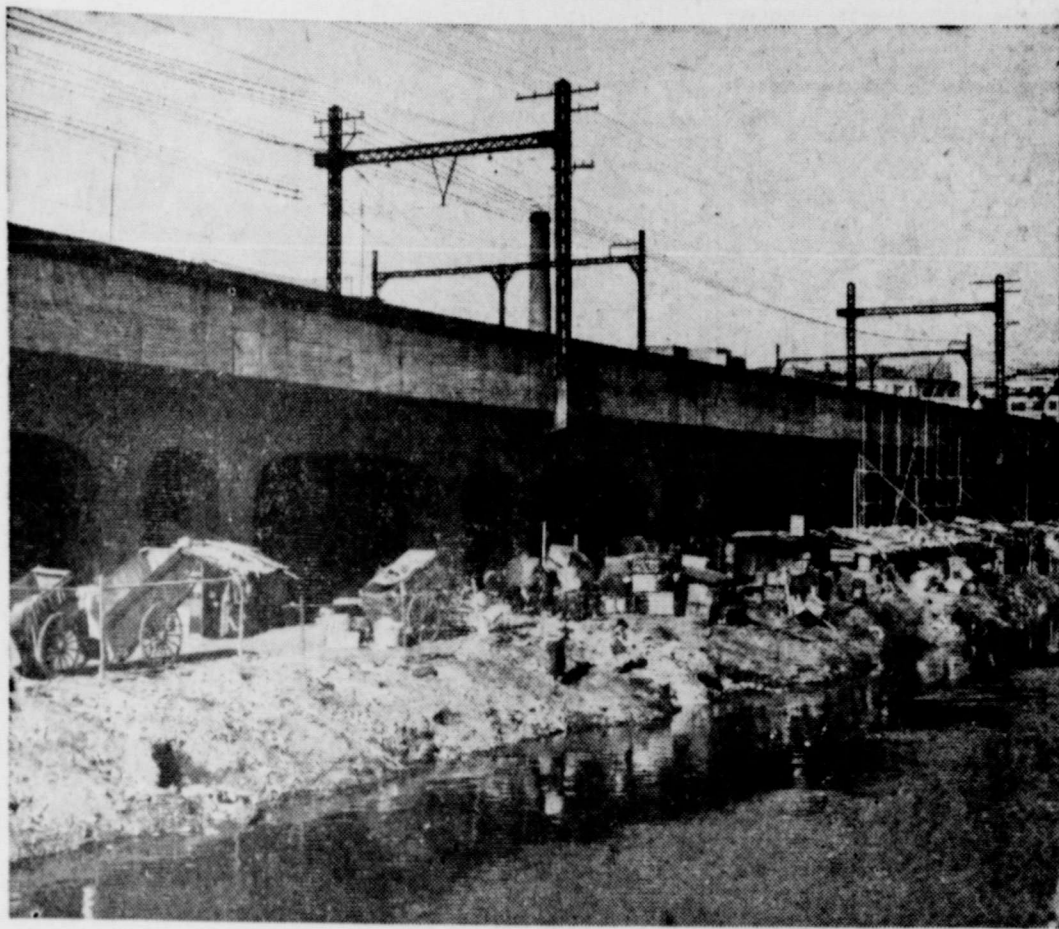

## Dr. Taylor Talks At Rotary Club Luncheon Meeting

"If you've lived in the United States of America for the past 50 years you've discovered a new world," Dr. Thomas Taylor, president of Howard Payne College, told Rotarians Thursday. "During that time," he said, "the world has made a complete change and we are no longer living in the same world that was known before the turn of the century."

Dr. Taylor was the speaker for the meeting at the invitation of Rotarian Ralph Wootton. He was introduced by Rotarian Floyd Shepard.

He told of complete transformations in education, agriculture, transportation, communications, manufacturing, merchandising, government, and commerce. In speaking of the changes in education he said that the old reading, 'rithm' and 'rithmetic' idea was replaced by one of broader scope and in talking of the change of agriculture he said that the old free land program had been replaced by high priced land and mechanized farming.

He said that a complete change in transportation and communications had made the world a unit, changing it from a group of units. He explained the manufacturing and merchandising change as important and far reaching and said that the governmental change had brought about a United States of one body and not 48 separate bodies. In concluding his talk Mr. Taylor said that the world need not expect to go back to the days when the constitution was written but to go forward with further changes.

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## Outlook For Area Seen As Brighter

The oil and gas producing potential of the south Cisco townsites and adjacent area was given a new impetus Saturday as the Lake sand formation yielded gas in substantial quantities in the J. E. Connally No. 1 Mrs. Pearl McMurray, southwest outpost wildcat location, a mile southwest of town.

A drill stem test of the McMurray well flowed gas estimated by oil men at the rate of about five million cubic feet per day with a show of white distillate. No oil was recovered in the test, which was run late Friday night.

According to reports, the operators decided to deepen the hole for further testing. The test was run from the Lake sand at about 3,450 feet. The location is in the southwest quarter of Section 67, Block 3, H&TC Survey — about one mile west of a Lake sand well completed recently on the A. Z. Myrick land.

Some observers believed the McMurray test indicates a prospective producing area at least three miles long. Width of the area still was to be defined.

The south townsites area had another producer as the E. K. Carey No. 1 Masonic Home well was completed. After being given the hydrafrac treatment, it was opened and flowed back the treatment oil in short order. It was reported to have flowed early Saturday at the rate of two to three barrels per hour with a high gas-oil ratio. Location is the old auction barn tract in Section 66, Block 3.

Further south, the E. K. Carey No. 1 Max Witt was swabbing oil in cleaning out operations Saturday. It was scheduled to receive the hydrafrac treatment over the weekend for final completion early this week.

A mile northwest of Cisco, the Raymond Thomason No. 1 E. C. Montague was drilling at 3,350 feet in Caddo lime Saturday morning.

In the area six miles southwest of Cisco, Ownby Drilling Company was moving in cable tools to complete his No. 1 J. W. Brown Estate. The well is regarded as an excellent Mississippi lime prospect, offsetting Ownby's discovery well, his No. 1 Mrs. Effie Brown.

Ownby's heavy rig was moving to a location due north of the Effie Brown to drill his No. 1 B. A. Brown. He is due to drill soon on the E. M. Snoddy land in the same area.

Gray Drilling Company of Cisco was rigging up on the Stevens and Rambo (D. K. Henke) No. 1 J. W. Brown Estate in Section 118, Block 3, H&TC Survey. Drilling was due to begin over the weekend.

Bankline Oil Company's No. 7 J. H. Reynolds, five miles northeast of Cisco, was drilling at 615 feet early Saturday. Choate Drilling Company of Cisco has the contract for the production offset in Section 50, Block 4, H&TC Survey.

Four miles northeast of Cisco, the J. P. Lohan et al No. 1 Sam Hart was about to spud in Saturday. A new drilling rig was unloaded there and set up for the first time by Edwards Brothers of Graham. This is an offset to production on the John Hart lease.

In the Dtohan area, west of Cisco, completion work was still underway in the D. W. Feldman No. 1 Pruet, an Ellenberger lime prospect. After lower swabbing failed to yield oil in sufficient quantities, the casing was perforated higher and the well acidized. Considerable oil was showing in operations Saturday.

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Gardeners Will Attend Meeting At TSCW Jan. 17

DENTON, Jan. 12. — Garden club members from all over the state are expected to attend the annual Garden Conference at Texas State College for Women January 17 and 18, sponsored jointly by Texas Garden Clubs, Inc. and TSCW.

This year's conference will consist of addresses by well-known authorities on gardening, clinics, panel discussions, social gatherings, and entertainment programs by TSCW students as well as tours of the campus.

Among the principal speakers will be Dr. Gustav A. L. Mehlquist, research horticulturist for the Missouri Botanical Garden in St. Louis, Mo.; Professor A. F. Worth, head of the Department of Floriculture and Landscape Architecture at Texas A & M College; Mrs. G. C. Spillers, president of the National Council of Garden Clubs; Robert P. Ealy, professor of landscape design at Oklahoma A & M College; Fred R. Brison, professor of horticulture at Texas A & M College; Fred W. Westcott, director of the Rural Arts Department at

TSCW; and Jack Finney, city planner and architect of San Antonio. Subjects for the discussions will range from the growing of vegetables and house plants to civic development program planning, modern trends in landscaping gardening and new trends in horticulture.

## HEALTH TALKS

Blood types are of importance when blood is required for a transfusion. There are four general types, O, A, B, and AB. O is the most common type (about 45 percent of the people), followed by A (about 42 percent), B (about 10 percent), and AB (about 3 percent).

In addition to that broad classification for blood typing, there is another part of blood known as the Rh factor which is also important at the time of transfusion. About 85 percent of the people are Rh positive, leaving only about 15 percent to be Rh negative.

When your blood is typed, you are given a card listing your type, such as O positive or A negative. Those with Rh negative blood must receive only negative blood at the time of transfusion. In all cases it is best for a person to receive exactly his own type of blood but in emergencies anyone may be given O type blood if the Rh factor corresponds to his own. That is why O blood is called the universal donor type of blood.

Those who have A blood in their veins may receive either A or O type blood and B types may receive either B or O types. AB type of blood may be given only to those with AB blood, but if no AB blood is available (since it is rare), the AB types may receive any kind as long as the Rh factor is positive or negative like in his own blood. The AB types are known as the universal receiver of blood, because in an emergency they can be given any type.

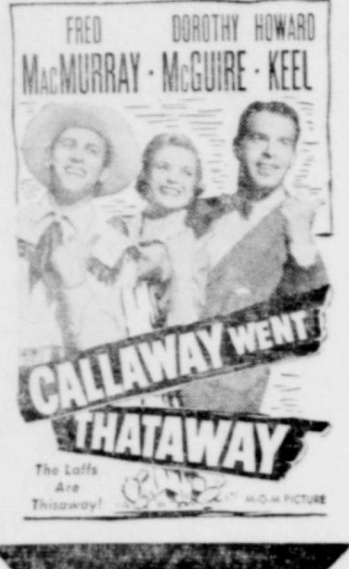

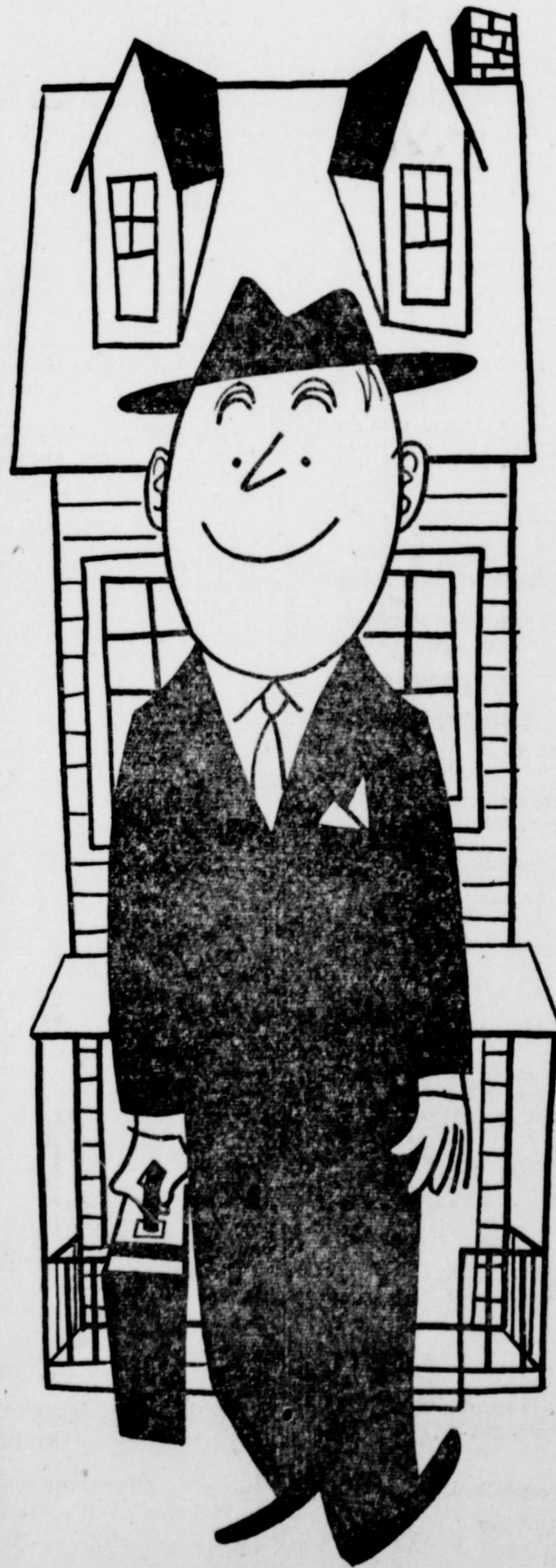
