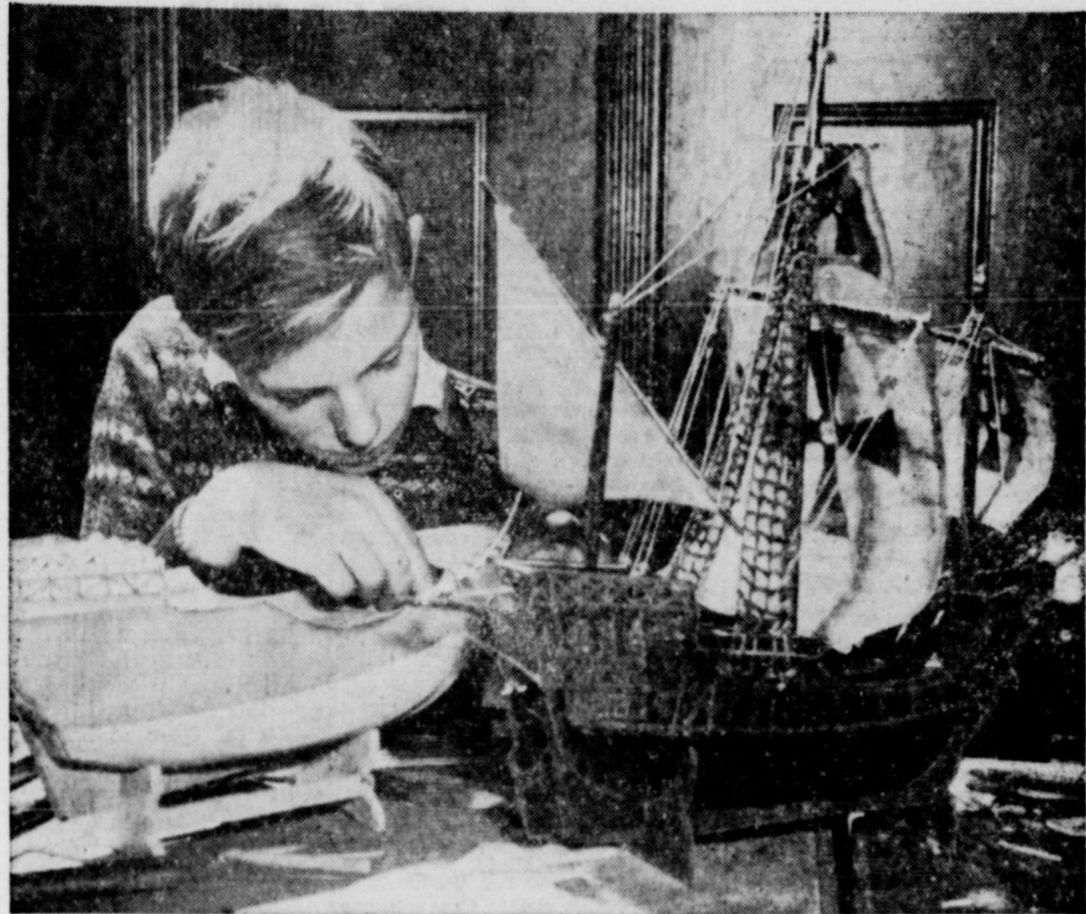

Cotton Harvest Makes Progress

Harvest of Texas cotton and sorghums in the northwest made good progress during the past week in cool open weather, and in south Texas supplies of commercial vegetables were increasing. Corn, sweet potato, peanut and rice harvest was practically completed in all areas.

Except in a few widely scattered eastern and northern areas, however, soaking rains were still urgently needed to replenish soil moisture and bring on small grains, winter legumes and winter grass. Cool temperatures and dry soil in the northwest were slowing development of wheat. Very little grazing has been afforded to date.

Movement of commercial vegetables, although still comparatively light, started showing a gradual increase.

Dry range and pasture feed was very short and being consumed steadily in all areas. In the northwest, wheat was supplying a little green feed, but cool temperatures and dry soil was retarding development. A large tonnage of bundle feed was being trucked out of southern High Plains counties into the Edwards Plateau where dry ranges were practically bare. Supplemental feeding continued to increase. Lack of green feed for an extended period was causing vitamin deficiencies to show up among cattle depending upon dry range feed, especially in some central counties.

Shivers Praises Work Of TB Body

Citing the "invaluable work" of the Texas Tuberculosis Association in fighting tuberculosis in Texas, Governor Shivers made public today a formal proclamation calling for "100 per cent generous support" of the 1951 Christmas Seal Sale. The campaign will be conducted by the Tuberculosis Association until Christmas.

In issuing his proclamation, the Governor spoke of all "the excellent tuberculosis-fighting projects of the Association," but singled out the Association's health education programs for special commendation.

"Working on a year-round basis, the Texas Tuberculosis Association and its local affiliates make every effort to get across to the people facts about tuberculosis which will help them protect themselves against the disease," the Governor pointed out.

Two New Projects Slated For Area

Considerable interest was being shown today in prospective oil production and development in the area some seven miles north of Cisco. Two new projects were reported for that area and an offset to new Caddo production was being contemplated near Pueblo, 10 miles north of Cisco.

Midway Oil Company of Lubbock has made location for their No. 1 W. H. Groves, one-fourth of a mile northeast of Lake sand production, seven miles north of Cisco. The Texaco Company recently completed a Lake sand well in that area.

Location for the Midway's 3,600-foot test is 330 feet from the south and 1,657 feet from the west lines of the northwest quarter of Section 473, SP Survey, Eastland County.

According to reports, the Cooper and Hemphill Company of Cisco is staking location in the same general area for a Lake sand test. Details of the project were not immediately available.

McElroy Ranch Company was reported to be readying plans to drill an offset to their No. 1-B E. W. McCollum in Section 3199, TE&L Survey, Callahan County, a Caddo lime producer of some 135 barrels per day.

The J. K. Wadley & Hilton et al No. 1 Mrs. Bernice McGough was reported as a failure, having been plugged at 3,450 feet, north of production in the Bankline-Owens field, northeast of Cisco. Location is in Section 42, Block 4, H&TC Survey.

Bankline Oil Company had a new producer in the field northeast of town. Their No. 3 C. E. Reynolds has been completed as a producer with a potential estimated at between 100 and 150 barrels per day.

Fred Pool Drilling Company was due to move in Thursday to drill the E. K. Carey No. 1 Masonic Lodge in south Cisco. Location will be on the old sales barn site just off Avenue D.

Several other wells are expected to be sunk in the south Cisco townsite and the area immediately south of town as the result of the Texas Railroad Commission's decision recently to grant one permit for each city block. At least two more projects have been announced, including Jack Hailey's No. 1 Thelma H. Richardson and a well to be drilled by Wampler Bros. of Gladewater.

Six miles southwest of Cisco, the Wilcox Investment Company et al No. 1 T. T. Horn was drilling at about 3,000 feet. Located 1,728 feet west of the company's new Strawn producer, on the Leveridge Estate land, the Horn well was reported to have missed the Strawn Estate formation and it will be carried to the Caddo lime.

On the Hittson Ranch, north of Cisco, the Cities Service Oil Company was reported to have set pipe over the past weekend in a Lake sand prospect. It was understood that the hole was carried to the Ellenberger lime, but pipe was set to the Lake sand where observers predicted a good well would be completed.

City Commission Has Regular Meet

Members of the city commission voted Tuesday night to raise the water rates of schools, churches, and other organizations to the "break even" point at a regular semi-monthly meeting at the city hall.

Under the new plan, the schools churches and other groups will pay a straight 15 cents per thousand gallons — twice their former rate, Mayor G. C. Rosenthal reported. He said that figures show that it costs the city between 14 and 15 cents per thousand gallons to deliver water in town.

The application of the City Cab Company to raise its basic rates from 35c to 40 cents for two people to ride was approved by the council. Other routine matters came up for consideration.

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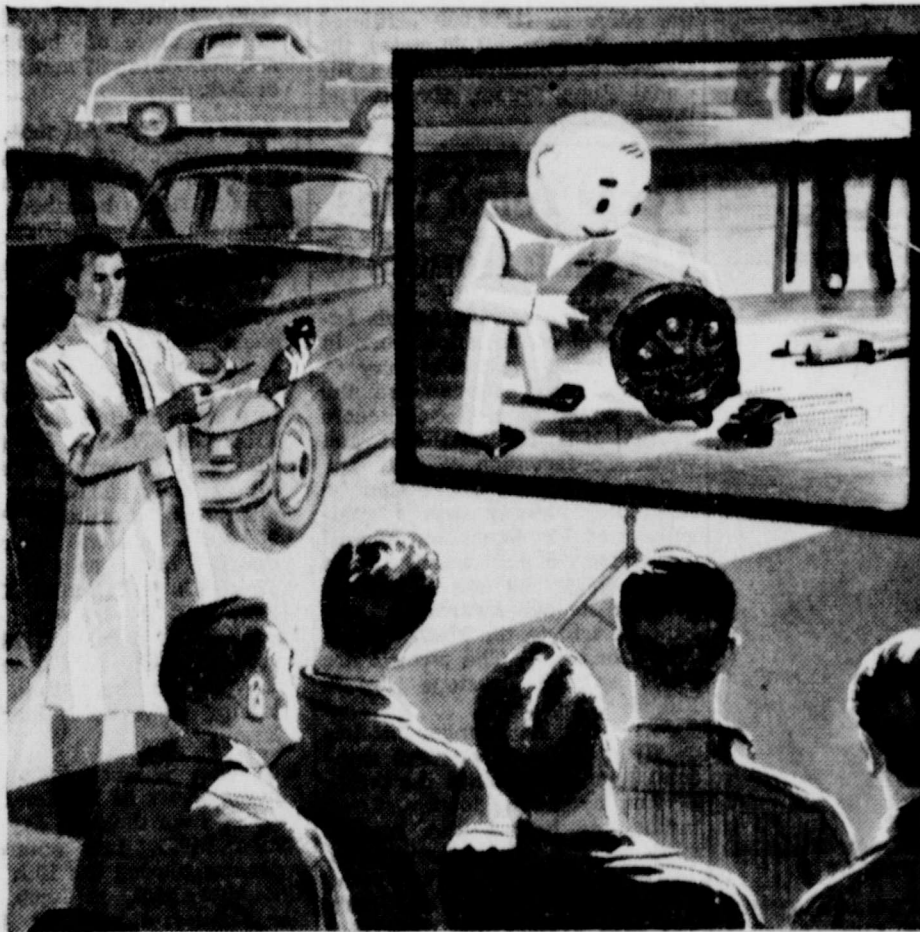

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Texas Youth Wins 4-H Club Honors

As a fitting reward for his excellent and constructive work in soil saving 14-year-old Jerry C. McDaniel has been named the Texas winner of sectional honors in the 1951 National Soil and Water Conservation contest.

As a winner in Cooke County, Jerry has already won a gold-filled medal of honor and he will be awarded a gold watch for his state honor. As one of sixteen winners, he was awarded an all-expense trip to the National 4-H Club Congress. The awards are given by The Firestone Tire & Rubber Company.

Jerry and his younger brother do all of the work on their father's 82-acre farm since the father is employed in town. Their father has helped and encouraged the boys whenever possible.

The soil on the farm was being washed away from lack of care. The first project was to terrace the entire farm. Six acres were set aside as permanent pasture and was furrowed on the contour to increase the water holding capacity. Phosphate was added at the rate of 100 pounds per acre. Lime was added later, and the land was planted to lespedeza.

Another six acres of pool land was terraced, and lime, manure and fertilizer added. The land was then contoured and put to strip-cropping and crop rotation. It is now a good producer.

Each year the orchard trees are pruned and the brush is stacked as game refuge. All bushes and vines that produce berries are left to feed wildlife.

During his four years of 4-H Club work, Jerry has been president of his club for two years and completed 32 projects including swine, poultry, dairy crops, garden and field crops.

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
