cast ballots by 1 p. m. today in the constitutional amendment election being held throughout Texas. Voting boxes were located at the Maytag Cisco Company for East Cisco and at the Fire Station for West Cisco.

The fire station box had been visited by 90 voters, while 36 had east ballots at the Maytag store. Five proposed amendments to the state constitution, affecting statewide matters, were on one ballot. The other ballot would authorize Eastland County's Commissioners' Court to reallocate some of its tax revenues from one fund to another

Reports indicated that little interest was being shown in the election over the state.

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




