These are meant to clarify the Boards intent as to the details of its bonus regulation. The bulletin will be especially helpful at this time to many employers who customarily pay annual bonuses to their employees at Christmas time or at the end of the calendar year. It will be equally applicable to other em-

The bulletin will explain how an employer who has paid bonuses, in accordance with a specific plan or otherwise, may continue to do so. Questions cover bonus payments to those emovees under the jurisdiction of WSB. They do not apply to executive, administrative and professional employees under the jurisdiction of the Salary Staoilization Board.

WSB has received many inquiries about whether or not specific Board approval is necessary for employers to give employees a holiday the day before Christmas and New Year, both of which fall this year on Tuesday. If the employer has given his employees the day off just before a holiday in the past, WSB points out he may continue to do so without prior ap-






