will preside over the other box.

Mr. Huestis announced that his election judges will include W. Wallace, W. Huestis, Kent Word, Jess Proctor, Runt Dill, Mrs. Billy Huestis and Mrs. Baker. Mr. Grist's list of officials was not available.

The usual election rules and regulations will govern the voting. There will be two ballots - one for the proposed changes in the state constitution, and the other dealing with the Eastland County matter

The county question, which will have no effect on the tax rate, will merely ask the approval of the voters to re-allocate the the approval of the voters.



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
